

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The month of November draws us into a season of remembrance that begins with a moment to remember those dear to us who we have loved and lost. Our 'Open to God' service, on the evening of Sunday 1st November at 5.30pm, is an opportunity for us to remember with thanks those we have known and loved who have died. It will be a moment to give thanks for all they have



meant to us and a time to hear afresh of God's love and help and strength as we continue the journey of life without them. The service will include an opportunity for us to name aloud those we want to remember. I know that for some this is difficult and that there may be others who cannot attend the service but who might still wish for their loved one to be remembered in this way. Either way, if you would like me to read out the name of someone dear to you and on your behalf, please let me know and I will be pleased to do so.

The following week we have our annual Service of Remembrance (8th November at 10.30am). Each year I am delighted by the number of people who choose to attend this service to remember with thanks those who have given their lives in the service of their country. The current pandemic restrictions mean that we are not able to welcome so many into the church building this year, so we have decided instead to hold the service in the Recreation ground. It will be open air, with plenty of space for all and quite short. Beginning at 10.30 it will end at 11.00 am with two minutes of silence and the Act of Remembrance. I hope that the weather will be kind to us. However, I am sure that like me, you will understand how important it is that despite all that is going on at present, our community still has the opportunity to come together and remember those who gave so much in the cause of peace and peace-making.

Because peace-making is always costly. I remember hearing a former colleague preach a sermon in which he reminded us all that it is underlying negative attitudes that are at the root of all human conflict; negative attitudes towards others or about others and their ways. And so, he encouraged us to challenge those negative attitudes, especially when they occur in ourselves, to challenge that self-assertiveness and divisive, critical spirit that so easily divides people into 'them' and 'us'. That has stayed with me and comes back to me again each year at this season of remembrance. It can be costly, it can be hard and at times it might be difficult, but true peace starts in us, and in our determination to count others 'in' rather than counting them 'out'.

True peace starts when we break down those barriers between people - whether caused by race, creed or colour or by whatever difference we may think we have - and remember instead, as the apostle Paul writes in his letter to the Galatians, that now 'there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for [we] are all one in Christ Jesus'.

It may sometimes be difficult to be a peacemaker. Christ has himself shown us that. But we must always be prepared at whatever the cost, to give peace a chance. Nothing less is worthy in our response to "Remembrance Sunday" – and nothing less is worthy of a child of God.

WARDENS WORDS

Finance Update

Having shared last year's figures at the APCM, the PCC thought it would be helpful to give an update on how we are managing our finances in the light of COVID-19.



Firstly, I would like to thank all those who have continued to give during this year. This has helped us significantly, but things remain very tight for us as a church. Like for like income has seen a reduction in collections, envelope giving, Centre Hire, etc meaning that our income is approximately £8000 less than it was at the same time last year (the end of September).

At the same time, our outgoings have not reduced. Despite careful control over expenditure, we still have our bills to pay and are committed to paying as much of our Parish Contribution as we possibly can. This ultimately means that we could see a sizeable shortfall at the end of this year, which will mean using more of our very limited reserves in order to balance the books.

Without additional income, the PCC will need to make some very difficult decisions as we begin to budget for next year.

If you feel able to help in any way, I will be happy to speak to you (in confidence) about this. Please also pray for an easing of the financial challenges that we are facing over the coming months.

NEWS FROM MISSIONARY FRIENDS

B & A normally work in South East Asia. Here is their latest news:

"In more ways than one, many people in this world seem to be on the same boat. Many of us live in uncertainty. So much of what we used to consider normal is not as normal anymore. So many of our plans are on hold. So many activities have to be cancelled. It is not easy, but one thing is for sure, God is faithful. We will see and celebrate the goodness of God even in our most difficult situation.

This is a lesson we are learning as we wait for life to get back to normal. We have been in Europe since April, expecting to stay here only till June or August, hoping that we could go back to Southeast Asia before our permit to stay expired. Yet it was not meant to be. We are still here with no clear view of when we can go back. We try our best to be productive, joyful and useful even in this seemingly remote village where we are, but with some anxieties about possibly waiting here till winter. Yet our loving Father has His wonderful ways of encouraging us and drawing us to Himself. We can taste and see that the Lord is good!

After some delay, our children are now back in South East Asia and have resumed their schooling there. They have finished the obligatory 2-week quarantine at a designated hotel and are back to school again. We are so thankful that they can go to school again (they have face-to-face lessons already) and have more structured days and can be with their friends. This will be our son's last year of school. Our daughter has got three more years to go. Please pray that they'll be able to catch up with their lessons, and for protection as we most likely won't see them until next summer.

