# **RECTOR'S LETTER**

Dear Friends,

There has been so much that has had to change this year already, and our celebration of Christmas will be no different. At the time of writing we are in our second lockdown which will hopefully have come to an end by early December, but who knows? And then I should



imagine, the restrictions we have known for most of the year will be back, but will they be tougher or will it be possible for them to be safely loosened, at least a little, so as to allow us to celebrate Christmas in some of the ways that are familiar? Again, who knows? What I do know is that for my family as for so many others, in the village and across the country, the 'rule of six' will pose a huge problem at Christmas as will the current restrictions on visiting elderly and much-loved relatives in care homes.

And then there's the Christmas services. Sadly, this year the guidelines prevent us from having a gathering around the tree in the village to watch as the lights are switched on whilst we sing familiar Christmas carols. Neither can we have our usual service of 'Carols by Candlelight' with music and readings to remind us of the Christmas story. For me, saddest of all, is that we can't share the excitement and fun of our Christingle service on Christmas Eve. We just cannot safely accommodate in accordance with the guidelines the usual numbers who gather for these services. Each are important occasions, because each draw so many of us, from across the village, to share and to celebrate together as a community, the message of Christ's birth at Christmas.

And that gathering as a community to remember and celebrate Christmas really must not change. So, with prayers for fine weather, let me invite you all to join us at 4.00pm on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> December on the Recreation Ground for a celebration of Christmas. There will be carols, a telling of the Christmas story, a chance to pray together for Christmas, for our families and for all of those across both country and world affected by the events of this year, and a chance, too, to think about light coming into darkness as we think about the message and meaning of the Christingle. This year we will have to ask you to bring your own Christingle, but we will put instructions on the church website and Facebook page in case you're not familiar with how to assemble it. And if you (or maybe even one of your children!) fancy coming along dressed as one of the characters from the nativity, then why not! The idea is that this will be fun, that this will be a moment of shared joy, that this will draw us all together in a community celebration of Christmas.

Because whilst so much has changed this year, the message of joy that is at the heart of Christmas will never change. The Bible reminds us that 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today, and forever'. This year has for so many been a time of stress and anxiety; of worry about health and safety; of unease and fear over job security; of mourning and tears over the loss of loved ones. But to all of us, the coming of Jesus Christ at Christmas means there is help for us in our need whatever that need may be. There is rest for the weary and burdened whatever may be causing that weariness, or however heavy the burden may seem. The coming of Christ at Christmas means that God is in control of this confused world. He is in control and he is sovereign over both the wider world and our personal world alike and his plans and purposes are good, his sovereignty is real and his timing in everything is impeccable. As the apostle Paul has written: "when the time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman." And that time had certainly come. The world needed Jesus at his birth just as the world and each one of us continue to need him today, to need the light that shines in the darkness. Where we place our faith and our trust in him, Jesus is that light and he is with us in everything hope for today and bright hope for tomorrow.

So, this Christmas let's try, despite all that is going on around us, to celebrate with joy the One who stepped into time and space to be with us and to bring us to Himself both now and for

all eternity. My hope and prayer are that every one of you will put your trust in Jesus Christ this festive season and that you will all enjoy a merry and peaceful Christmas and a very happy New Year.

# **CMS NEWS : HEATHER JOHNSTONE**

Dear friends, I decided to delay writing my link letter until I had news on when I could return to Tanzania. Days turned into weeks and weeks into months and months into many months, but finally I am delighted to share that my work permit has been approved at



long last! Praise the Lord. I must apply for a residence visa now which hopefully will be processed quickly (or at least more quickly than the work permit!). As of 1 October, international commercial travel recommenced for the first time since March, and my South African visa which was expiring on 31 October has been extended, so I am free to travel whenever I'm ready.

Tanzanian presidential elections take place on 28 October. My tentative plan is to spend a few days in Nairobi and then travel to Tanzania in early November (assuming my paperwork is in order by then!). Things are starting to happen, and as my vicar Sarah Guinness says, the timing seems to have been perfectly choreographed by God, which is so true and an image I love.

