RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

A month or so into the New Year it is probably about now that our new year resolutions to change our ways and transform our lives by losing weight or by exercising more regularly or by spending more time with the family, resolutions that were made with great vigour and strength of purpose only thirty or so days



ago, are just beginning to wane a tad. Personally, I gave up making such commitments quite a while ago because I am extremely aware that year on year I fail.

Of course, some resolutions are worth making but for many years now I have found it better to begin each New Year by looking at the Bible to see what God has to say and this year I've been struck again by some words of the apostle Paul: "May I never boast save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." [Galatians 6: 14].

To understand that, just imagine for a moment that you are amongst a group of your closest friends and family and that they ask you questions like this: "What is the most important thing in your life?" "What is it that affects every other area of your life?" "What is it that you are obsessed with?" "What do you think about, read about and talk about most?" How would you answer those questions? Paul's answer to all those questions would be both challenging and inspiring. It was what gripped his mind. It was what had become the centre of his life, faith, and ministry to such an extent that he could never stop thinking about it. In short Paul's answer would be the cross of Jesus Christ and that has been the answer of Christianity year on year throughout the ages.

The reason that Paul was obsessed with the cross and the reason that Christianity has remained obsessed with the cross is that Jesus himself was too. His whole purpose on the earth was to die. Not because he was forced to, but because he wanted to and because it had a purpose. Quite simply, the cross is how God *accepts* us and the cross is how God *changes* us.

And that amounts to far greater purpose and far greater transformation than anything we might achieve in our lives through our New Year resolutions. Embracing the cross and boasting in the cross as Paul did brings about a total transformation in us. It is not the sort of transformation so beloved of the media and where someone is given new clothes and hair and ends up looking completely different. The change the cross brings is a change inside of us. It is a change that is in our heart. And it is change that will last and bring us into eternity.

Do those words of Paul in Galatians 6:14 give us the inspiration for a 'new' New Year resolution? That may be so. But they should certainly cause us to pause and think about what it is that is most important to us in our lives. At very least these words of Paul are a prayer that we would only boast in the cross and what Jesus has done for us and in nothing else at all.

# **NEWS FROM HEATHER JOHNSTON (CMS)**

Dear friends,

Recently, I bought a cow, 60kg of rice, 30kg of beans, 15 cabbages and a coffin for the equivalent of £225. All before six am and while I was still in bed. Elias, the beloved 20-year-old son of one of the Rehema women, had died in a tragic accident the day before. Funerals and grieving are a very important part of Tanzanian life



and culture, and if someone close to you passes away, family, friends, neighbours and the community at large will arrive en-masse at your home to pay their respects to the deceased and to grieve. It is expected that you will provide chai and food, plates, cups, somewhere to sit, etc for all the visitors, and not to do so would be considered very shameful and disrespectful.

Mama Esta was despairing. A couple of weeks prior to the accident, the structural walls of her house had collapsed, and she and the family were



struggling to cope. Temporarily living outside, subject to the elements, mosquitoes and other nocturnal creatures. Things were dire; they couldn't afford to rebuild the house. Elias took a loan from the group formed by his fellow motorbike taxi drivers to help his mother and the family, and building work

started, but unfortunately they didn't have enough money to complete the job. Not only was the house not fully repaired, but now she had to pay for the funeral costs, and there was that matter of Elias's loan which must be repaid.

A concerned colleague rang me very early that morning and explained the situation. Rehema Assistance aims to benefit women and children who are struggling, so of course we were more than willing to assist Mama Esta in her hour of need and Elias was buried with dignity.

There are no guarantees in life and there are many heartbreaking moments to counter happy times. The good news is, however, that when times are bad, we know we can turn our eyes from our problems to our Saviour Jesus Christ and know he will help us carry the load.

The Rehema women, as usual, rallied around and were there to support Mama Esta. Helping to cook, clean, sing hymns and pray with her, and just generally lift her spirits at a difficult time. The ladies are a fine example of mercy and compassion, which is what Rehema represents.

A big thank you to my friends and supporters, for your encouragement, financial and prayerful support, and love throughout the year. 2021 has been challenging in a way that none of us could have anticipated or expected. Our lives have been turned upside down and placed on hold. For over a year, I was in a state of limbo, stuck in South Africa, longing to be able to return to Tanzania and my friends and colleagues at the Diocese of Mara and the Rehema Project.

