

Wardens' Words

In May, PCC will be reviewing the charities which we as a church support. Every year we donate 10% of our disposable income in equal shares to five charities, details of which you can find at the back of the Church Directory. The four regular recipients are currently: the **Ardingly Old Jeshwang Association** (supporting a health clinic in the Gambia); the **Church Mission Society** (and thus our link missionary Heather Johnstone helping disadvantaged women and children in Tanzania); the **Church Pastoral Aid Society** (our Patron, supporting churches in proclaiming the good news of Jesus); and the **Imara-Uganda Education Fund** (supporting the education of severely disadvantaged children in Uganda).

The fifth charity is usually left unallocated to allow us to respond to an urgent crisis or to donate to organizations in need or with which we have a personal connection. The most recent donations have been made to the **Chichester Diocesan Association for Family Support Work** (working with families across Sussex in need of support).

Separate from this allocation list, is the **Off The Fence Trust** (working towards an end to social and spiritual poverty in Brighton and Hove), to which we donate our collections from the Christmas services. In addition, many individuals and Home Groups have supported in various ways the **Samara's Aid Appeal** (working to relieve suffering through the provision of humanitarian and medical aid in Syria), our support beginning with a personal connection to Samara Levy.

Annual donations to the five charities are thus made 'automatically' from the income of the church which is largely generated by the giving of church members. It is only right, therefore, that we should review from time to time our charities policy. If anyone has any views they would like express on this issue, or suggestions of other possible recipients (especially if there is a personal connection with a church member), please have a word with a member of the PCC.



WORLD DAY OF PRAYER Service at All Saints Lindfield

Friday 1st March was the World Day of Prayer and services were held all around the globe – part of a great wave of prayer, beginning as the sun rose over Samoa and ending some 38 hours later back in the Pacific, as the sun set over American Samoa. Prayers and worship were shared with people in over 120 countries and islands around the world.

Each year the service is put together by a different country and this year it was written by the women of Slovenia – one of the smallest

and youngest countries in Europe.



Five ladies from one of the Home Groups at All Saints led the service, on the theme of "Come – Everything is Ready!" and centre stage was a table prepared for a celebration. It was laden with symbolism, with a white tablecloth (i.e. this was a special meal), a vase

containing red carnations (symbol of celebration) and rosemary, bread in a basket (poteeka is a national speciality and Slovenian biscuits are given as gifts eg. at a wedding, and as an expression of love), a bowl of grapes (Slovenia is a wine producing country), water, salt and a ceramic bowl.

The service began with 5 brief stories representing the difficulties of being a refugee and migrant worker; of juggling the burdens of raising a family and needing to work at the same time; of being elderly and isolated, with little or no support; of living with the disruptive effects of alcohol or violence in the family; and of being from an ethnic minority and feeling excluded and marginalised or experiencing financial hardship.


Prayers for all living in circumstances like these were said and summed up by "daring to hope for a new day when all will build relationships based on justice, peace and love".

The service included a Reflection on Luke 14, given by Antonia, a member of the All Saints Ministry team. This was based on the

story of the rich man who prepared a banquet and invited many guests, only for the guests to make lame excuses for not coming. They were too busy, distracted by their own agendas or pleasures. The rich man then invited in all the poor, the vulnerable, the homeless, the marginalised and those on the edge of society. These are the people that Jesus shared time, food and love with and the call is for Christians to do the same.

A special painting had been done for the 2019 World Day of Prayer service by Slovenian artist Rezka Arnus. It is based on the story in Luke 14.

God's invitation is to an abundant feast; a generous celebration offered in love. The story ends with a warning to those who were originally invited; that they should not be complacent – they will be the ones who will miss out.

MISSION FOCUS

IMARA-UGANDA EDUCATION FUND

In February Sylvia Jarrett and I were in Uganda struggling with the sweltering heat at a time when those of you in England were facing storms and even snow. It was the start of the new school year and it is the time when we interview for new scholarships. This year the charity has awarded three new scholarships. The children's stories are heart breaking.



Yafesi is 13 years old and the youngest in a family of four orphan boys. The oldest, Joseph, dropped out of primary school and learnt to be a mechanic. He struggles to pay school fees for two of his brothers and to earn enough to feed them all once a day. When we visited the

home there was a little dried sweet potato and half a pot of beans in one of the huts.

Calvin is also 13 years old. He shares a small hut with his uncle and two other children. The children sleep on a straw mat on the floor. The roof of the hut is in need of repair and will leak when the rains come. Calvin lives with his grandparents, peasant farmers, who have eleven children of their own. His father died and his mother remarried and is unable to care for Calvin.

Before we left Uganda, Yafesi and Calvin were settling into a primary school in Lira as boarders. As well as an education, they will receive three meals a day and will sleep on bunk beds.

A few days after we met the two boys, we learnt about Elizabeth, a 14-year old girl who had completed primary school but her family did not have the means to send her to secondary school. Her primary school head teacher, Sister Susan, had been praying for help for Elizabeth and she took us to meet her. Elizabeth's mother



left her husband and six children when the youngest was only a few months old. Last year one of the children became ill and died and not long after that their father also died. Before he died, he asked Sister Susan if she would look out for his remaining five children. They now live with their uncle and his wife and an 85- year-old

grandmother. As subsistence farmers, it is hard for the family to raise enough money for food and school fees and they were delighted when we said we would help. Elizabeth has started secondary school and perhaps one day she will realize her dream to be a nurse.

