RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The month of November is a month of remembrance. It is the moment when we stop, remain silent and take a moment to live in the light of remembrance. We do this as we remember those who gave their lives in the service of their country and in defence of the freedoms we enjoy today. But we do this too, when we remember with thanks all of those who have shared our lives, shaped our lives, but who are no longer with us.

Each year we hold a service of personal remembrance, a service known as a 'Commemoration of the Faithful Departed', to use the proper church title for such a service. For me, it is a moment to stop and to remember all of those we have loved and lost and who we see no more; to give thanks for all they have meant to us and to hear afresh of God's love and strength as we continue the journey of life without them. Last year we held this service in the graveyard of the church so as to be in the place where so many memories rest, to pray in that place in a solemn moment, but also, I believe, as a time to focus on the hope of the resurrection as we gave thanks for the love and faithful testimony of those now dearly departed.

So, this year we will do the same again. Our service to remember those we have loved and lost will be held in the graveyard and will take place on **Sunday 6th November** at **3.00pm**. As it was last year, the service will be quite short and will include a moment to name aloud those we want to remember. As I have said previously, I understand that for some this is difficult and that there may be others who cannot attend the service but who might still wish for their loved one to be remembered in this way. Either way, if you would like me to read out the name of someone dear to you, and on your behalf, please let me know and I will be pleased to do so.

Arranging an outdoor service at the beginning of November brings with it the risk that the weather may force us to adjust our plans.

But for now, those are our plans and I hope that you will join us to remember. All are very welcome.

For the last couple of years our **Annual service of Remembrance** has been held on the Recreation Ground and this year it will be so once again. This year there will be a short service and **Act of Remembrance on the Recreation Ground on Sunday 13th November**, beginning at **10.45**. For the last couple of years we have been blessed at this service with sunshine and I hope (and pray!) that it will be so again this year. But whatever, it is an opportunity for us as a community to gather together in the centre of our village and to share our remembering. Please do join us.

Later, on the same day and at **5.00pm**, our evening service 'Open to God' will also have as its theme this moment of remembrance.

In the Old Testament the people of God, the Israelites, were forever being called by God to remember – to remember who they were and, where they had come from. But it was also a call to a future that could be different. When we remember, we too need to have a vision for the future. As we read of it in the Book of Revelation, God's ultimate promise for us is that God will dwell with us, that there will be no more mourning, no more crying, no more pain – we will get out of our cycles of violence and war because all of that has been gathered up in Christ who has shown us a different way. That future starts with us now and in our honouring and remembering and as we seek to live in the light of it.

CMS: NEWS FROM HEATHER JOHNSTONE

Dear all,

Hallelujah, hallelujah, after many, many months of being in limbo, my work and residence permits have been approved and are valid until May 2024. I feel like I have been asking everyone to pray for resolution to the permit situation FOREVER, and I want to thank you all so much for praying faithfully over such a long period.

The ladies are delighted that Rehema Cafe & Craft Shop is open and although the number of visitors to Musoma has decreased significantly, currently volunteers from Christian charity Go MAD in Tanzania are providing them with a steady flow of work, which is a real blessing to everyone.



This week, as I was attending to some administrative duties in the workshop, my colleague Cesi answered her phone. I heard someone say to her, "I sent you a message". I looked up from what I was doing and noticed she was reading an SMS. In astonishment I asked her if she was reading, and when she confirmed she was, I offered her my congratulations; she responded "but, Mama, you taught me". I was so thrilled because Cesi, one of our hardest workers, had been illiterate. Growing up in a village with a father who demanded she tend the land, do the household chores and look after her siblings, Cesi did not have the privilege of going to school and getting an education. A few years ago, we ran basic literacy and numeracy classes at Rehema after work. Not only did Cesi take on board what she learned, but she asked her primary school age girls to continue to teach her, and as they have advanced, so she too has flourished!

A few weeks ago, I visited my friend Agnes in one of the villages. Her daughter Rebeka was very pregnant. I asked where she was going to have the baby as she'd had difficulties with her firstborn, and she replied that she was going to have it at home because she

couldn't afford to go to the hospital. I enquired about costs and discovered the hospital charges TZS 50,000 (about £18) for the first day and TZS 25,000 for each subsequent day. One also must pay for any medicine used and even bring one's own medical supplies!

I suggested that rather than have the baby at home, it was safer to have it at the hospital and I set about trying to raise the money to cover the costs. By God's grace, and the generosity of a donor, I was successful and a few days later I popped in to see the family and took with me the contribution for the medical expenses, only to discover that Rebeka and her mum had left for the hospital 15 minutes earlier as she was in labour. They went on the back of a motorbike! Imagine that! I spoke to Agnes on the phone, and she said I should come to the hospital, which wasn't too far away. By the time I arrived 10 minutes later, Rebeka had given birth to a baby boy (less than half an hour after she arrived at the hospital).



