RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I've been reading what is described by its author [Tom Wright] a biography of the Apostle Paul. It is excellent, and it has reminded me that Paul was a man of unshakeable contentment in Christ. His personal circumstances varied and were frequently very testing [take a look at 2 Corinthians 11: 25 – 28 some time and see what I mean!] but still he held on to his contentment through Christ who always gave him strength. Indeed, he even remained content in Christ whilst facing execution because he knew that union with the living Christ is the secret of being content and the source of our abiding strength in everything.



By contrast, in the western world self-centredness is a boom industry. But Paul was clear and we need to be clear as well. We are not self-sufficient but Christ sufficient. And no matter what challenges may lie ahead as we turn into a new year and a new decade, Jesus Christ is big enough to meet them. To be content in need or in plenty, in whatever situation we face is not the product of human skill. The secret isn't us; it is Jesus *in* us. Because the strength that Christ gives us is sufficient for anything we face in life.

Of course, to change our understanding from the self-centred ways taught by the world to the Christ centred way of God as exhibited by Paul takes discipline, it takes growth and maturity, it takes trust and it also takes time as well. In Christ, Paul learnt the discipline of self and to be content with what he had as well as a deep trust in God to provide all that he really did need. He was contented because God is trustworthy: "I can do everything through him who gives me strength" (Philippians 4:13). And that is true for us as well. In Christ we too can meet all circumstances with contentment.

"My God", says Paul, "will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus". And he will meet our need to the full as well. His supply will not be limited to the size of our need but according to his riches in Christ, which, and to borrow Jesus' words

in Luke 6 we can be assured will be: "A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, poured into your lap."

IMARA-UGANDA EDUCATION FUND

In November I was in Uganda with fellow trustee Sylvia.

Among the highlights of this trip were visits to a school we are beginning to support, where children with visual impairment - many totally blind - learn alongside sighted children. It has been lovely to see how the children are encouraged to support one another.



We have recently provided the school with Braille machines and we took with us several books for the school library, some of them in Braille. The children were able to demonstrate their skill in reading and writing in Braille. We have been told that many children with disabilities are

locked away out of sight at home. Theirs is a dark world in more ways than one. With love and encouragement, the children in the school we visited grow in confidence. They begin to feel valued.

Our newest scholarship child is Harriett. Harriett was born sighted. When the LRA rebels were active in the area, Harriett and her family moved into a refugee camp. It is not clear what happened but while they were there Harriett lost her sight.



Her father died and Harriett and her mother moved in with her uncle and his family.



She longed to go to school like other children. She is 14 years old but has only spent about 2 years in school. Sometimes she is sent home because her mother cannot afford the fees. When she is in school she works hard and is doing really well. We visited Harriett at home and met her family. Now she can attend school regularly. We have high hopes for this bright and chatty little girl and we will follow her progress with interest.

The school is very grateful to all those of you who helped raise money for Braille machines by sponsoring Phil Payne who took part in the Great South Run. They are also very grateful for the books that were donated for their school library. I add my sincere thanks to theirs.

Ardingly Climate Change Group

Catastrophic bush fires in Australia; 92% of December's normal UK rainfall falling in one day; late leaf-fall and early flowering of Spring plants; the very late breeding and hibernation of hedgehogs These are just some of the events this winter which are being linked to climate change.

Climate change is caused by a build-up of a range of gases in the atmosphere and the best known of these is carbon dioxide. These gases create a warming effect similar to being in a greenhouse, hence the term "greenhouse gases".

All of us are being urged and challenged to make a difference to the way we live and therefore to our environment so Ardingly now has a Climate Change group which is looking at ways in which Ardingly residents can do more to reduce our 'environmental footprint' and improve our local environment.

Many people are already taking lots of small steps to help, and every week new ideas are being found. Everything we buy has to be produced, transported and disposed of, so one of the areas the Climate Change group is looking at is re-use and recycling. Did you know, for instance, that Amazon delivery vehicles emitted 44 million tonnes of carbon dioxide in December alone (equivalent to the total annual emissions of Denmark)? The group has some suggestions about re-use and recycling locally which you can find on pages 10 to 12. Please do take a look as there may be things listed which you didn't know about!

St Peter's Church has offered to be a collection point for unwanted or used inkjet cartridges in the village, so there is now a tub just inside the main door where you can deposit these, rather than sending them off for recycling in a plastic bag, or putting them in landfill. Hopefully some cartridges will generate a small amount of money which will be given to charity.



RECYCLING AND RE-USE – some suggestions:

Old metal and clean tin foil: Give to Steve Doerr (01444 892431). He collects and sells it to raise funds for the Old Jeshwang Maternity Clinic in the Gambia

Milk bottle tops: Give to Jill Veasey (892442). She passes them on to the Trefoil Guild who pass them on for recycling into things like wheelchairs.

Milk and juice bottle tops: give to the Bay Tree café in the Orchards, Haywards Heath

Old Biros and highlighters: take to Cloughs, Sunte Avenue, Lindfield, for recycling

Wool: packs suitable for knitting can be given to Sue Laker (01444 892117) to be made into garments for Samara's Aid. Smaller balls can be given to Margaret in the Post Office to make into cat blankets.

Very old towels, or blankets – Horsham & District Cat's Protection <http://www.cats.org.uk/horsham> and some local vets can use these (check first)

Unwanted pillows, duvets, bedding, towels and clothing in reasonable condition: give to the homeless through either Open House in Crawley or Off the Fence in Brighton

Unwanted new toiletries: Kleinwort in Haywards Heath are glad of these for patients who have no family to shop for them.

