Dear Friends,

As we commemorate the hundredth anniversary of the ending of the First World War much will be said and even more will be written no doubt, about the causes of the war, about the failures of diplomacy that perhaps saw the war begin in the first place and about the apparent foolishness of so many who colluded with the myths of war and failed to bring it to a swift end. It all has a place in our remembrance if only so that we may learn the lessons that history has to teach. However, transcending all of that, above all of the analysis, above



all else we need to remember the lives lost and damaged.

The figures are truly gruesome. There were probably 20 million deaths in the First World War and around another 20 million casualties, people who survived the war but who bore the physical and mental scars for the rest of their life. No family was left untouched by the darkness as the endless lists of names carved onto memorial stones in every church in every village and every town the length and breadth of Europe reveal. Each one a life; each one bearing the hope of a future that was denied them; each one someone's beloved. It is impossible to imagine tragedy and carnage on such a scale, though reading the letters and papers of those who bore it, or most of all the great poems, a dreadful picture does appear both of the scale of loss and the manner of their dying. We need to remember. We must remember. And as we promise ourselves each year, we will remember them.

But our remembrance should remind us too, that we are called to be peacemakers and that we need to be praying in thanks for the peace that we now enjoy, but also for the peace of the whole world and for reconciliation between all people. In the very first book of the Bible, the Book of Genesis, we first encounter the conflict-prone human spirit when we're introduced to two brothers who have fallen out. Cain is angry at a perceived injustice suffered at the hands of his brother Able. That Cain is a farmer and Able a shepherd speaks of differing world views. So, Cain slays Able but just before this murderous act God warns Cain: "sin is lurking at the door; it's desire is for you but you must master it." This is a warning that human kind doesn't live together peaceably by default. Sin is an inherent inability to build the ways of gentleness and the paths of peace.

The story of Cain and Able suggests that from very early on we have lacked the ability to disagree well, to tolerate difference and to resist making enemies of those unlike us. Something that Jesus of all people knew only too well. In the

Sermon on the Mount he sets before us instead a way of behaving where the merciful obtain mercy, where peacemakers are called children of God, and where the meek inherit the earth. If heeded these are words that bring a light that casts away the darkness from our own hearts and expels the darkness of the world.

This call to peace-making is a theme that continues throughout Jesus' teaching and that of his apostles. We are actively to '*pursue peace*', we are to '*strive for peace with all people*' and so far, as it depends on us, we are to '*live peaceably with all*.' Why? Because as God's words of warning to Cain suggest, peacemaking is divine work. It is the work of God. Peace means reconciliation and God is the author of peace and reconciliation. As the apostle Paul writes, through Christ, God was pleased '*to reconcile to himself all things.... making peace by the blood of his cross.*' So, by being peace-makers we can share in the nature of God, seeking to overcome evil with good, and hatred and fear with love.

But that, as Christ's sacrifice on the cross reminds us, comes at a cost. I will always remember hearing a former colleague preach a sermon in which he reminded us all that it is underlying negative attitudes that are at the root of all human conflict. negative attitudes towards others or about others and their ways and so he encouraged us to challenge them, especially when they occur in ourselves, to challenge that self-assertiveness and divisive, critical spirit that so easily divides people into 'them' and 'us'. That has stayed with me, and comes back to me again each year at this season of Remembrance. And it can be costly, it can be hard and at times difficult but true peace starts in us, and in our determination to count others 'in' rather than counting them 'out'. True peace starts when we break down those barriers between people whether caused by race, creed or colour or by whatever difference we may think we have and remember instead that as the apostle Paul writes in his letter to the Galatians that now 'there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for [we] are all one in Christ Jesus'. It may sometimes be difficult to be a peacemaker, Christ himself has shown us that, but we must always be prepared at whatever the cost, to give peace a chance.

Nothing less is worthy in our response to this hundredth anniversary and nothing less is worthy of a child of God.

CPAS is an Anglican evangelical mission agency working with churches, mainly in the UK and Republic of Ireland.

History

Since being founded in 1836 our activities may have changed with the times, but our original mission to enable churches to bring the gospel to men, women and children remains and is still the driving force behind all we do.

CPAS (the Church Pastoral Aid Society) was founded in 1836 by prominent Christians, including the pioneering social reformer Lord Shaftesbury. It was established as a Christian response to the massive social change brought about by the Industrial Revolution. What were once small village churches found themselves with the new urban poor on their doorsteps.

Lord Shaftesbury and his friends stepped in to set up a new charity that would resource these churches to cope with this change, through giving them grants to enable them to employ extra members of staff. Their aim was simple: the gospel should be taken 'to every person's door, with a single eye to the glory of God'.

What was controversial – though hardly a surprise to us today – was that CPAS gave grants for the employment of lay staff as well as those who were ordained. One of the chief critics of this was William Gladstone, later to become Prime Minister. One of the first recipients of a grant was the Rev Patrick Bronte, Rector of Haworth, and father of the famous novelists, who was able to employ Rev Arthur Nicholls as curate. Mr Nicholls actually married Charlotte Bronte and CPAS even merits a passing reference on the first page of her novel Shirley:

'Of late years, I say, an abundant shower of curates has fallen upon the north of England, but in eighteen-hundred-eleven-twelve that affluent rain had not descended. Curates were scarce then: there was no Pastoral Aid - no Additional Curates' Society to stretch a helping hand to worn-out old rectors and incumbents, and give them the wherewithal to pay a vigorous young colleague from Oxford or Cambridge.'

Over time, of course, the work of CPAS has developed. But nonetheless the vision of our founders burns strongly in us. Like them, we believe in resourcing leaders - both lay and ordained. Like them, we want to see the church equipped to cope with rapidly changing social circumstances. Like them, we want to see the gospel find its way to everyone's door. And as we do so, we know that we're building on the solid foundations of the past.