Thanks be to God she had decided to go to hospital as the umbilical cord was wrapped around the baby's neck, which could have led to problems during a home birth. I was allowed to visit Rebeka and her son almost immediately, which was such a blessing and he is by far the youngest baby I have ever seen. Rebeka and Agnes were amazed that I was there and that I had brought money for the hospital. They asked me how I knew to come, but clearly it was God's hand in the situation.

Not so long ago everyone was abuzz with the joy of the Queen's Jubilee celebrations, and we were especially blessed to have the fabulous team at St John's in Copthorne turn their making of fascinators and wristbands into a fundraiser for the Rehema Project. The fundraising coincided with Anna, one of the Rehema ladies, being evicted from her home. Anna's husband, Wambura, is in jail for a crime he didn't commit. This situation is already so problematic for Anna, who tries desperately to support their children, but to compound matters, Wambura's brothers threw her and the children out of their house as it is built on Wambura's family land and he is considered a disgrace and not worthy. Whether their opinions are justified or not is debatable, but their actions are incredibly harsh,

and they made direct threats of violence again Anna and the children if they did not vacate the premises. Anna was despairing as she was too scared to continue living in their home, and the police didn't want to listen to her complaints.

By the grace of God, over the years, working for Rehema, Anna managed to save enough money to buy a plot of land near her family home. She also bought a bag of cement every few months as a form of savings and had managed to accumulate almost 20 sacks. With the support of the fabulous fundraising team, we have been



able to build a two-bedroomed house for Anna and her family. Once again, we thank God for his perfect timing and provision.

NEWS FROM NEPAL

Dear Friends,

Hello and Warm Greetings to you from Nepal! We sincerely hope and pray that this email will find you in good health.

First of all, we want to share good news of God's faithfulness:



We had a great opportunity to visit England together as a family in summer. We were immensely blessed at the Ichthus conference in August. We thank God for everyone who has prayed and helped us in many ways. All of us felt it was one of the best visits we ever had. We have seen God's hand in our entire journey. Thankyou Lord and thanks to all.

It was our great joy to celebrate Aanandit Church 20th Anniversary on 30 August. During the Anniversary we visited a big prison in the remote part of Nepal where we took a Sound System, 190 Bibles, and hygienic gifts for the 338 prisoners. Also, at the Church we had 9 Baptisms and 4 New Leaders were dedicated for the ministry. At the end we had a feast together for 400 people. Our Pastor gave his report saying so far 333 people have been baptised in our church. Similarly, our treasurer gave the financial report. We looked back and praised God together for the hundreds of lives He has touched though us by spiritual and humanitarian works throughout the years. It was powerful to pray together for the coming days and move with Him as He leads us. Isaiah 61: 1-3.

Aanandit Charity also had its 15th Annual General Assembly. Local Government representatives were present and they also appreciated the work of the Aanandit Charity. We are working among needy people in various areas, running a Day Care Centre for Toddlers, a Children Home, a Girl's Hostel, an Agriculture Farm, and by providing scholarship and relief help. As you know we are still raising funds and waiting to buy land for the Charity's Project 2030. We praise God for the 65% funding we have been given towards this.

We are led to focus more on Church Planting. We now have 8 churches in Nepal, besides working with pastors and networks in different parts of Nepal. We will continue to do this and extend the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus.



Ezra Leadership Training in Kathmandu takes place for a week every three months. It is a means to equipping and empowering Pastors, Leaders and lay people. In Damak, eastern Nepal, we have 2 months of residential Leadership Training but at present we are giving Vocational Tailoring Training for 3

months. We hope to start the next batch of training in January 2023. This training has been a great blessing for lay people to learn and go deeper in the ministry and also for pastors who haven't got a chance to go to Bible College or for long-term training.

In October we will be travelling and speaking in different places during the Hindu festivals/holiday.

Aanandit Church is determined to feed God's flocks by all means so everyone grows in spiritual maturity continuously. Just recently we had special programs for children, youth and Women. This happens on a regular basis. We praise God for the numerical and spiritual growth in all ages. More Lord!

Finally, thank you, dear friends, for all your love, prayers and precious kindness to us and to all at Aanandit. You are the expression of God's love to us. We praise God for you and keep you in our prayers. "Every time I think of you, I give thanks to my God." Phil 1: 3, NLT.

Congratulations are due too to all those who are taking part in our "WOW" (Walk Once a Week) initiative. The children actively log their journeys each day and, every Friday a trophy is presented to the class with the highest percentage of pupils who have walked, cycled or scooted to school – park and stride counts too! Just in the month of September,

pupils achieved 90% active journeys in the morning.