Eventually, a decision was made after consultation with CMS and the diocese – it seemed unlikely that my paperwork would be approved. It was time to return to Musoma to say my farewells and move on to a new placement.

I arrived in Musoma on 18 October to a fabulous welcome. The Rehema ladies had commandeered my kitchen and my home, and an endless stream of people visited during my first week. It is so fantastic to see everyone, and they are thrilled to see me. There has been lots of fun, laughter and some tears. There is an expectation that I will visit everyone at their homes and share a meal with them. In the last month I have visited 20 different homes in different areas. Still about 10 to go! What a blessing.



Benjamin, my new neighbour on our compound, is head of education in this region. After finding out that I had come to pack up and say goodbye, he championed my cause and spoke to various people in senior government. He has told me to resubmit my documents, and everything will be approved. The diocesan link officer, Arthur, also contacted both the immigration and labour departments in Mara and the message was very positive from both. The directive from President Samia Hasan is to endeavour to approve applications rather than to decline them. In theory, anyway, there will be no obstacle to a fresh application, which is great news.

My secondment agreement to the Diocese of Mara expires in January 2022. I spoke to CMS and they have agreed to extend it in my current location.

I met with Bishop George, and he is delighted with the prospect that I can remain in Mara and said that what he envisaged my role to be in the future is to revitalise the Rehema Project, which I agree is sorely needed. He also wants me to expand the micro loan programme I started in 2018, working closely with Mothers' Union to assist the most marginalised women in the region.

God does indeed work in mysterious ways, and, after all this time, it seems I am no longer packing up. I do need to return to South Africa though and by God's grace will return to Tanzania, probably at the end of January 2022.

Peace, goodwill, and happiness to you at Christmas, and always. Heather

#### **ANOTHER ANGEL TREE COMPLETED!**

I am pleased to report that the Prison Fellowship
Angel Tree programme has once again succeeded in
providing presents for over 100 children of Lewes prisoners!

A team of volunteers ordered and wrapped all of the presents in Christmas paper. Each child received several presents and a Christian story book was also included unless the father had requested that one should not be sent.

The task of the final wrapping for posting then fell to three of us which threw up quite a few challenges, not least doing some of it in



a very confined space! Most importantly, the much treasured hand written message by Dad was then enclosed alongside the presents, confirming that he has not forgotten his child and still loves them. It is essential that each family unit has all the presents sent together rather than separately, eliminating any postal risk that one child might

not receive their present when other siblings do. You can imagine with two or three children in a family we had some pretty big packages to deal with!

There have been many glowing reports from the prisoners regarding the presents that have been sent and many are overwhelmed by the fact that people care enough to put their love into action in this way.

Family ties can become very fragile when a parent enters prison and Angel tree is an excellent way to reinforce those ties. The programme could not run without people like you! I would like to say a huge thank you to all who have contributed this year and enabled us to deliver this very worthwhile programme once again. God bless you for your help and support!


# SAMARA'S AID APPEAL for vulnerable children

Samara Levy is in Syria at the moment, where it is snowing hard and -6 degrees. Schools and offices are closing due to the harsh weather.



She has encountered extreme levels of poverty and desperate needs in addition to the food and fuel shortages which have been reported on TV. The good news is that she has obtained permission to send a container of aid in February - but because of strict Customs regulations she is limited in what she can send, and she cannot send boxes of clothing this time.

Children are particularly in need, and she is appealing for hygiene (including children's socks and underwear) and educational items. **Everything MUST be new** and unopened, however.





Hygiene items - full size (not sample or hospitality sizes) toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap bars, shampoo bars, face and hand cream, Vaseline, Nivea, Sudocrem, lip salve, deodorant (no aerosols), body puffs and sponges, hand sanitizer, towels, shampoo and conditioner, sunscreen, cotton buds, razors (male and female), hairbrushes and combs, headlice treatment, dandruff shampoo, incontinence pads and sanitary towels (no tampons).

**Educational items** - writing pens, writing and drawing pencils, colouring pens, pencils and crayons, art and craft paints, pads of lined, squared and plain paper, exercise books (A4 and A5) of lined, plain and squared paper, erasers, pencil sharpeners, rulers, pencil cases, geometry sets, colouring books.

