### **RECTOR'S LETTER**

Dear Friends,

This time last year I was finalizing my plans for our Easter services and celebration when everything came to a shuddering halt with the first lockdown. I could not have imagined then that one year on my plans for Easter would still be affected by lockdown. But they are and we won't be able to celebrate Holy Week in quite the



way we have in previous years. However, the exceptionally good news is that from Easter Sunday the church building will be open again for our services as normal. We will still need to wear masks and be careful so as to allow others to have plenty of space, and we can't sing or share a coffee or indeed gather at all after the service. But we will be able to share the good news of Easter together and say (not shout!) 'Hallelujah – Praise the Lord!'

I could not have imagined either, just a year ago, how 'Zoom' would become so important in enabling us to continue worshipping together as a church family. But it has and it's been so good to meet and worship together over the last few weeks. Zoom will continue to keep us together now that we have a really good Wi-Fi link in the church. Those who are unable to come along to church and those who would prefer not to return just yet will still be able to worship with us via a Zoom link each Sunday at 10.30am. And of course, another benefit of Zoom is that if you want to invite family or friends to join us in our worship, from wherever in the country or the world, they can do so. All are always welcome.

Zoom will also be taking a part in our annual twenty-four hours of prayer in Holy Week. This year we're going to begin that at 11.00am on Maundy Thursday and continue it through to 11.00am on Good Friday morning. The church building will be open from 11.00am through to 6.00pm on Maundy Thursday, but thereafter it will be open 'virtually' via Zoom right through to 11.00am on Good Friday morning. So, if you want to take one of the prayer slots that will see us through Maundy Thursday evening and across the night into Good Friday, you will be able to do so from the comfort of your own home but also 'virtually' in the church building just by clicking on to Zoom. Phil Kelly will be putting together a rota for us to sign up to for prayer and Nigel is working on the Zoom link which we will send out in the usual way and also make available on the church website. There is so much that we need to be praying for right now and thanking the Lord for as well. So, I hope that you will 'sign-up' so that for twenty-four unbroken hours we can make our prayers known.

We are also going to have the chance to pray together on Zoom as a part of the twenty-four hours of prayer with a service of Evening Prayer on Maundy Thursday beginning at 7.00pm. The focus of this service will be the Last Supper and a separate Zoom link will be sent out and available via homeworship@ardinglychurch.net. So, with all of this prayer and then an hour at the foot of the Cross on Good Friday, also via Zoom and beginning at 2.00pm, I hope that we will all feel ready and excited to return to our beautiful church building on Easter Sunday morning so as to celebrate Jesus' resurrection.

Because that is the principal fact of Easter and that matters over and above everything else. It is what everything else rests upon, the fact that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead, and so the fact that Jesus Christ is alive. By his resurrection Jesus has broken death's defences once and for all and he now holds the power of death. That's what is most important about Easter and that is something that should cause all of us to shout (Sorry! Say quietly behind our masks!) 'Hallelujah!'

The story is told of how after the battle of Waterloo the Duke of Wellington sent the great news of his victory to England using a series of stations, one in sight of the next that had been established to send code messages between England and the Continent. The message to be sent was: "Wellington defeated Napoleon at Waterloo." Meanwhile, however, a fog set in that interrupted the message sending. As a result, people only saw the news of "Wellington defeated." Later, the fog cleared, and the full message continued which was quite different from the outcome that the people originally thought had happened! And the same is true with the message of Easter. When many look at what happened on Good Friday, the death of Christ, they see only "defeat". But on Easter Sunday, and with Jesus' resurrection, God's message is completed. The resurrection spells "victory" because HE IS RISEN!

Jesus Christ is Risen. He is Risen indeed. So why not join us this year to pray, to reflect, to remember and then to respond to that good news with (a loud!!) 'Hallelujah.'

Praise the Lord!

#### Foodbank

The Haywards Heath Foodbank is part of <u>The Trussell Trust's network of</u> 428 foodbanks.

