RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I am hoping that as you read this, I will encourage you to sing! To sing some of the Christmas carols that are such a joy and reminder of all that the wonderful season of Christmas means.



Everyone has a favourite Christmas carol. One of mine is 'Hark the Herald Angels sing.' Why not start by singing that one now? Can you hear it? "Hark the Herald angels sing, glory to the newborn king!" Actually, there are angels everywhere in the Christmas story. An angel turns up and informs a man called Zechariah that his elderly wife is going to have a baby boy - who would grow up to be John the Baptist. An angel turns up to tell Mary that she's going to give birth to the Son of God. And the same angel then turns up to tell her husband-to-be, Joseph, that his fiancée is pregnant as a result of the Holy Spirit and that he should go ahead and marry her anyway. An angel turns up to tell the shepherds who were watching their flocks that a Saviour had been born in the little town of Bethlehem – and he's followed by a whole choir of angels singing God's praises. "Hark the Herald angels sing, glory to the newborn king!" You see, everywhere you look in the story of Jesus' birthangels are found to be playing a critical role. So, we need to listen to those angels, and to all that they have to say, and to give them a place in our hearts' warmest love this Christmas. Because theirs is a message of delivery but also of deliverance.

Let's try another one. How about 'O little town of Bethlehem'? Are you singing? Actually, this is another of my favourites: *Oh, little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie. Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by, Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light. The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight. Four beautiful verses that remind us, as someone else has written, that 'the hinge of history is to be found on the door of a Bethlehem stable.' There's definitely something in that. History's greatest figure was born not in a palace, not in a mansion, not in luxury anywhere – rather, he was born in that Bethlehem stable. And he was born to change the world.*

So, we should take time this Christmas to be aware that in the very midst of all of our busy preparations for the celebration of Christ's birth in ancient Bethlehem, Christ is reborn in the 'Bethlehems' of our homes and daily lives. Let me urge you to take time, to slow down, to be still, and to be awake to what looks so common and so ordinary – and yet is so wondrously present.

There's time for a couple more. How about 'In the Bleak mid-winter' - that great reminder that Christmas is based upon an exchange of gifts. The gift of God to us all of his Son; and the gift of us all to God – when we first give ourselves to Him: What can I give him, Poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; If I were a wise man, I would do my part; Yet what I can I give him – Give my heart (Christina Rossetti). That's certainly a lovely carol, as is 'Silent Night.' I can never sing that one without hearing the words of Psalm 4: 8: I will lie down in peace and sleep, for you alone O Lord, will keep me safe.

Are you still singing? I do hope so. As I hope that you will keep singing all across the Christmas season and join with us to sing carols with others as we gather for a Christingle service around the oak tree in the village on Saturday 4th December at 5.00pm (details of how to make a 'Christingle' to bring with you to the service are on the church website). Then you can sing again at our Carols by Candlelight service in the church on Sunday 19th December at 6.30pm and again at our Crib and Carol service for everyone on Christmas Eve at 5.00pm.

At each of those services we shall certainly be singing one carol that I think is on everyone's list of favourite carols, 'O Come all ye Faithful.' Because that's a carol that pulls together in a way, all that we have already sung. It calls us to come to Bethlehem to behold the baby Jesus. It calls us to come and adore him. It reminds us of the angel choir that accompanied Jesus' birth — and of the shepherds who gathered around his cradle. But above all it reminds us that God calls us, too, to sing Christ's praises — and to give him

glory in the Christmas season. In everything else that we have to do this Christmas let's remember to come and adore the Christ who came into the world to bring us light for our darkness — and joy — and life eternal.

NEWS FROM OUR FRIENDS IN S.E. ASIA

Dear friends,

After about 18 months here in Europe, we are close to returning to Southeast Asia. A has received his visa and B's is being processed. So we hope to leave Europe by the end of November. We thank

God for this development!

Meanwhile, we have been busy coming alongside our international team-mates and we also have new people who have joined the team. (They have also just received their visas!) The pandemic has

posed challenges to face-to-face meetings with contacts and new believers. We have been able to keep in touch with a few via the internet, to share and encourage. One couple in particular are gifted in prayer ministry and God has used them to heal people who are physically sick or spiritually oppressed. Many have professed faith through their ministry, but unless people are rooted in God's Word, their faith in Christ fizzles out when they feel better. So we are hoping to give our local teammates some training in leading Bible studies with new believers.

At a recent retreat for national gospel workers in our area both stories for praise and challenges were shared. One common



challenge was the difficulty in learning the local language. Another was the need to disciple new believers who are either illiterate or have a low literacy level. Many discipleship resources and methods are geared towards Western educated believers and we need wisdom and creativity in helping new believers to grow in their faith. The pandemic has definitely pushed us to explore ways of using social media in order to sow the gospel more broadly.

Our family is now divided, with our son doing a foundation year in Europe and our daughter in year 12 back in her host country. In December she will move from a German speaking, to an English-speaking dormitory (another transition for her) while we will be returning to the country where we were based prior to the pandemic. Thank you so much for standing in prayer with us.

