

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The month of November is a month of remembrance. It is the moment when we stop, remain silent and take a moment to live in the light of remembrance. We do this as we remember those who gave their lives in the



service of their country and in defence of the freedoms we enjoy today. But we do this too, when we remember with thanks all of those who have shared our lives, shaped our lives, but who are no longer with us.

Each year we hold a service of personal remembrance - a service known as a 'Commemoration of the Faithful Departed', to use the proper church title for such a service. For me, it is a moment to stop and to remember all of those we have loved and lost and who we see no more; to give thanks for all they have meant to us and to hear afresh of God's love and strength as we continue the journey of life without them. I know that it is a service that is valued and appreciated. However, for quite some time it has been in my mind that it may be helpful and welcome to many to hold this service in the graveyard of the church; a chance to be in the place where so many memories rest, to pray in that place in a solemn moment, but also, I hope, a time to focus on the hope of the resurrection, both theirs and ours and to give thanks for their love and faithful testimony.

So, this year our service to remember those we have loved and lost will be held in the graveyard. It will take place on **Sunday 7th November** at **3.00pm**. It will be quite short and as we have done previously, it will include a moment to name aloud those we want to remember. As I have said before, I know that for some this is difficult and that there will be others who cannot attend the service but who might still wish for their loved one to be remembered in this way. Either way, if you would like me to read out the name of someone dear to you and on your behalf, please let me know and I will be pleased to do so. Arranging an outdoor service at the beginning of November brings with it the risk that the weather may force us to change our plans. But for now, those are our plans and I hope that you will join us to remember. All are very welcome.

Of course, we have some experience of holding an outdoor service for remembrance. Last year the covid restrictions forced us to move our **Annual service of Remembrance** to the Recreation Ground. That seemed to work so well that this year we have decided to do the same again. This year there will be a short service and **Act of Remembrance on the Recreation Ground on Sunday 14**th **November**, beginning at **10.45**. Last year the sun was shining, and I hope (and pray!) that it will again this year. But whatever, it will be an opportunity for us as a community to gather together and to share our remembering.

Later, on the same day and at **5.30pm** there will be another Service of Remembrance in the church which will be an opportunity to see the wonderful, knitted poppies that will form such a marvellous backdrop for this whole season of remembrance. My most grateful thanks to all of those who have worked so hard to make this possible.

In the Old Testament the people of God, the Israelites, were forever being called by God to remember – to remember who they were and, where they had come from. But it was also a call to a future that could be different. When we remember we too need to have a vision for the future. As we read of it in the Book of Revelation, God's ultimate promise for us is that God will dwell with us, that there will be no more mourning, no more crying, no more pain – we will get out of our cycles of violence and war because all of that has been gathered up in Christ who has shown us a different way. That future starts with us now and in our honouring and remembering and as we seek to live in the light of it.






IMARA-UGANDA EDUCATION FUND

IMARA-UGANDA EDUCATION FUND

As Uganda gradually emerges from a second lockdown, schools remain closed at least until January. Most children have spent very little time

in school in the past 18 months. At the present time no provision is being made by the government to enable home learning. This and other challenges have meant for me a time of learning to trust that a loving heavenly Father will continue to bless the work of our little charity and its children through these difficult times, just as he has always done.

A little while ago, when I was feeling particularly anxious for our visually impaired children and for the work we long to do to support the education of blind children - work that is at present on hold - I picked up a little book of meditations. I thumbed through the pages and these wonderful words of promise from Isaiah 42 stood out for me, "I will lead the blind by ways they have not known, along unfamiliar paths I will guide them... I WILL NOT FORSAKE THEM."

God is at work and our prayers are being answered. A lovely Christian widow was having a little bungalow built in her compound and she wished to let it. We needed a new office and a meeting place for the Imara scholars. The bungalow is ideal. There is room not just for the office but space for the little library of books we had started to collect for our scholars using donations that were given in memory of Joan Lewis whom many of you will remember. She was a librarian in her working life. Outside the new office there are trees under which the scholars can gather before being taken to their schools for the start of each term.

