# **RECTOR'S LETTER**

Dear Friends,

The Bible tells us that God is love. And that God wants us to know that love and to experience it for ourselves. That's exactly what He shows us in the death of His Son on the cross. It is the paradox of the cross of Christ that the motivation that



lay behind Jesus' suffering and endurance of the horrors of the cross was love - that tender sweet love that God has for each one of us.

Put most simply, the love of God speaks of love that is directed outwards and towards others and not inwards and towards ourselves. It speaks of a love that's utterly unselfish, which gives all, whilst expecting nothing in return. And it is this that we witness at the cross: the miracle of grace by which God made it possible for all of us to enter His kingdom.

The cross of Jesus Christ is the means by which God broke through our self-sufficiency with a demonstration of His allsufficient love. Through Jesus - the one who was mocked and insulted, spat upon, flogged, and finally killed - we were given a declaration of the love of God in the past, as well as a reminder of that love of God that is continuing and an assurance of the love of God that reaches towards all of us with a kindness and compassion that is itself motivated by deep and everlasting love.

But we are also given a challenge. The cross of Christ is a challenge to all of us to love as God has loved. God has taught us to love by sending His Son (1 John 4: 19), but we have also been 'taught by God to love each other' (1 Thessalonians 4:9) - something that Jesus elevated to a commandment (John 13: 34 - 35).

Over the weeks of our Lenten pilgrimage, I think that we all need to renew our grasp on the nature of God's love for us: a love that is constant, compassionate, kind, and responsive.

We need to look towards the cross and try to understand the extent of God's love for us, however we may see ourselves and however unlovable we may think ourselves to be.

We need to be reminded by the cross of Christ just how sweetly and tenderly God loves each one of us, not because of us but because of who He is. Then we need to pray for the strength and maturity to rise to the challenge to live our life in a way which is motivated by love that is just like that love of God.

This year the World Day of Prayer has been prepared by the women of Taiwan. Taiwan is an island rich in natural resources and culturally diverse. The women of Taiwan share the issues faced geographically, politically and socially and also their hopes for the future. Let us join with them as we give thanks for the beautiful island and people of Taiwan and encourage one another in our faith just as Apostle Paul did in his letters.

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast. An international committee is based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans. Finally, at the Church of the Ascension in Haywards Heath, people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Taiwan.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world - through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.

#### EARTHQUAKE NEWS/ SAMARA'S AID

North West Syria has been badly affected by the 2 recent earthquakes and because of the complicated political situation in that country little help has reached the affected region. Samara's Aid has swung into action, having some humanitarian aid already in Syria and strong teams of staff on the ground, ready to help. Teams have been put in place in Aleppo,



Latakia, Baniyas, Jebleh and Hama and are planning to help in a number of different and essential ways:

- Distributing the remaining aid shipped out last year (coats, shoes, dignity bags, hygiene items, mattresses, mobility aids including wheelchairs, crutches and zimmers)
- Provision of food as needed to the displaced
- Provision of water as needed to the displaced
- Provision of medical aid in the affected areas as needed
- We are sending another container of flour to make bread
- We preparing to send another container of clothing, hygiene items and mobility items.

If you are able to, **there is still time to help** by donating financially or, up until 2<sup>nd</sup> March, by donating clothes, footwear, hygiene items and mobility aids. Because of strict Syrian customs regulations, clothes, footwear and hygiene items must be new but mobility aids can be used if they are in very good condition.

# **IMARA-UGANDA EDUCATION FUND**

One of my favourite views is from the footpath from the old sweet shop down to Withylands, looking across towards the Downs. The view changes with every season

and in every kind of weather. Mists in the valley, clouds threatening a storm, and bright sunshine change the intensity of the light, the shapes and the colours. The beauty of it lifts my spirits. Sometimes, I stop and close my eyes and wonder how it would be never to see the beauty of God's creation. The sounds become sharper, especially the birdsong and there is beauty in that, but how I would miss the views as well as the security of knowing, that if I see the rough or muddy places, I am less likely to stumble or slip.

Among the scholarship children supported by Imara-Uganda Education Fund, there are six who are blind or partially sighted. There is still a stigma attached to disability in Uganda and disabled children may be hidden away and unable to attend school, and the wonderful potential each child has is not recognised. Gradually attitudes are changing and opportunities increasing. Harriet's father died and the family is very poor. Her siblings attended school when their mother could afford the fees and Harriet longed to join them. Eventually the opportunity came for her as there is a primary school for the blind near Lira. She was already 14 years old when she went to school for the first time.