This is the time of the Diwali (Hindu) Festival in Nepal. Me and my wife have been invited by a group of churches in the North of Nepal, near the Tibetan Border, to speak at a Youth Conference for 3 days. May God speak and bring His revival amongst young people.

The house (next to the church) we wanted to purchase for the Aanandit Charity is still on sale but we've dropped our proposal for now due to lack of funds. We would like to bring all our projects on one site i.e. Children's Home, Girls' Hostel, Vocational Training, Elderly Care, Day Care for Toddlers, Guest House, Play Ground and Vegetable Farm etc.

We had a fantastic few days in Pokhara as a refreshment retreat for the Aanandit Charity staff, children and girls from the Girls Hostel and Children's home. We were 48 all together and for many it was the first time they had had a holiday together with their family.

A few weeks ago Nepal faced a terrible and untimely heavy monsoon which caused 121 deaths and over 11 billions of Rupees worth of rice to be washed away. Many roads, bridges and villages were hit by floods and landslides. Please pray for the poor farmers who lost all their crops for a year.





On 13th November Caroline Rich completed the COMBAT STRESS RACE TO REMEMBER

The deed is done! I completed the 20 miles walk from Petersfield to Portsmouth on Saturday, and can truthfully say that I enjoyed it!



About 40 people signed up for the event and the majority were runners - long distance runners. The walkers were a very elite and select bunch of people. Quality not quantity!

The route between Petersfield and the north side of Havant was rural and pretty. We walked to Buriton (pretty), up over the South Downs (steep), through Head Down Plantation (woody) on the Shipwrights Way, to join New Barn Lane. The lane continued South, keeping alongside the railway on our left and skirting the village of Charlton on our right, to Finchdean. Just beyond Finchdean we followed the Sussex Border Path to Rowlands Castle and to our 1st break/stop at the Scout Hall in Uplands Road. Rowlands Castle did have a castle, built between 1066 and 1199, but the village was apparently pretty much abandoned by the 1400's. The castle was damaged when the railway was laid between Petersfield and Plymouth. Now all that is left is a motte and bailey. Rowlands Castle is a pretty village with a large and unusually shaped green with some attractive cottages and houses. It felt like a perfect setting for Miss Marple.

The catering standards at the Scouts Hut were pretty good. The Combat Stress team had been up all night baking cakes and cheese blinis, and roasting peanuts. They were tremendously encouraging and cheerful, which was good for our morale. A few runners had passed us in ones and twos, looking pretty tired, but always with a wave and a cheer. There was great camaraderie amongst the runners, and between the walkers and runners (except we could talk more).

Leaving Rowlands Castle, we joined the Shipwrights Way (that name must tell a story) and crossed the B2148 onto Prospect Lane. Somewhere between the end of Prospect Lane and the Bedhampton Cricket Club (2nd break/stop) we managed to see a lot of Havant and somehow added about 1.7 miles to the prescribed route.

This is a Mystery, which I cannot explain! All I know is that my Garmin recorded 22.03 miles for the whole walk.

Bedhampton Cricket Club meant lunch. A hot lunch too! Then we were off again.

The next section between the Cricket Cub and Hillsea Lagoon was a strange contrast, with the very noisy A27 on our right and Langstone Harbour, the Farlington Marshes and Ports Creek on our left. About half a mile south of the Cricket Club, we joined The National Cycle Route 22, which runs from Banstead, Surrey to



Portsmouth, driving distance 70.6 miles. We walked between two competing worlds. To our right, noise, hassle, pressure, fumes. To our left, water, marshes, sea birds, tranquillity, and in the distance, the Spinnaker Tower.

The last section was in the dark, along the Pilgrims Trail, and into the street lighting of Portsmouth. We turned into the Historic Dockyard and walked towards a little crowd of CS team. We had finished!

The tale of an Ardingly hedgehog

Please help us



This summer we had a dear hedgehog visitor to our garden. Not only was he a lovely little chap but he was also most helpful because he ate a lot of slugs which were eating up our plants. Sadly, when the farmer cut the field next to our house, he was badly injured by the rotary blades, which were set a bit too low, and not long after, our poor hedgehog died. We wrote to

our farmer who was saddened by this and he answered our letter kindly and helpfully. We thought that, in memory of our little garden visitor, we would learn how to help hedgehogs and write to everyone in the village about helping them too.

We found out that hedgehogs do not have a 'fight or flight' response to danger, so rather than running away from danger, they curl up in a ball. This makes them vulnerable to injury from machinery such as strimmers and mowers. Hedgehogs nest all year round; they use hibernation nests in the winter and nests for day time resting during the rest of the year. They nest in bramble patches, log piles, open compost heaps, areas of rough grassland, loose leaf piles and garden vegetation.

Please be aware of the possible presence of hedgehogs when strimming wild patches or mowing long grass. The best thing to do is to cut brambles or long grass initially to about one foot high and then check the area for hedgehogs before cutting any lower. Hedgehogs also nest in bonfire piles so please check those too before setting them alight.

What else can we do to help our hedgehogs? There is a very helpful section on the People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) website, at https://ptes.org/campaigns/hedgehogs/ and you can also visit www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk for tips and advice. Thank you for your help.