While our administrator, Kevin, was moving things into the office a friend she had not seen for many years turned up. Kevin was unaware until then that her friend was the widow's adopted son!

When writing to me about the new office, Kevin mentioned that the widow's children and grandchildren were having visiting teachers to tutor them under the trees in the compound.

It occurred to me that this was a way in which we could support the Imara scholars while the schools are closed, so that when they eventually return to school, they will return with confidence. I put the idea to Kevin and within a week she had contacted all the people needed to make this provision. The blind children, who need specialist teachers, will not be excluded.

Teachers of the main subjects, English, Maths and Science, are making the one hour journey along a bumpy murram road to Abia twice a week to teach five of our secondary school children. Two children who do not live close to the others are being taught by



teachers visiting their homes. One of the teachers has volunteered his time for free. The visually impaired children will board in their own school and they will be tutored on three days a week. A matron will be employed to look after them when they are not with the teachers. I saw

an opportunity to include other blind children from the top primary school years, who are not Imara scholars, so five extra children will benefit.

We feel a huge sense of gratitude to all the people who were involved in making this happen.

There is also some good news for our young people in tertiary education. Those studying nursing and clinical medicine are back in college and those studying other subjects will return to college this month. Two more of our scholars are about to start nursing school and another to start training in clinical medicine.

As always, our grateful thanks to those of you who give such wonderful support through regular or occasional donations and prayer. You are certainly making a difference to the lives of these children and young people.

MARGARET DALE Receives the Order of St Richard



On 9th October, during a Choral Evensong service at Chichester Cathedral, Margaret Dale was invested into the Order of St Richard by Bishop Martin. This is how the Order of Service describes the Order she received:

"The Order of St Richard is an award for lay people which recognises and celebrates exceptional service to the parish, the local community and the Diocese. A number people from each Archdeaconry are awarded the Order of St Richard every year. Those who receive the award of the Order of St Richard are people who, in the words of St Richard, know, love and follow Jesus, and as such they are an inspiration to all of us."

At the service the recipients of the award all received a badge, bearing the episcopal coat of arms of St Richard, attached to a ribbon. The recipients also received a certificate signed by Bishop Martin.

Many people will know of all that Margaret has done in her many years in Ardingly, but here is her story (albeit very abbreviated!):

During my 46 years at St Peter's Ardingly I have been privileged to serve God and the parish in a number of roles including Churchwarden. One thing which has given me great pleasure has been taking home communion to people. *I was a midwife for over 40 years and loved every aspect of the job. It was such a joy and privilege so be present at so many births – including one during the hurricane of 1987!*

When we first moved to Ardingly my husband John started a Scout Group and I ran the cubs for 12 years.

After retiring we worked for the Gambian government for 2 years and established a maternity clinic which has now become an integral part of their health service and a beacon of Christian-Muslim cooperation.

I have been blessed with 3 children and 7 grandchildren who have brought me great joy, comfort and support, especially during the last 2 years.

I praise God for every blessing his call on my life has given me.

ANGEL TREE INTO ACTION ONCE AGAIN!



The children of prisoners are vulnerable to exploitation, often stigmatised and carry untold emotional pain. The very least that can be done for them is to bring them a little joy this Christmas and this is what our local Prison Fellowship group plan to do! Angel Tree is a much needed and valuable initiative and is once again being put into action in order to serve those children with a parent detained in Lewes prison.

For those not familiar with this initiative, it is run by Prison Fellowship volunteers who raise money to purchase presents, then wrap and send them to children who have a parent in prison. Each present is individually chosen to fit the child by asking the prisoner what they think would be suitable e.g. the child's interests and what they might currently be "into". It is sent "as from" the mum or dad (in Lewes' case, dad) with a message inside which is handwritten from the parent. This helps to reinforce the bond between the parent and child. Such messages are a really important part of the giving of the gift as they are treasured by the children who then know that their mum or dad have not forgotten them and truly care about them. The application forms have already been delivered to the prisoners and are starting to be returned with details of what the dad wishes for the child to have, so now we can crack on with buying the presents!