In 2020 the number of families in crisis helped by the foodbank rocketed to 3,205 between April and November, compared with 1,346 in 2019. In that period more than 28 tons of food were donated.



The foodbank currently has three sites - one off Janes Lane, Burgess Hill, and two separate units on the Ditchling industrial estate - but now they are looking for larger premises. They ideally need one central location of approximately 1,500sq.ft. near Haywards Heath.

Families unable to buy food have told the Foodbank team how thankful they are for the service. One said: "I can't express how deeply grateful we are, just know it has meant so much. Thank you so much." Another said: "We just wanted to say thank you again for helping us in this difficult time, you truly are angels. "

### Wardens' Words

At the time of writing, Palm Sunday is only nine days away and we look forward to Holy Week. If the restrictions have limited what we would normally do at this time, there will still be many occasions on which we can focus on Christ's Passion with the same commitment to



prayer, praise and service. We would also like to thank Sue for continuing to publish this magazine, whatever the changing circumstances and whether it be in printed or electronic form. It has been a reassuring 'constant' in otherwise unpredictable times!

### **NEWS FROM NEPAL**

Hello and greetings to you from Nepal in the precious name of our Lord Jesus. We hope and pray that this will find you in good health and spirit. We know life has not been normal and we are all facing different kinds of challenges, fears and frustrations since last year.



We are so thankful to the Lord for his faithfulness and for the love and prayers from friends like you, who have been with us in prayer. We thank God and thank you for making our lives special so that we could serve many people in their need, caused by Covid19 and natural disasters\*.

Nepal only lost around 2,000 people to Covid19 but millions of people became jobless and for many their businesses came to a standstill or even closed down. Now Nepal is normal and all sectors are open again, and people aged over 55yrs are getting the Covid jab. Tourism businesses are still suffering but other sectors are slowly recovering.

Churches are open and we are operating normally. God has been good to us as most of our believers are around and attending church services. We had 8 weddings since last March. A few people were baptised and a few accepted the Lord as their personal Saviour. Praise God!

God has been so gracious to one of our believers as the Doctor gave up hope for him but he has been saved by the intensive care unit.

All the work of our Charity is going well and we could bless many families through our projects. We praise God for the Agricultural Farm that we started in Sindhuli. Vegetables are being grown and we have now got goats and the shed is ready for chickens too. It was also our joy to distribute 5 Sewing machines to 5 ladies in the village so that they can learn tailoring.

Though we are away from you physically, somehow lockdown became our time to reflect on all our past times with God's people like you, whom we have met and who helped us in many ways. We love you and ask the Lord to bless you with His abundant grace. May God bless you and be with you. Love, Milan

## **CPAS: HOW IT ALL BEGAN**

For 185 years, CPAS (The Church Pastoral Aid Society) has been responding to the key challenges and opportunities of the time to equip leaders and churches for mission, so that many, many more men, women and children can come to know our wonderful Saviour.

CPAS was founded on 19 February 1836 by prominent Christians,



including the pioneering social reformer Lord Shaftesbury. It was established as a Christian response to the massive social change brought about by the Industrial Revolution. What were once small village churches found themselves with the new urban poor on their doorsteps. Lord Shaftesbury and his friends stepped in to set up a new charity that would resource these churches to cope with this change. Their aim was simple: the

gospel should be taken 'to every person's door, with a single eye to the glory of God'.

For many decades this aim was achieved through making grants to

enable parishes to employ extra lay and ordained workers in fastgrowing urban parishes. What was controversial – though hardly a surprise to us today – was that CPAS gave grants for the employment of lay staff as well as those who were ordained. One of the first recipients of a grant was the Rev



Patrick Bronte, Rector of Haworth, and father of the famous novelists, who was able to employ Rev Arthur Nicholls as curate.