Doreen's mother abandoned her, and when her father could not raise the money to send all his children to school, it was the sighted ones who attended.



Maybe Prisca's family are more enlightened. They have to be, as four of their seven children are totally blind. At home even the youngest of the sighted children had learned to help the blind ones to avoid hazards.

It was brought to our attention a few years ago that there is no secondary school suitable for the blind in the Lira area and many families cannot

afford to send their children to the nearest suitable school, a 2 hour journey away. It is of great concern that every year children drop out of school after their primary education and their future is bleak. We are planning, in partnership with the Catholic diocese in Lira, to build a secondary school for the blind next to their primary school. The school will be built in phases with the first buildings open for Senior One in January 2024. When completed the school will cater for 300 children, blind and sighted, and it will have 8 classrooms, a hall, libraries, IT rooms, science facilities and dormitories.



Imagine what a bright future will be made possible for blind children! This is a huge project for a tiny charity like ours – exciting but scary! The cost of living crisis means times are uncertain for us all but, once the various permissions are granted and the first phase of the building begins, we will need to raise as much money as we

can, both for the buildings and the equipment. We will welcome whatever little or big support is possible. Every pound will make a difference, giving new hope to these deserving children.

One of our blind students, Joy Mercy, gave a speech at a recent get together of the scholars. She said "We, the visually impaired, can do anything." Joy Mercy does not let her disability get in the way of living life to the full. She helps her team win national prizes in debating and she loves to sing. Her dream is to become a lawyer. We hope to make many such dreams come true.

Another of our visually impaired students was awarded a certificate for coming second in a sporting event against other schools.

I will keep you informed as the work begins and progresses. Please pray for the school and our blind children who are so precious and deserve so much more than to be returned home with limited prospects when they are capable of so much. Please help in any way you can.

# NEWS FROM OUR FRIENDS IN S.E. ASIA

Dear friends,

How are you all doing? We trust that 2023 started out well for you. Christmas time here was very wet and stormy, discouraging many people from any outdoor endeavours, but celebrating the first coming of our Saviour, Immanuel, was meaningful. Our celebration was more or less the same as in the past years though we didn't have time to put up a Christmas tree or many Christmas decorations.

We were blessed to have visitors from another island in December and how eager and hungry the women were to receive and learn from the Word! The event was supposed to be our Christmas party with some games, but the women would rather ask questions and learn than play games! One lady's mother quipped, "I am so amazed. You used to be so wicked but you have changed so much!" You can imagine the opportunity this gave the first lady to testify about what Christ has done for her.

The parable of the sower is very real in this country and we see people with doubts and people who fall away easily. Many struggle with debt. Covid is still around, too, causing families to fall sick and be discouraged. With other people, listening and studying the Word brings peace of mind.



In another city, about 6 hours' drive away, the Christian team are quite discouraged because they don't see much fruit, nor any hunger among the believers to study the Word. B visited recently and was able to pass on an MP3 player with Scripture in their mother tongue.

Family wise, we praise the Lord that our children are doing well. Our son is closer to choosing where and what to study next school year but decisionmaking is not that easy for someone who has a wide range of interests and abilities. He is still busy at the Orientation School as a resident assistant and is very keen on encouraging the participants to be involved in the different activities. He will go travelling in June to lead the students on a mission trip.

Our daughter had her written school leaving exams (in German, English and Mathematics) at the beginning of February. She has been working hard. Her oral exams (in Physics and geography) will be in May. She will be spending her Easter holidays with us again – the last time she will travel to our host city as a high schooler. Please pray for traveling mercies.





# News from Link to Hope 2022 Shoebox Appeal



We are thrilled that the final shoebox total for 2022 was 26,015 which is an increase on last year. A huge thank you to everyone who gave a shoebox, as well as all the people that donated to the appeal or sent items to fill the shoeboxes with.

A small team went out from the UK to deliver just some of your shoeboxes to contacts in Moldova. At the Link to Hope Canteen Project people were patiently and quietly queueing at the gate, wrapped up well against the cold, clutching bags in which were large, empty glass jars, which were then filled

with nutritious food which had been prepared by the canteen staff. These were carefully placed into their bags, and then we were able to pass each person a shoebox, which they gently received, in quiet, humble appreciation.

