RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

A great deal of writing and thinking about Harvest Thanksgiving quite naturally draws us back into the Old Testament. I cannot think about harvest without recalling the words we read in Deuteronomy 24: When you are harvesting in your field and you overlook a sheaf.



do not go back to get it. Leave it for the foreigner, the fatherless and the widow, so that the Lord your God may bless you in all the work of your hands (24: 19). It is a reminder of our call to be committed in compassionate care to those in need, one of the foremost messages of harvest thanksgiving. We are to share from all that we have received and to do so with joy. Because that is the transcendent message of harvest. Having joy in receiving and knowing joy in sharing all that God has provided. Harvest is a time for joy, a mood captured so well in these words from Psalm 65:

The meadows are covered with flocks and the valleys are mantled with corn; they shout for joy and sing. (Psalm 65: 13)

Sheep and corn shouting and singing for joy! Words to make us smile. Harvest is a time of joy and of praise, of celebration and of sharing. But our thoughts on harvest thanksgiving really need to be rooted in the beginning of the Bible and in the Book of Genesis if they are to be complete. In Genesis we see how God created a beautiful world and how he gave us all the task of taking care of it. The narrative we read in the Book of Genesis makes it clear that it was to be a partnership. God creates and provides, and we are to work to look after the world. So, thanks to God creating and to humans working there is enough for everyone.

That partnership puts me in mind of the story of the vicar and the old gardener. The vicar looked over his fence in admiration of the beautiful garden next door. It was a profusion of flowers and produce, all beautifully tended and cared for. He piously remarked: 'Doesn't this fill you with wonder at what God can do?'

The old gardener looked up at him and said: `Hmm. Right enough vicar. But you should have seen it before he got me to help him with it!' God lovingly gives us the huge responsibility of caring for his creation. It is a partnership.

Sadly, the Genesis narrative also shows how human beings spoiled that partnership. In their disobedience of God, they put their wishes before his and as a result nothing was ever the same again; sadness and unfairness, greed and selfishness, famine and flood all came into the world. This year more than others in recent memory we have seen the outworking of that spoiled partnership in drought and flood, in famine and need. It will require changes from us all – but there is always hope.

And biblical hope is more than mere longing, it is a certainty. So, reflecting on this sadness St Paul can imagine the whole creation groaning for redemption. But when Jesus returns says Paul, our broken world *will* know healing and restoration, there will be no more drought or famine, no more sadness, unfairness, greed, or selfishness. All will be restored. It will be just as God originally intended.

Thanks to Jesus' death and resurrection that healing process has already begun. And he promises to bring it to completion in the future. Meanwhile we continue to be just as responsible as ever for looking after our planet, for caring and sharing, and for giving thanks with joy for all that we have received, even after so much has gone wrong.

Very sadly clothes moths have taken up residence in Chichester Cathedral and are causing damage to the precious embroideries and tapestries. Following an assessment from a textile conservator, the Piper Tapestry was temporarily removed for treatment and cleaning on the 24th June 2022, until further notice.

The design by Piper was woven in France in 1966. The central theme is the Holy Trinity; on the side panels appear the "four beasts full of eyes before and behind" (Rev. 4:6) traditionally regarded as symbolising the four evangelists.

Parish Walk



TMARA-UGANDA EDUCATION FUND

It was so good to return to Uganda! After two years of school closures and disrupted education, the Imara scholars have been back in school for two full terms. Sylvia and I enjoyed seeing them all again and we were greeted with hugs and welcome songs.

We spent a day in Abia where, with a small ceremony, we handed



over the resource centre - library, IT room, small group room and hall to the school management committee. We chose to support Abia Primary School in 2011 because it was the site of such suffering during the civil war when the LRA rebels attacked homes, villages and refugee camps and abducted thousands of children, forcing them to become

child soldiers. Our older scholarship children still talk of those times.

Perhaps the most moving experience of this visit was a journey to Kotido in Karamoja, a 4 hour journey from Lira. The land is semi

desert during much of the year and it is an area of extreme poverty. We visited the home of our youngest scholar, Brian, a bright 8 year-old who loves to be in school. Of the 5 children in this family, Brian is the only one in school. We were close to tears on entering their tiny home where grandmother sits all day on a mattress in semi darkness. She is blind and rarely ventures out. At night the children sleep around her on mats on the floor. Brian's mother is a widow who earns a little money fetching water for people and 2 of her children, little older than Brian, were out getting food (begging) when

we visited. This family so often go to bed hungry.

We loved visiting Brian and our other scholar from the area, Popon, who is physically disabled, in their schools. We received the biggest smiles. Popon is unable to walk because one of his legs is very weak but he is in secondary school and that is what matters most to him.

One of the main purposes of our visit to Uganda was to see how best we can support the education of visually impaired children at secondary level. They have a primary school in the Lira area but many blind children drop out of school because the nearest secondary school for them is in Gulu, a 2 hour journey

away. These are children with so much potential, but without a secondary school education and further education their future is bleak. We have 2 visually impaired Imara scholars in Gulu, so we travelled there to see them and their school. We were struck by how the children, growing up where there is such stigma attached to disability, were achieving so much not just academically but in the fields of sport and music and they were whizzes on the computer!