However, unfortunately the work permit is for one year only and my "final grant", which did deflate my euphoria significantly. Apparently, there is a new rule which caps work permits at five years and I have already had two two-year permits, hence the one year granted. Nevertheless, the labour ministry has said that at the end of the year Bishop George should write to the commissioner and they guarantee I will receive an exemption certificate and will be allowed to continue serving the Diocese of Mara.

I trust that God will continue choreographing the steps and moves in the ballet of my life and my ministry in Tanzania.

Our supporters dug deep and through generous donations we have been able to give every single Rehema employee (full-time or parttime, temporary or permanent) an investment of TZS 400,000. At a time when there is no work for our employees and no real idea when we might be able to re-open for trade, it was very important to be able to give everyone the opportunity to start their own small business so that they may provide for themselves and their families.

I am hearing wonderful success stories of their various endeavours but of course not everyone is going to be successful as an entrepreneur and some have been struggling to feed their families. We have arranged for regular food assistance for those who are falling through the cracks. Mostly we supply 40kg of maize meal which people use to make the Tanzanian staple, ugali. Furthermore, we have been able to be quite productive and have achieved a lot despite everything.

• We built a house for a young woman who was the victim of domestic abuse. Her husband used to regularly beat her and their children. She is now out of that toxic environment and she and the children are safe in their new home. The husband is living elsewhere with a second wife.

• We built toilets for the church community at a nearby village.



• Carpenters are currently making an additional 10 desks and 30 chairs for the nursery school at Nyambeshi.

• We enabled the church in Mkiringo to finish concreting their floor and buy chairs to use instead of using makeshift benches made from branches of trees that had been cobbled together.



I have kept myself busy in South Africa while waiting for the opportunity to return to Tanzania and have been volunteering for a fantastic project called 'Ladles of Love'. Danny, the founder, was determined to create a new kind of soup kitchen powered by love and offering comfort to fellow humans who have temporarily lost their way, which is something I fully subscribe to. Prior to lockdown, Ladles was serving soup and sandwiches to 200 needy people in Cape

Town every week. As the need has multiplied due to the economic fallout caused by the global pandemic, the project has grown exponentially and is now working with more than 110 NGOs (who each support a further 250 beneficiaries of their own) and supply food to numerous soup kitchens and shelters. They have served 6,300,000 meals since lockdown started.

It is often mistakenly called 'Ladies of Love', but as Danny said on International Women's Day, he is happy with that mistake as the project is blessed with a team of strong, capable women with big hearts and incredible energy who make up more than 80 per cent of the volunteers. I am privileged to have played a small part in this great project, making sandwiches and boiled eggs twice a week, and driving for them three times a week. I recently watched the film Pili, directed by Leanne Welham, and was blown away with how very true to life the film is. If you'd like to see what life is like for many Tanzanian women in rural Tanzania, this film is worth watching. It is available to buy or rent on Amazon or BFI Player. **Heather**

Some of you may be wondering about Christmas, which is rapidly approaching. We won't be able to hold our usual Christmas parties but we will still be distributing gifts to all the children we support, and families will still be receiving Christmas hampers. With the cold weather having arrived, fuel bills are a real worry for most of our families. If anybody in receipt of a winter fuel payment feels able to donate this to us so that we can help families who aren't eligible for this support, then we would be extremely grateful.

Thank you for all your continued support and prayers as we navigate these difficult times.

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# THE 'BIG SLEEP OUT' AND HOMELESSNESS

As Winter arrives and the weather gets colder and wetter the plight of the homeless is even more serious.

In October many people, including celebrities and bishops, participated in a "Big Sleep Out" to raise awareness of homelessness and raise funds for charities. It has become an annual event and would normally take place in public places (in 2017 the Bishop of Chichester, Rt Rev Martin Warner, took part!). This year, due to Covid restrictions, the event was held in people's gardens or homes.