To see many of their faces light up in happiness at the unexpected gift, never fails to be humbling, it is as though they have been gifted the world. One blind lady recognised Lisa's voice from a few years back, and was so happy to be with her



again, savouring the gift of touch and time to share some of her daily challenges.

Boxes also went to Bulgaria, Romania and Ukraine. These were given out all over Ukraine including managing to deliver shoeboxes to the East of Ukraine. Every shoebox was gratefully received. All countries are struggling with finances and gifts such as toiletries and school items, as well as warm hats and gloves

make a huge difference to peoples lives.

The destruction of Ukraine's infrastructure means that millions of people have been left without power – no heating, lighting, ability to cook food, hot water and a lack of food in the shops – the list is endless. With our contact in Uzhgorod, Ukraine we have started to fund a centre for helping people with hot meals, drinks and support.

### LENT (from <u>www.40acts.org.uk</u>)

The word 'Lent' has nothing to do with fasting or giving things up. 'Lent' is a shortened version of the Old English word 'lencten', a word which simply means spring (in relation to the season). It is thought to have Germanic roots and seems likely to have been used to described the season when the days began to lengthen, signifying new life and renewal. Over time, the word Lent came to be linked specifically to the Christian tradition of fasting before Easter, which always coincided with the spring.

# MORE TRAVELLERS' TALES from Jill and Mike Veasey

After docking in Ashdod (Israel) we took a trip to Jaffa, which was a bit disappointing in that the vision we had of orange groves etc was totally wrong. Jaffa has been swamped by Tel Aviv so the Old Town, which we saw, including Simon the Tanner's House (where Peter stayed) was quite small. There were lots of references to Jonah and whales, but not much else to see apart from lots of traffic!



We sailed that evening to Alexandria – a place neither of us had visited before. First impressions were that it was a bit unusual to eat our breakfast on the sun deck, watched by armed guards on the roof of the port building!!

The Catacombs were our first stop and these were apparently discovered when a horse and cart suddenly disappeared down a hole

which opened up in the road. Since then a lot of digging has been done and we were able to go down a sort of spiral staircase to see the actual tombs. It's thought that a lot more is there to be discovered, but can't be explored until people who are living in the flats above have been rehoused!



Having survived the heat and dust there, we moved on to the second largest library in the world – having seen which, we could but wonder how big the biggest one was!! It was really impressive and interesting and we could have spent much longer there.

Following fish and chips Egyptian style (rice and calamari instead of chips and peas) we tackled the rush hour traffic to visit Omar Sharif's Uncle's house and museum. Again, very interesting, but by now we were wilting and were happy to go back to the boat, having the site of the original lighthouse pointed out on the way. There is now a fort built there.

The next day, again with a police escort, guns and all, we set off by coach for El Alamain, along recently constructed motorways, passing masses and masses of new construction. They're trying to encourage some of the millions who live in Cairo to move to the coastal areas and the new City of El Alamain. Desert? What desert?!

The El Alamain Museum was full of items from the desert war, including a Spitfire dug up from the sand, lots of uniforms of all sorts of nationalities, and a large array of tanks and armoured cars.



The number of graves in the memorial area was quite overpowering, especially some of the messages on the stones. A lot of bodies are still not recovered because of mine fields. We held a minute's silence and Tim – a retired Bishop – said a few words and all in all it was very moving.

Our journey home was quite entertaining as our driver tried to cut a corner and we found ourselves on a road he didn't know!! It caused a lot of amusement to watch our police escort having to get out of their car to ask the way!

Egypt was hot, dusty, noisy, in places dirty, but very interesting.

### **Holocaust Memorial Day**



Earlier, as part of our collective worship and following our themes of Justice and Service, we marked Holocaust Memorial Day (held on 27<sup>th</sup> January each year). They were shocked to learn that in the 1930s, many Jewish people in Europe were expected to follow these laws and were treated differently because of their faith. As you will no doubt be aware, millions of Jews lost their lives during the Holocaust. HMD encourages remembrance for all of these adults and children alongside the millions of other people killed during episodes of persecution and more recent genocides. We are incredibly fortunate that we are not subjected to such atrocities in the United Kingdom although sadly, many groups of people around the world continue to be treated badly because of their race, religion, gender or beliefs.