By the 1920s, CPAS was at the forefront of helping churches become more effective in sharing the gospel in a variety of ways, including the start of holidays for young people, which were originally known as Fresh Air Fund camps. Today, CPAS runs around 100 holidays a year for 8-18s, now called Ventures and Falcons. Over the years CPAS has overseen the production of some of the



most significant resources of the period including Youth Praise, Michael Botting's Family Worship and Journey into Life by Norman Warren.

In the 21st century the evangelistic commitment of CPAS focuses on equipping and resourcing lay and ordained leaders for kingdombuilding work across the UK and Republic of Ireland. CPAS wants every church to be a pathway to faith, every leader to be a catalyst for evangelism, every child to have the chance to explore Jesus and every Christian to be a courageous witness.

#### SAMARA'S AID

The new Medical Centre in Syria is almost ready and now attention has turned to equipping it.

The charity has some equipment from previous centres, but there is a need to replace some which is broken and buy

other brand new items such as ventilators, patient monitors and syringe pumps. Because of spiralling and ever-changing costs in Syria the charity will be buying these outside Syria, which also means that equipment of a more reliable quality can be purchased.

Samara is passionate about providing care for anyone who has a need, having heard too many stories of people who have sold their houses to pay for the hospital care of their elderly mother or relative. Yet because the care given was inadequate their family member died anyway. Samara and Dr A (a specialist doctor in a number of areas) are aiming to address this type of situation and ensure that the services they provide are the most helpful and relevant.

Fundraising has begun and Samara has received some excellent quotes, offers and some generous donations. God is Good! He is once again providing amazingly as the needs arise.

#### An Update from Chichester Cathedral



Over the last year, Chichester Cathedral has faced many challenges and developed new means of staying connected with the wider community and providing means of support and resources.

When public worship was suspended last March, the Cathedral began live-streaming a weekly Sunday service. As limited public worship returned, additional services continue to be live-streamed and made available on the Cathedral's website. Other special services are live-streamed including those on Remembrance Sunday, Advent & Christmas, Holy Week and more.

The Cathedral developed resources for worship and prayer at home, and has run online lectures, concerts, choral music, and arts events.

It has continued to support its partners including Chichester District Foodbank, UK Harvest and Stonepillow. Earlier this year with the Sussex Pub Group and Pallant House Gallery, the Cathedral launched the Friday Lunch Club which offered a free two course lunch to vulnerable or isolated residents in the city.

As we look forward to the easing of restrictions, the Cathedral hopes to welcome back more worshippers, visitors and other groups in the coming months. Like many other institutions there have been serious financial implications: one important way of providing regular support is through the Chichester Cathedral Friends. Through project funding the Friends have made considerable contributions in maintaining and improving facilities and services and developing the Cathedral's mission.

Current projects cover all areas of Cathedral life, including new toilet facilities in the North Transept (currently facilities are only available outside), new IT infrastructure, and improved Cathedral lighting.

In normal times, the Friends like to socialise and have fun too! Events throughout the year include talks, day trips, lunches and holidays. Joining the Friends is a way to enjoy new experiences and friendships whilst supporting the Cathedral's work and sacred heritage.

# Chichester Cathedral offers to be a vaccination hub

Earlier this year the Chichester Cathedral team made direct contact with the NHS locally to assess whether Chichester Cathedral would be a suitable location for a vaccination site.

Following discussions, it was learned that the Cathedral had not been considered as a



vaccination hub for several reasons: All hubs need to have adequate handwashing and toilet facilities, parking, be easily cleanable and have the capacity and ability to store fragile vaccines. The Cathedral would need to be closed to all other activities whilst this programme (which is likely to last several months) is underway. The Cathedral is currently open every day, for private prayer during the week and services on Sundays.