As for us, we continue our online meetings with our teammates. Four new team members had to postpone their arrival due to the pandemic, as the country closed its borders and is not issuing any new visas. This has been hard for them, especially for those who had resigned from their jobs just before their move to SE Asia, only to be told that borders were closed.

At the time of writing, most of the big cities in the country where we are right now have a growing number of Covid-19 cases. Yet we feel safe because we live in the countryside, but need to be extra careful

because we live with our 81-year old parents. We are thankful that we can serve them in practical ways, doing their shopping, taking them to their appointments, doing some cooking and running other errands for them.

Thank you again for coming alongside us in prayer. These are difficult times for many of us but God's truth remains the same in good times and in bad. May we all know the comforting presence of our Father, the liberating love of the Son and the empowering fellowship of the Spirit.

Looking after wildlife during the winter with a Bug Hotel

Creating a Bug Hotel in a flowerpot is one way in which we can help minibeasts such as ladybirds and bumblebees, who right now will be looking for a place to hibernate during the winter. Here is how you can do this:

You will need a medium sized flower pot and small amounts of a variety of natural materials such as pine cones, twigs, moss, stones, straw, Autumn leaves and bits of dead wood.

Gather your materials and fill your plant pot with them. Find a quiet corner of the garden where you can place the Bug Hotel, and lay the pot on its side. Make sure some of the material is poking out of the pot onto the ground, so that little creatures can climb inside.

It's not recommended to place a bug hotel too near a vegetable garden!

ST CATHERINE'S HOSPICE

Due to coronavirus restrictions on meeting together, fundraising for many charities and hospices has dropped off in a big way. However, some people have found ingenious ways to continue fundraising. Here is how some 3 supporters are raising money for St Catherine's Hospice:



After recently paddling on a home made raft from Devizes to Chelsea, this trio of hospice supporters are setting sail again! Following a challenge from radio presenter Sam Pinkham, live on the Chris Evan's Breakfast Show, to tackle crossing the Solent next, Charles Reynolds and his friends Kit Burgess, and Jamie Pratt, three self-proclaimed 'muppets', have been getting their homemade raft ready for this ambitious challenge, and aim to set off on Thursday 15 October.

Charles said, "We don't underestimate this challenge. It was really hard to paddle our homemade raft against the light breezes on the river Thames. Now we're going to try and battle the waves and the wind and cross from Portsmouth to the Isle of Wight. It's going to be much more challenging - some say impossible - but we're optimistic and excited to give it our best go!

The only thing that's made us accept such a tough, and slightly ridiculous challenge, is that it's for such an amazing cause in memory of my father, Rob, who died in May this year after a short battle with cancer.

Everyone should have access to a hospice and its care when needed, but funding is short for these vital services. So off we go again to raise more money for St Catherine's!

And in addition to coffee mornings and cake bakes, some people have been very imaginative with their fundraising ideas:

One family began making face masks out of a late relative's old shirts and selling them – they raised over £5,000.



Two ladies knitted colourful dolls and animals and sold paintings, each raising £500 for the hospice.



And 16 runners participated in the virtual London Marathon, raising nearly £20,000 between them.

supporting vulnerable families in Sussex.

We are also collecting for the Shoe Box Appeal, which we have done for a number of years. The Christian Charity called Link to Hope is dedicated to rebuilding lives and communities in Eastern Europe by supporting education and social care projects in Romania, Moldova,

We encourage all our pupils to participate fully in the life of the school. This includes taking on leadership opportunities which are key to the smooth running of the school. CONGRATULATIONS TO PHIL!

On 26^{th} September Phil Payne did it! His challenge was to run the "double Everest". Everest would be 8,848m x 2 = 17,696 m. By running up and down Cob Lane 153 times Phil did MORE than a 'double Everest' by covering an additional 52m! (Cob Lane is 58m x 153 x 2 [up and down] = **17,748m**) It was an amazing feat of endurance which beats the current world record! He covered 108.8kms of running distance, which amounts to over two and a half marathons!





Phil is now a world record holder! All evidence of the run has been assembled and submitted to the Guinness Book of Records.

I would like to assure you that we are working hard to keep any period of closure to a minimum and we are currently investigating the options available which will enable us to reinstate a Post Office service to the local community. In exploring this, it is important that any future service is sustainable for the person operating the service, and for Post Office Limited."

We pray for all who suffer as a result of conflict, and for the service men and women who have died in the violence of war, each one remembered by and known to You;


For all those who are in danger this day;
