

# **RECTOR'S LETTER**

#### **Dear Friends**

As I thought about harvest time it struck me once again that Jesus told quite a lot of stories about seeds. But it also struck me that he so often used the potential of seeds as an encouragement, as a reminder, that however bleak things may sometimes look, we should never underestimate what God can do. After all, a seed may be



small and unprepossessing but in good soil it will come up, grow and produce a crop, multiplying thirty, sixty, or even a hundred times [Mk 4:8]. Each rice seed, each mustard seed, each ear of corn, each pumpkin seed – tiny and inert as it seems – has within it the potential to become a plant that provides an abundant harvest. Just as every country ravaged by war, violence, civil war or poverty has within it the potential to be a peaceful and productive nation and every child born within them the potential to be a loving adult. It is all about potential.

Like those who first listened to Jesus' parables, we too live in an often harsh and brutal world. The horrific events that so often fill our newspapers or television screens could lead us to despair about human nature – the good being trampled mercilessly underfoot. But Jesus says keep sowing; keep sowing the seeds of hope and peace and love and justice in the world. Some of those seeds will be trampled and choked underfoot by brutal regimes, or blown away by callous terrorists, or simply withered and scorched by the selfish indifference of so-called respectable people. But keep on sowing anyway! And then just trust the seed of God's love and believe in the Lord of the Harvest!

For seeds to reach their potential, they need the right conditions to thrive and flourish.

In the Parable of the Sower, the seeds that aren't planted in the right conditions, or nurtured and tended, wither and perish. As even the

most inexperienced of gardeners will know, plants need the right care and attention to bear fruit. Seeds will not reap a valuable harvest without peace, without tools, and without hard work. This is the good ground needed that the seed may grow to maturity. And there are many ways in which we can grow and nurture the harvest of love, peace and justice: we can give our money and see it help to produce a harvest for the poor; we can pray for an end to a whole system of trade that is seemingly so ruthlessly biased towards the rich nations; we can pray more generally, after all, one small prayer can produce a rich harvest. We can also resolve to live more simply so that others may simply live - and work to stop global warming. Or we could just sow a million small acts of love and peace and justice in our lives and so live out the gospel. These are the seeds of the Spirit which can be nurtured to produce the great Harvest of the Kingdom.

Let me finish with the words of Oscar Romero, Roman Catholic Archbishop of El Salvador who was martyred in 1980:

> One person plants a seed in the soil. Another waters it. We plant seeds that one day will grow. We water seeds already planted knowing that they hold future promise. We lay foundations that will need further development. (What we do) may be incomplete, but is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for God's grace to enter and do the rest. We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the Master Builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not messiahs.

We are prophets of a future not our own.

So, let us sow the seed and trust God for the Harvest!



# **Mission Focus**



Dear Sue .

This has been a tough week for our team in Syria. The area where they were came under heavy attack which was terrifying for all of them. It's not that they haven't experienced or lived through heavy attacks in the past. All of them have. Some of them have lived and worked in areas where heavy bomb attacks took place daily for large periods of the war. The difference is that this was supposed to be one the safe areas, a place where many Syrians have gone for refuge and safety. Yet this weeks events, perpetrated by outside nations who have an active role in this proxy war in Syria have taken away any feeling of safety they had there.

These are the kind of events that result in families being displaced, and if the places of safety no longer feel safe then how do any Syrians who have remained in Syria manage to create any kind of life for them and their children? The risks a person is willing to endure for themselves+ are one thing, but when they have small children to consider it is a different matter entirely. When they have seen huge sections of the cities they were living in destroyed, it is hard for them to believe that they won't see the same happen all over again. They need real peace.

I thank God for the resilience of the Syrian people which enables them to keep going through these traumas they are suffering. Having personally experienced a similar rocket attack in Damascus earlier this year, I can begin to understand the sheer terror of an attack like this. So many have been displaced and lost everything, and are in need some some encouragement. While there is much we can't do, there are many things we can do to bring some encouragement to these people.

Two more of our containers have arrived in Syria this week and there is another the way. It takes time to plan the distributions we do, and we are working on this. But we would really like to add more aid to these next distributions. We now have more than one hundred collectors across the UK for our current appeal, but we need more if we are to have a significant impact on these people in such great need.

The pictures on our website https://www.samarasaidappeal.org/ were all taken by our team during our distributions in Ghouta between April and July when we distributed the aid we sent from the UK to more than 100,000 people who fled from their homes there. Many are living in tents and informal settlements which are completely inappropriate for winter. They desperately need help and we would like to help them more.

Distributions last year to children who missed years of education because of the fighting in Aleppo. We often distribute in schools. If you know children returning to school this Autumn with everything they need, please consider whether you can help some of the children in Syria with essentials.