They had brought home many trophies through competing nationally in athletics and goalball. They were encouraged to believe in themselves and their future is bright. We would love to see opportunities like these in the Lira area.

Discussions are taking place over educational provision for the blind children in Lira but there are many challenges to overcome. Among the sticking points is the need for the school to be government aided. This would make the government responsible for paying the teachers and providing curriculum materials. The other is financial. Please pray that the challenges will be overcome and that doors will open.

SAMARA'S AID NEWS

FAMINE, DEFORESTATION AND REGREENING THE DESERT

The food catastrophe in Syria is getting worse and a recent statement of the UN Security Council named Syria as a country "one step away from famine". Nine in ten children in Syria need humanitarian assistance (UNHCR).

The lack of fuel over the harsh winters of recent years, amid freezing temperatures, has led to increasing **deforestation**, as people have resorted to chopping down trees to burn as firewood to keep themselves warm. The long term implications of this are seriously worrying.

A significant proportion of Syria is **desert**, and following increasing droughts over the last 2 years that desert is growing in size and rendering useless what was fertile land which grew crops. For millennia, Bedouin communities have inhabited these areas, grazing their livestock and subsisting from the land. Even they are now being displaced and driven from this land as they can no longer survive there.

Some weeks ago, God gave me [Samara] a picture or **vision** of this completely stark, sandy piece of land in the desert, but as lush

green pasture with productive trees. It was so green it could have been the U.K. and was a truly inspiring sight. Humanly it seemed impossible, but I shared this vision with the team in Syria, who felt equally excited.

This is why we began farming, not only on fertile land, but also in the desert, at the end of last year. We know that it won't give instant results but we are determined to improve soil quality over time, and have been carefully studying how we can bring this about.



Stage one has been to **plant grasses and bamboo**, to provide protective ground cover, halt soil erosion, provide food for livestock and give protection from harsh winds and sand storms.

Stage two has been to **plant drought tolerant trees** which will provide food (olives, dates, peanuts etc) and contribute to the formation of rain. Over time these small steps will begin to change the nature of this dry, desert land. We are blessed to have an incredible well, but also to be in the flood plain.

'BE RURAL' OUTREACH CENTRE - ANSWER TO PRAYER



There has been a wonderful answer to prayer for new teachers and other team members to work at the new Outreach Centre. They were quickly put to the test by some rude and impolite behaviour from two orphaned boys who came from a village nearby where a lot of the children are very tough and challenging. It is an area with a shocking and

brutal history and which has a cycle of hatred, devastation and revenge. Their behaviour and attitudes are not the children's fault – they are products of their circumstances. We are giving children like this a chance in life – an opportunity they simply wouldn't have otherwise. It is our hope and prayer that by bringing together orphans of different backgrounds and religions, our team can help them develop healthier ways of interacting and communicating with the people around them. We have seen such encouraging results from our first (city) outreach centre, where it has been inspiring and heart-warming to see the children making friendships and developing as they grow up.

Some of their relatives called to thank our team, moved that there are people taking an interest in them, their bereaved children, and their neglected communities. They described the excitement of the children when they got home, talking non-stop about everything they had done and describing every detail.

SAMARA'S AID AUTUMN 2022 APPEAL

In June a second container filled with 1,170 banana boxes of dignity bags, walking aids and other essential items, left Brighton for Syria.

A new appeal has just been launched on the Samara's Aid website for toiletries, coats, shoes, underwear and socks (all must be new). Winter in Syria this year is expected to be just as harsh as last year, with sub-zero temperatures, whilst many people still have no windows in their homes and most will not be able to heat their homes



because of the scarcity and cost of fuel. (The poorest workers would use an entire month's salary to buy just 25 litres of subsidised fuel.)

Harvest - A Short History

Harvest is from the Anglo-Saxon word *hærfest*, meaning "Autumn". It then came to refer to the season for reaping and gathering grain and other grown products. The full moon nearest the autumnal equinox is called the Harvest Moon. So in ancient traditions Harvest Festivals were traditionally held on or near the Sunday of the Harvest Moon. This moon is the full moon which falls in the month of September.



An early Harvest Festival used to be celebrated at the beginning of the Harvest season on 1st August and was called Lammas, meaning 'loaf Mass'. Farmers made loaves of bread from the fresh wheat crop. These were given to the local church as the Communion bread during a special service thanking God for the harvest.

Nowadays the festival is held at the end of harvest, which varies in different parts of Britain. Sometimes neighbouring churches will set the Harvest Festival on different Sundays so that people can attend each other's thanksgivings.

Farmers celebrated the end of the harvest with a big meal called a harvest supper.

The modern British tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at his church at

Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" but also Dutch and German harvest hymns in translation helped popularise his idea of harvest festival and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service.
