

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends

The summer is for many of us a moment to pause. It's a moment to take a break. A time perhaps to live the actual moment and to remember as the Bible teaches us that: "there is a time for everything, and a



season for every activity under heaven" [Ecclesiastes 3:1]. Words that remind me that it is God who has appointed the times and seasons, the events of our lives, happy and the sad, easy and the difficult. So, words that on the one hand can bring us worry but words that ought on the other hand to bring us hope. Because they are words that remind us that God is in control. So, we need to make the best of everything that is happening right now.

Of course, sometimes you may wonder about that. It's easy to doubt that God has it all together when you maybe look at what is going on in the world around or where your own life has descended into what may feel so much like chaos. Sometimes it can look to us as though God isn't doing all that well at all. But however things may appear, I still believe that the truth is that God has always got everything under control and that God always has a purpose in everything that he does - even if we sometimes have a tough time understanding what that purpose is. As the apostle Paul writes in his letter to the Christians in first century Rome: "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose" [Romans 8: 28].

The secret is, I think, to discover, accept and appreciate God's perfect timing and to remember too, that we live in a world of change. The evidence of change is all around us. Spring becomes summer. Summer will give way to the autumn and

then autumn in its turn will give way to the winter. But in all of that change we can still hold on to the knowledge that God is in control and that actually change can be very good indeed. After all, change helps us to learn and to adapt and to grow inside. And change can stretch us and challenge us by causing us to grow through the trials and tribulations of life. Change can also keep us from getting bored. Are you the same person that you were ten years ago, or five years ago, or even one year ago?

The one constant of course, is the one who is in control of everything. God does not change. And that means that we can count on him always to be with us and to do the right thing: "He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the hearts of men; yet they cannot fathom what God has done from beginning to end" [Ecclesiastes 3:11]. God has set everything for its time so take the time to enjoy yourself. Make the best of each event and of each season of change. Enjoy your family and your home, your health, and your holidays. Enjoy coming to church. After all, God has made everything beautiful in his time and even the painful things are set in place by God. Sometimes all we can see is the middle of God's work and not the end but he knows the beginning from the end and he has each of us just where he wants us.

So, take some time this summer to enjoy the moment. And hold on in trust in every moment to God who is in control. Hold on to the one who loves us and who promises that where we trust in him, he will provide for all of our needs.



NEWS FROM JONNY AND BETH in THE GAMBIA

Hello!

We have often been touched to hear of how Ardingly folk follow our news from here in the Gambia, and pray for us and our ministry. That has been a source of deep encouragement. We are approaching a big transition, and so are glad for this opportunity to fill you in.

You may recall Jonny moved here back in 2015 to join the teaching faculty at Servants of the Word (SOW), a small Bible School. Since then he has been teaching various courses on discipleship and preaching. In 2017 we married, and Beth came and joined in, particularly getting alongside women and training people to lead children's work that both creates fun and teaches the good news about Jesus clearly. It has been our greatest desire, through all we do, to see Gambians embrace the wonderful life-giving and life-transforming truths of God's word, which are sadly so often buried beneath lies and confusion.

Very shortly we will be returning to the UK though, where Jonny will serve as Assistant Minister at Christ Church Balham (CCB) in London, and Beth will continue to pursue counselling training, whilst throwing herself into the church. We will be very sad to leave behind dear people and valuable work in the Gambia. But two particular truths give us comfort and hope:

1. God is in control

Jesus promised, "I will build my church" (Matthew 16:18). It's very easy to function with too high a view of ourselves. God really doesn't need us! But he chooses to use us. It's been a privilege to

be used by him here. But we know that, as we leave, he will continue to use others, to keep fulfilling his great plans and purposes - people coming to know Jesus and growing as disciplemaking disciples of him.

2. Our partnership continues

The Apostle Paul wrote to some friends, "I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel" (Philippians 1:5). We have been so thankful for people thousands of miles away in the UK, who have partnered with us - praying, encouraging, supporting. God's design is for ministry to flourish through such partnership. We are 100% committed to continuing to partner with God's work in the Gambia. So we are thrilled that CCB already has an established and strong partnership with SOW! We will be apart but still a part!

So we thank God for these comforting truths. Please pray that we would live and serve more and more with the joy and freedom that comes from knowing that **God really is in control**. And please pray for our **ongoing partnership** - that we would quickly find ways of both encouraging the church in Balham through what's going on in the Gambia, and supporting our friends and colleagues on the ground in the Gambia.

FLOWER HEADS GALORE!



Last Tuesday saw Margaret and I wending our way to Arundel to see the Corpus Christi carpet of flowers. We had been for a couple of years running and seen the completed carpet and this year decided we would like to see it in the making. After a sandwich in the car at the car park at the top of Houghton Hill where we admired the fabulous view, we arrived at the Cathedral to find the aisle covered in paper with the pattern chalked out on it and people in various stages of

bending and on all fours! The Cathedral was afloat with Chrysanthemums galore! These being placed in the appropriate places according to their colours. Some of the greenery (conifer clippings from the castle gardens) had already been laid the night before but the flowers are all placed on the Tuesday and the carpet was due to be completed by 5.00pm!! What a challenge and back breaking's not the word! 401 bunches of Chrysanthemums had been purchased from Holland, each bunch being 5 stems and each stem having approximately 5 flowers (work that one out!) and volunteers patiently sit and snip off all the heads!