We enjoyed spending time with all the Imara scholars and encouraging them to do their best. One of them, Jaspher, is waiting for the results of his final exams for a Certificate in Electrical Installations. His plan is to work until August and then to resume his studies by taking the lecturer's course in electrical installations. He rarely talks to us about his abduction by the LRA rebels as a 10year-old orphan, sleeping in the bush at night, or the 2 years he spent with the rebels. While he was with us, a helicopter flew overhead. Jaspher told us that during the insurgency there were many. The army used helicopters to seek out the rebels and when they saw them, they would shoot. The children learnt to zigzag in and out until they found a place to hide. Jaspher told us how he was separated from children he knew in case they should plot together to escape. Those children never returned home. As he spoke of those times, he became unsettled, fearful, remembering. He doesn't like to think of those times. They have passed and now things are different. He is enthusiastic about his course, his work prospects, his hopes for the future. He amazes us with his positive outlook.

The Imara-Uganda scholars often ask us to send their greetings to people in the UK so I will add their grateful thanks to ours for all the financial and prayer support we receive and for the encouragement that means so much to us.

Bellringing at St. Peter's

It will surely have been noticed that, for some time now, our bells have not been heard regularly before normal services.

While we always manage to have them rung for special services, weddings and other occasions, regular Sunday ringing has become nearly impossible due to a temporary lack of local bellringers. This is not uncommon – villages like ours, with poor public transport, few job opportunities for young people and high accommodation costs are experiencing a dearth of both young people with time to take up and commit to local activities while at the same time the adult population seem to have such busy lifestyles not to allow time for additional interests.

Our neighbours at St. Margaret's, West Hoathly are in a similar position so we are currently working together in order to maintain bellringing as far as is possible and also to train learners - the ultimate aim of course being to restore to full membership both our towers and ensure all services are properly covered.

At present we alternate our ringing practices so that each Thursday evening we either ring in Ardingly or at West Hoathly and, in this way, with our own bellringers, West Hoathly's and visiting ringers from nearby villages, we always have enough ringers to ensure we make progress with our own skills and also train new ringers.

Recently we have attracted several new members and these are gradually increasing our membership but mostly they are from the West Hoathly Area and therefore likely to swell that tower's team in the first instance (although we shall doubtless still be able to utilise them when we need help as indeed we do the same for them).

St. Peter's, Ardingly really would like to attract anyone who may wish to learn this fascinating art which is very much part of our English heritage in the service of the church. It does not require physical strength, mathematical or musical skills and is suitable for any age from about 12 years and over. Once learned, bellringing is something that will stay with you (like riding a bike) for ever more and you will find that you are welcome in any bell tower, anywhere in the world.

'In His Name' – Go into all the world Diocesan Healing Conference – 2nd March 2019

This was for me a day of real hope. Keynote speaker, Rosemary Phillips, of the Lazarus Healing Trust in Worthing, was quiet and undemonstrative, very 'normal', yet her stories of healings were remarkable and challenging. Her very matter-of-factness made what she said the more compelling.

Sue Scott, one the Lewes Prison Chaplaincy team, recounted a recent experience when a guy in prison had a tumour on his neck. She asked him "Would you like Jesus to heal you?" he answered "Yes please". She prayed for him but saw nothing, but by the time He had returned to his wing it had completely gone! (It was an abscess on his tooth.)

There was immense encouragement in hearing of the work of Brighton Healing Rooms (which meets in Costa Coffee, Western Road, on Friday mornings!) – see their website www.healingroomsbrighton.org.uk for more details of who they are and what God has been doing through them.

At the Chanctonbury Churches, the team at the healing centre, through faithful prayer and listening to God, have seen some remarkable healings.


Giles Carpenter, vicar of St Johns Meads in Eastbourne, ran a session on grief and loss. Gina Paul writes:

I attended the seminar run by Revd Giles Carpenter. He was focussing on grief and loss and how we can insulate ourselves from pain, even denying it in our human lives. Not allowing the Holy Spirit to work in these deep areas in us means that we can become spiritually and emotionally unstable. I found the talk very useful and practical. When I got home I sent off for a book that he recommended to shed further light on this sensitive subject.

We were encouraged to be bold in praying for others, never to give up when healing did not appear to take place, because Jesus commanded us to pray, and keep praying. We have an amazing God, who longs to bring us healing of heart, mind and body!

MEANINGFUL CHOCOLATE GOES PLASTIC FREE

If you are trying to help the planet by reducing your use of plastic, and if you buy Easter eggs, you'll be pleased to know that the company



producing the Real Easter Egg, which is made of Fairtrade chocolate and supports charitable projects, have produced the Original and Dark eggs in plastic free packaging. The Real Easter Egg is the only one which has a copy of the Easter story in the box. As at 1st March more than 1,000,000 eggs had been sold – such a success that the production of Fairtrade chocolate has moved to the UK. Over £275,000 has been raised so far from sales for charitable causes.

DITCHING PLASTICS



The Church of England is urging Christians to give up single use plastics during Lent, in a bid to cut the environmental damage it can cause. Worshippers have been offered tips to cut plastic use for each day up to Easter, such

as choosing a refillable fountain pen over a plastic ballpoint pen and buying music electronically rather than on CD. The calendar of tips can be found online at www.churchcare.co.uk/shrinking-the-footprint and include suggestions such as taking your own reusable bags for shopping, using a bamboo toothbrush, buying bread that is not pre-packaged, taking your own toiletries to hotels rather than using the free travel size bottles, and taking your own coffee cup when going out for a coffee mid-morning. It's all about raising our awareness of how much we rely on single-use plastics and challenging ourselves to see where we can reduce that use. It ties in closely with our calling as Christians to care for God's creation.

Pre-school News