### **Ardingly Connected Together**

It seems hard to believe but Ardingly Hub has been up and running for over a month now. It has proved to be very popular with people in the village so, if you haven't been, do make a visit. We have a fantastic selection of books,



DVDs, jigsaws and board games for you to borrow (for free). We have fiction, non-fiction, children's books, games, jigsaws to test your patience and DVDs to supply many a movie night...... It's open between 8am and 4pm on Wednesdays and Saturdays so do come and browse.

Thank you to everyone who has donated the books, games etc. We are really grateful to you for making this venture successful. Incidentally, if you would love to have a movie night at home but don't have a DVD player, all is not lost! We have had *TWO* DVD players donated to the hub so please get in touch.

We have continued to provide support to village families who need a little extra help at this time. Your donations of non-perishable food and household items and cash have been incredible and, along with help from Ardingly College, the Old Post Office, Plawhatch Farm, Impact charity and Fellow's bakery, have enabled us to deliver substantial food recipe bags to help our village families. Please don't forget that if you, or someone you know, need some help at all, please do not hesitate to contact us (contact details below). We are here waiting to help. The COVID support service has been running for a year now – who would have thought that would ever be the case? If you need essential shopping, medication, lifts to medical appointments (including vaccinations), please contact us. If you would like to have a chat any time, we are all here and waiting – we aren't people you don't know, we are just friends you haven't met yet!



Did you think we'd forgotten that it's Easter? No chance! On Easter Sunday, starting at 2pm, we have an Easter Egg Hunt around the village! Prizes await and there will be LOTS of eggs hidden, just waiting to be devoured, as well as stickers to hunt down for a prize.

#### EASTER EGGS

For thousands of years the Greeks, Persians and Chinese gave eggs as gifts in the Sprint, celebrating new life in nature. For Christians today eggs are a symbol of the empty tomb and of new life. Eggs look dead but they contain life. In some countries eggs used to be painted red to symbolise Christ's blood. The chick is small,



yellow and fluffy, but soon grows into a large hen which will lay the eggs from which other chicks will be born. The cycle of life goes on, giving rise to the question, "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?".



### **Parish Council News**

The Parish Council met on 9 March at 7pm. As has been the case for the last year, this meeting was held virtually, using the Microsoft Teams platform. A number of members of the public were in attendance at the meeting, having contacted the Clerk for the appropriate code.

The agenda for the Council usually has an item relating to any planning applications submitted for properties within the Council area. These are considered by the planning committee members, with visits being arranged where appropriate. A view is then taken as to whether or not the Council will support the planning application and whether an objection should be raised, for example.

At this time of year, it is always the case that the Council needs to consider and approve the budget for the upcoming financial year. This year, Councillors took the decision that we would not look to raise the amount that comes to us from Council Tax – known as the precept. Those of you who have received your Council Tax bill for 2021/2022 will see that, of the six elements that make up the total bill, the Ardingly Parish Council element is the only one that hasn't increased and has, in fact, decreased slightly from last year.

There are many areas that the Council is dealing with at the moment, and we considered the whole action list at our meeting.

It was decided that we would prioritise a small number of items, including refurbishment of the pavilion and maintenance of the village, to ensure that these were dealt with in as timely and efficient a manner as possible. The contract to cover general maintenance in the village is to be advertised and plans continue to be discussed as to how best to progress the work on the pavilion.

The Annual Parish Council meeting will be held on 4<sup>th</sup> May. Again, this will be a virtual meeting and further details will be published nearer the time. The next ordinary meeting of the Parish Council will be held on 13<sup>th</sup> April, 2021.

### **Easter Bunny**

The Easter bunny has its origin in pre-Christian fertility lore. The Hare and the Rabbit were the most fertile animals knowsn and they served as symbols of the new life during the Spring season.

The bunny as an Easter symbol has its origins in Germany, where it was first mentioned in German writings in the 1500s. The first edible Easter bunnies were made in Germany during the early 1800s and were made of pastry and sugar.



The Easter bunny was introduced to American folklore by the German settlers, who arrived in the Pennsylvania Dutch country during the 1700s.