There is a small team of people who organise it all and the rest is

done by volunteers. One lady had been doing it for 47 years! And her mum before her, who used to sit snipping flowers whilst rocking her daughter's pram beside her! The carpet has been made every year since 1877 (except during WW1)!

It was fascinating watching them all at work and after a cuppa in the pub next door we returned to the cathedral at 5.00pm.



The fragrance hit us as we entered and true enough the carpet was complete! A most wonderful sight!

My prayer that night was "Thank you Lord for the beauty of your creation that we witnessed today, for getting us safely there and back and for the companionship that we have enjoyed along the way" What a great God we have!

BIG CHURCH DAY OUT 25th May 2019



The Big Church Day Out is a Christian music festival, held in the magnificent grounds of Wiston House, near Steyning, and tens of thousands of Christians gather to enjoy music, have fun, worship and be informed and encouraged. This year it took place over the weekend of 25th/26th May and all ages and all denominations were there! It's a great weekend for families and you could camp, glamp or attend on a daily basis.

Some of the biggest names in the Christian music world were performing and leading worship on 4 different stages. There were also fairground rides, 'leap of faith' jumps, archery, TV and Radio show tents and many other events.

It wasn't just fun though – the enormous "Christian Bazaar" was hugely informative, populated by scores of stands, with representatives from many of the big missions, charities, Bible training Colleges, support organisations relating to fostering, food disorders and other conditions, plus support for children in Russia and Brazil. Christian holiday companies were represented, as were Christians in the Forces and Christians in the Police. There was also an opportunity to have a prophetic painting done by a Theology tutor from Chester University. And for those who wanted to shop, there were stands selling Christian books, cards and unusual gifts from places like the Philippines and Africa.

It was big, it was loud, it was buzzingly enjoyable – and everyone was friendly and smiling! The event was also blessed by good weather, which helped everyone to have a really good time.

SAMARAS AID: "Rebuilding the Ruins"

Samara's book "Rebuilding the Ruins" by Hodder and Stoughton, is being launched at St Peter's Church, Brighton, on Sunday 21st July. Samara will also be coming to St Peter's Centre in Ardingly on 28th September at 7.00pm to tell her story and promote her book.

The book is a powerful testimony to how she responded in love to God's call to provide medical and humanitarian aid for the people of Syria, and of the truly amazing guidance, provision and protection of God along the way. Hodder & Stoughton summarise it like this: "A mother's calling tells the story not only of how this work developed from nothing, but also of Samara's own internal journey: what she has learnt about stepping out in faith and listening to God, and of how he uses the ordinary to achieve the extraordinary. Part testimony and part sharing, this book will inspire all who see the daily headlines about the situation in Syria and wonder what possible difference they can make. It is a story of hope, and of how in our weakness and inability God does the miraculous with whatever we can offer."

Proceeds from the sale of her book will go towards the costs of building a new hospital in Syria which will treat anyone free of charge, regardless of their faith.

The humanitarian aid operation is still on hold at the moment, but it is hoped that it will be able to resume quite soon. However, due to Customs regulations in Syria, it is almost certain that only new items will be able to be sent and also perhaps things like dignity bags and school bags. This will be confirmed in due course.

In the meantime, other projects are ongoing, such as the support for Orphans and Widows, and the charity is in the process of taking on 30 new families who need support.



Sometimes prayers are answered in amazing ways!

As part of the "Thy Kingdom Come" prayer campaign between Ascension and Pentecost I [Sue] chose to support Chaplains in the Forces and every day I received 3 reports by email of situations that certain Chaplains have faced. One Army padre sent this inspirational true story of how God answered his prayers for a severely injured soldier:

"One of my soldiers was involved in a very serious motorcycle accident and was in a coma and on life-support. He was not expected to live and his family were brought to the hospital to say their goodbyes, I arrived about half an hour ahead of the family and Unit Welfare Officer and was allowed to see the soldier. Standing at the foot of his bed I prayed silently in my heart that he would be restored to good health for the sake of his wife and small children. One week later I was going to visit the soldier in another hospital where he was convalescing. He was not only convalescing but was actually outside walking around, and when he saw me at a distance, he called out that he had been waiting to see me to explain something quite unbelievable. He told me that in the hospital a week earlier he had heard my prayer and that it was that which - to use his own words - 'brought me back'. I immediately said that was impossible as I hadn't prayed audibly but silently in my heart. He replied, 'you don't understand. I was looking down on myself lying in the bed and was on my way out, when you prayed. I heard your prayer and it was that which brought me back.'

I don't even begin to understand what happened exactly that day, but I believe that God intervened in a very powerful way. In the soldier's ongoing recovery, we talked much about God's plan for his life, and I leave the rest with the Lord."