If you are able to contribute please <u>deliver items to me</u> <u>by 7<sup>th</sup></u>
<u>February</u> as the container will be leaving mid-February.

# **STEPHEN DOERR , 25.8.46 - 9.12.21**

The Memorial Service held on Friday 7<sup>th</sup> January was the most fitting tribute to the life of Steve, who died suddenly at his home on 9<sup>th</sup> December, while working on one of his beloved long-case clocks.

A packed St. Peter's Church, with standing room only for some and seating in the choir stalls for others, rang out to hearty singing of 'How Great Thou Art', 'In Christ Alone' and 'Great is Thy Faithfulness', interspersed with reminiscences from friends giving just a glimpse of the many facets of Steve's life.



Living in Ardingly since 1977, Steve was a mainstay of Ardingly village life, our church and school, juggling his busy working life as a teacher with many other projects including the seemingly neverending work on Steve and Glynis' home at Avins Bridge Cottage.

Among the congregation gathered at his Memorial were previous Rectors of St. Peter's, David Perryman, Rod Symmons and Simon Allaby, and representatives of Worth School, the Horological Society and others, all paying respect to a man who had touched so many lives. Thanks to the availability of 'Zoom' the service was watched by many others who could not attend in person, including Helg and Richard Harper in Norway and Cherno Yanneh, General Administrator of the Old Jeshwang Health Centre in The Gambia.

An ongoing project close to his heart, Steve had taken over the Chair of the Ardingly Old Jeshwang Society since the passing of Dr. John Dale.

The current restrictions on travel prevented Cherno from attending in person. Instead, he had sent a wonderful Letter of Condolence which I was honoured to read out at the service and is printed on page 14.

Aside from the Memorial Service itself, the village had turned out in force to provide lunch at the Centre for those who had attended the private burial that morning, floral decorations in the church and at the Centre and abundant refreshments for those who attended the Memorial.

# **Ardingly Parish Council**

After meeting remotely (via Teams software), the Parish Council has returned to meeting face to face in the Reading Room at Hapstead Hall. However, because of the significant increase in the number of COVID cases, a decision was taken to limit the agenda for the meeting held in January. Rather than the more usual full agenda, the Council considered relevant planning applications and also the draft budget for 2022-23.

This does not mean that other business has not continued. Work on planning for the refurbishment of the pavilion is still underway, with schemes of work being finalised, ready for the invitation to tender being advertised. It is anticipated that the final plans will be circulated for discussion and, hopefully, agreement at Council meeting in February.

Residents will be aware that the potential housing development on part of the showground (SA25) has been under review by the planning inspector. The number of houses initially proposed was 100, reduced to 70 following the initial consultation by Mid Sussex. The planning inspector has now presented his report, with a view that only 35 houses should be built on the designated plot. The Council is in the process of preparing its response to the report.

Council meetings are held each month (apart from August) on the second Tuesday of each month and members of the public are welcome to attend. The first 15 minutes of each meeting is open for questions from the public. Please refer to the website where you will find the minutes of meetings and also the agenda for the upcoming meeting, when it is published.

#### **ROOMS FOR HIRE AT ST PETER'S CENTRE**



We have two halls available to rent at St Peter's Centre. A large hall which can seat up to 120 people and which has a small carpeted area at one end suitable for children to play on, or a separate smaller hall which seats up to 40 people. Chairs and round tables,

seating about 6, are available. We also have some larger rectangular tables which would each seat 8.

Both halls have access to the kitchen, which is well equipped with a large double oven plus a smaller one and a hot cupboard to keep things warm. There is also a fridge, urn, sinks and dishwasher. There is a large hatch between the main hall and the kitchen and plenty of plates, cups, saucers and cutlery.

There is easy disabled access and there is a disabled toilet.

WiFi is available at the Centre and the main hall is equipped with audio visual facilities (including an induction loop to half of the hall) to aid presentations. The smaller hall has a 32" monitor available to link into a laptop or other electronic device.

At weekends the halls can be hired from early morning till 10.30 at night (the premises must be vacated by 11.00pm). During the week the large hall is currently in regular use each morning in term time and also some evenings, and the small hall is in use on Thursday mornings in term time.

Alcohol can be consumed but cannot be sold on the premises (there is no licence for this). Smoking is not permitted at the Centre.

There is parking around the Centre for a limited number of vehicles and additional parking can usually be arranged opposite.