Help is needed! And can be given in the following ways:

- Raising or giving donations of money
- Helping to wrap presents.

If you are able to help I would love to hear from you! We would appreciate all the support you can give, no matter however small. Prayers for the operation and smooth running of this initiative would also be greatly appreciated so that Jesus' love can be brought to these children and their families, where the need is so great.

SAMARA'S AID NEWS

In Syria winter is coming, and people are afraid. Fuel is scarce, it's heavily rationed and expensive and most ordinary workers cannot afford to fill their car tank without spending their entire month's salary. Many people have now bought electric cookers but there isn't enough electricity, especially during winter. Sometimes people go for a few days without electricity, and at times some of the water stations haven't had enough power to pump water to people's homes so they have had no water. There is very little wood available and what there is, is too expensive. It is a burden - even for the middle classes - to make ends meet.

Dr A says "Every month we have a new world here in Syria. In just one month, everything can change. A few years ago when ISIS were surrounding, attacking and killing us, it was terrifying. But strangely, it is worse now. Now we cannot see our enemy, yet the devastation to people is even worse - and everyone is affected now."

Samara's Aid cannot help the entire nation. But as Samara says, "there is a lot that we can do in the areas we are working".

FIRST CENTRE FOR ORPHANS & WIDOWS

The outreach Centre provides an unusual mix of services and activities in Syria, offered in a way that is warm, attractive and fun. Different communities are being brought together, and the word is spreading, with new people asking to register most days.



The Centre's services have grown quickly since taking on a new Centre Manager at the start of this year, and a strong team has been built around her. The children love her and the excellent team of teachers.

The Centre offers warmth in winter and air conditioning in the hot summer, as well as a light, bright environment using sustainable power. Around 60 or more children come most days for a cooked meal, education, therapeutic activities, art, music and play, with an occasional pop up cinema, and livelihood training courses for widows. Between January and August an incredible 4,199 nutritious meals and 3,186 educational support services (one child attending one educational session ie Maths or Arabic etc) were provided. For many, the centre provides opportunities people could only dream of.

SECOND CENTRE FOR ORPHANS & WIDOWS

There have been exciting developments this summer and plans are being made to open two new centres supporting orphans and widows. The 2nd building is due to be finished soon.

THIRD CENTRE FOR ORPHANS & WIDOWS

Another very deprived area has been highlighted to Samara, where there are a large number of orphans and widows in need of help. It is a Sunni Muslim, post siege area, which has been badly damaged and the people there are in a very poor situation. Samara says "We know that reaching out in love to these broken people is exactly what Jesus wants us to do."

FOOD AID FOR THE POOR

Samara hopes to establish an aid kitchen on one of the sites of the Outreach Centres, where food can be cooked, using sustainable power, then distributed hopefully still hot - to some of the poorer members of the community, reaching further than orphans and widows.



Permissions are currently being sought for this project.

FARMING



In June the wheat crop was threatened by swarms of locusts, and Samara asked everyone to pray. God answered and the locusts disappeared! The crop was safely harvested. Work is now underway to plan, prepare and plant new crops. This season a variety of foods will be grown which can be distributed to families in need, as well as used in the outreach centres. In addition to

the land our team were farming last year, they have taken on another good sized piece of land. It needs significant preparation but there is great potential to grow a great deal more which can be used to serve those in need.

LIBBY BURGESS on tour

Libby Burgess (Gerry and Steve's daughter) is doing a tour of the 48 counties in the country, giving live piano performances to raise money for 4 charities, supporting young musicians who have lost money during the pandemic. Many lost all of their work. The 4 charities are Help Musicians, Youth Music, Future Music and Live Music Now,

Libby began her tour in May and is playing Bach "because his music encompasses all of our



human emotional experiences, from the joyful through the sorrowful to the joyful uplifting". The collection is called "The 48" and she will play the whole collection in every county.

Libby set out to raise \pounds 20,000 and has already passed that target. Well done Libby!