Two local charities working to support the homeless are Open House in Crawley and Off the Fence in Brighton.

#### **OPEN HOUSE**

The staff at Open House in Crawley are getting ready for Christmas. As always, they are running a **Reverse Advent Calendar.** Every day, instead



of taking something out of an Advent Calendar, you put an item in, to help the homeless or disadvantaged. The items are put into a box and dropped off at Open House. The staff are also preparing to feed dozens of people on Christmas Day.

#### Crawley Open House statistics over the last full year:

Almost 16,000 visits to the Day Centre

1,328 food parcels given out

3,563 hours worked by volunteers

25,935 client contacts through the Day Centre, health advice and resettlement teams

182 hostel residents accommodated

The charity has also just announced the completion of the second stage of their redevelopment plans. Following the extension to the front of the hostel and day centre, they have now finished the conversion of upstairs offices into 8 flatlets. The 8 single rooms, arranged in 4 pairs, each share a self-contained bathroom pod and all share a communal kitchen and lounge area.

The rooms will provide the opportunity for residents to stay for a longer period of time than those who are living in the hostel accommodation. This provides an opportunity for a period of stability and growth where individuals can continue to receive support and help to more fully address issues that they may have faced in the past.

# OFF THE FENCE, BRIGHTON

In 1993, CEO Paul Young responded to the question, "When are Christians going to get off the fence and do something about social poverty?" This was when he



and his wife, Wendy, made the decision to go out into the streets of Brighton and Hove to help the most marginalized and vulnerable in the city.

Since then poverty has increased nationwide and Off The Fence has grown with it, helping people back to fulfilling and independent lives. They now operate across three main areas: homelessness, women at risk and schools & youth. They provide short and long-term solutions through 2 day centres, 3 outreach vans and 15 local schools. This work is supported by just over 150 trained volunteers, staff and interns.

**Project Antifreeze** provides food, hot drinks, sleeping bags and hygiene items to the homeless through evening outreach teams and a day centre on Portland Road. The charity also offers the support which service users need to find accommodation and keep it. Their aim is to help clients thrive, not just survive.

**Gateway Women's Centre** provides a welcoming, safe space for women going through a time of crisis or emotional difficulty. Trained staff are available to listen in a confidential and caring environment. Providing important support services as well as fun, community and friendship, the charity offers opportunities for women to improve self-confidence, develop life skills, build resilience and reduce isolation.

The **Schools Team** work currently works in 15 primary and secondary schools across the Brighton & Hove area, delivering weekly clubs, workshops and 1-1 support, as well as pioneering prayer and reflection spaces.

#### IDEAS FOR AN ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY CHRISTMAS

 Buy your Christmas tree from a local retailer and check that it has FSC (Forest Stewardship Council) or Soil Association certification. That means that it will have been grown sustainably. You could also buy a pot-grown tree to plant later.





2. Make your own indoor decorations or wreath using holly, ivy and other leaves, cones, grasses and berries (wear gloves when touching ivy as it can cause skin irritation).

3. Make your own Christmas tree decorations using coloured card, or plain card which you could decorate with eco-glitter or water-colour paint.

- 4. Use LED fairy lights, which consume less energy.
- 5. Make your own Christmas cards.
- 6. Consider wrapping your gifts with reusable wrapping materials and decorate them with a sprig of holly instead of using throwaway tags and ribbons. Remember, shiny or glittery paper is not recyclable.
- 7. Swap sticky tape for string or ribbon which can be used again
- 8. Either plant your Christmas tree in the garden or take it to a recycling centre when it's no longer needed.
- 9. If you have lots of left-overs after Boxing Day the BBC Good Food leftovers website has lots of ideas about what to do with them!

Village residents have been able to access the meetings too by getting a code from the Parish Clerk to give access. The following batteries can also be collected: 6V, D, C, AA, AAA, 9V, button and mobile phone batteries. These must be placed in a separate bag, tied and placed beside the black bin.