Sheets, towels and clothing which are not suitable for anyone to use can be given to Help the Aged for sale as rag.

Bric-a-brac, DVD's, CD's and clothing in decent condition – most Charity shops will take these

Books: Charity shops or the 2nd hand bookshop at Nyman's. (<https://www.nationaltrust.org.uk/nymans/features/the-second-hand-bookshop>) Proceeds go to Nymans.

Clothing (decent quality) – put in the clothing bank eg. at Sainsbury's or give to Caroline Steer (892108) for FSW (Family Support Work)

Shoes – put in the shoe bank at the Post Office

Computers: check online as Computer Aid International may be able to take them

Glasses (spectacles): take to Boots in the Orchards or send to Vision Aid Overseas

Batteries: recycle at Sainsbury's and other shops

Archbishop of Canterbury's New Year message:

In his New Year Message, recorded aboard an RNLI lifeboat, Archbishop Justin Welby invites us to follow Jesus' example and take the risk of connecting with others.

The Royal National Lifeboat Institution's station in Dover, part of the Diocese of Canterbury which I serve, faces the busy grey seas of the English Channel. As we wonder how we are going to start healing some of the divisions that we've seen over recent years, the sort of people at this lifeboat station are signs of hope.

I've met some of the over 70 volunteers who are involved in keeping this station operational twenty-four hours a day, three hundred and sixty-five days a year. It's not just a group of people working together. It's a family. The sea-going crew include a student, a train driver, a chef, an electrician. The youngest is seventeen, the oldest is sixty-two. When their pagers go off - day or night - they're prepared to risk everything to rescue whoever needs their help.

There are so many ways we can connect with others. It could be by joining a voluntary organisation or a charity. It may be sorting food in a food bank. Or joining a lifeboat crew.

When we hear someone described as 'a Good Samaritan', we think about that person taking the time to help another. But it's also a story told by Jesus about someone taking the risk of reaching out to another who was very different to them. Yes, the person needed help – but they also needed connection.

Christian faith doesn't promise us a comfortable life. Christ promises us hope, meaning, peace, purpose and joy – but not comfort! It's about following in the footsteps of Jesus, who took the risk of connecting with people who were separated from him.

We rightly think of lifeboat crews as heroic, although they may be embarrassed to hear that. Yet every time we reach out and connect with someone, it is an act of heroism. Don't underestimate it. It could be someone you know. It could be someone you've always wanted to connect with but never have. It could be someone you really disagree with.

Let's go for a heroic New Year's Resolution. Let's resolve to reconnect. To reach out to just one person we don't know, or from whom we have drifted apart. Pick one person. Pick up the phone. Send them a text. Meet them for a cup of tea. Make that connection. Let's begin cementing our unity one brick at a time.

For this new year – and this new decade – I pray that we find the hope offered in Jesus Christ.

May I wish you all a happy New Year.



The Parish Council has now submitted its comments to MSDC in response to the Public Consultation on SA25 (the development of the Red Car Park at the Showground) and a copy of these comments are available on the Parish council website www.ardingly.org or from the Clerk directly.

The Parish Council is aware of the possible impact the potential development could have on the Village of Ardingly and continues to liaise with both MSDC and the Showground to protect the best interests of the village.

Wellbeing and Events

The Parish Council has created a Wellbeing and Events working party to identify events within the community that could benefit from Parish Council support. The Parish Council is keen to hear from Parishioners that currently lead any events that improve the wellbeing of Parishioners and would welcome Parish Council support with their event. Equally the working party will look to identify areas where there is no provision for particular parishioners within the village and work with volunteers to create new events. The Working Party will be meeting for its initial meeting at the end of January. Ardingly College Planning Application DM/19/5212

Construction of a new 193 space car park and new vehicular access from College Road to serve Ardingly College, along with associated landscaping

The college has recently submitted a planning application to Mid Sussex District Council (MSDC) for the development of a 193 bay car park at the top end the field in-between the college entrance and Reservoir Road.

The College has designed the car park to screen it from all viewpoints, bar a glimpsed view of the entrance when passing on College Road and various ecological measure are proposed to enhance the area. In addition, the college has taken steps to reduce traffic by other means such as introducing car sharing apps and increasing the school bus services. Full details of the application are contained within the documents on the MSDC planning portal. The Parish Council has attended a site visit and will be submitting comments to MSDC, however if Parishioners wish to make comments on this application they can do so as follows: <https://pa.midsussex.gov.uk/online-applications/>

Changes to the use of household waste recycling sites

Since 1st December 2019 West Sussex County Council have introduced new procedures at their recycling sites (Burgess Hill and East Grinstead). Anyone using a recycling site will now need to provide proof of residency in West Sussex showing both a photo and address. Access to sites will be denied if you do not have proof of address or live outside of West Sussex.

The Council have introduced these changes because they have strong evidence showing that people living outside West Sussex are using our household waste recycling sites. This has resulted in West Sussex County Council paying substantial disposal charges applied to their waste, and increased congestion from the extra traffic coming to our sites.

Ardingly Showground have put some advice for residents on Facebook warning that they will be having events at the Showground on the following dates which will include some loud bangs: **4th-5th February and 13th March**.

The events will take place during the day and be finished by 6pm.


