RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends

As the disciples sat huddled together on the first Easter Sunday evening, they were frightened and confused. But then, Luke tells us that the risen Lord Jesus appeared to them



and gave them a promise. "I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so, stay in the

city until you have been clothed with power from on high" he said [Luke 24: 49]. As the disciples heard this, I wonder if they remembered the words of the prophet Joel, that God would pour out his Spirit on all people. I wonder if, in their confusion, they realized just what was being promised to them? Because it's a truth that is all too easily forgotten, that unless the church possesses 'the promise of the Father' or in other words, the miracle working power of the Holy Spirit, then it is nothing.

In the season of Pentecost and as we remember again the fulfilment of that promise - a fulfilment that transformed a tired, frightened, and confused group of disciples into the bold, confident preachers of the early church - we need to remember that God's promise was to all of us as well. That, just as the disciples were transformed by the power of God's Spirit, we too can be transformed. Transformed in ourselves, as we realize all of the things that we are capable of doing, all of the gifts that we each have - gifts and talents given to us by a loving God and which He will empower us to use through the power and the working of His Holy Spirit. Transformed in our prayer lives, as the Spirit helps us to pray, understanding our weakness and preventing our prayers from degenerating into mechanical drudgery or powerless routine. And transformed too in our worship and as we experience in that worship the presence of the Lord Jesus himself, amongst us and with us as we meet.

As the early church shows us, a church that is alive to the presence and power of the Holy Spirit will very quickly become something incredibly special. Something strong and something provocative to all of those around it. I believe too, that on a personal and individual level, where we are open to the work of the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives, our lives will be transformed, changed, and so enriched as we are drawn increasingly into the likeness of Christ.

In the season of Pentecost let me encourage all of us to pray and to ask God to make the power of the Holy Spirit come alive in our lives, and let's pray too that God will use each of us through that power as well.

With my prayers for you all.

NEWS FROM HEATHER JOHNSTONE IN TANZANIA (CMS)

Dear friends,

We hit the ground running at the start of the year and have been busy, not only with customers, but also getting essential maintenance and repair work done, as well as some renovations, as three years of not doing any upkeep had taken its toll on our outdoor cafe. 2023 is looking brighter and the cafe is doing considerably better than we were doing a year ago, or indeed since way before the global pandemic began, which is a real blessing, although we're not out of the woods just yet.

Currently we work when we have customers, which is usually Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday, but if there's a demand we'll open when it suits our customers as we can be completely flexible. We've had many visitors from all over the world and it has been a delight to welcome them, but I would love to share with you the visits of two sets of Rehema friends who also have very big prayer requests.

The founders and inspiration behind the Rehema Project are Jono and Amy Vink. Their eldest daughter, Lili, is now 22 years old and recently got married. She and her husband visited Musoma so he could see where she spent 12 years of her life up until the age of 15. The Rehema women were delighted to see her again and of course, a second wedding celebration was planned and hosted by the ladies. The food was paid for by Amy and Jono. A wonderful day was had by all.

We have more recently, however, had bad news from Australia. Amy's health has deteriorated. She was first diagnosed with cancer 14 years ago and she has just learned that it has spread to the liver. We had a prayer time every week, praying for Amy and anyone else who is struggling with illness at this time. If you'd like us to pray for you, just let me know. Amy asks that we pray that a treatment option be found, and although she is deeply grateful to God for the time he has already given her, she asks for more time.

It was also wonderful to welcome the Stensland family to the cafe after an absence of six years. They were committed Rehema supporters and would regularly travel from their Lutheran mission 40 minutes away to have some relaxation time at the cafe with their four children. Julian, their youngest son, is now 12 and he has been diagnosed with Batten disease, which has links to dementia – it has already taken so much from him (he is blind) and is diminishing him every day.


I was blessed recently to have [my colleague] Cesi's three young daughters pay me a visit at my home. They arranged and planned it, and although it was with the consent and oversight of a parent, they came on their own. They brought their schoolbooks so I could see how they were getting on. We had a tea party and lots of laughs and then went shopping for mosquito nets to cover their shared bed. At the end of the visit, they were whisked off on their motorbike taxi which is driven by my friend Edwin.

Our cafe manager, Grace, had a baby girl almost two months ago. She's back at work, and the baby sleeps in the workshop (where I'm based) so as I type this missive, it is to the sweet sound of a baby sucking her fingers. Her name is Lightness.

I've said this often before, but living and working here I am reminded time and time again of what a great provider our Father is. Often there are circumstances that seem hopeless or problems that seem insurmountable, but we can take comfort in the knowledge that we can come to him with every need, concern, or worry we have, and no matter how small or large our issue, he knows what is going on in our lives and he provides for us. Sometimes there are situations that seem quite bleak, but

the Lord God is a great, big God and he has a habit of making beautiful things happen and he delivers. He is always with us regardless of what we are going through, and he encourages us to share our physical, spiritual and emotional needs with him. I am also extremely grateful for the numerous and wonderful Rehema cohorts who support our project and numerous women and children in so many ways. We give thanks that the Rehema team were able to receive an Easter hamper of 5kg rice, 1kg meat, 1kg vegetables and a small cash contribution. Maria and Christina, two young girls from difficult backgrounds, are being sponsored to attend a vocational sewing school, and Grace Salama, a young orphan, is being sponsored to attend boarding school. Grace Jonas, a young deaf girl, received a gift of a sewing machine so she can start her own small business at home. We received financial contributions towards the repairs and maintenance work at Rehema; mosquito nets have been provided for families, helping to protect them; and so much more.

FSW May 2023 update

Dear Friends,

It has been a year now since our new practitioners joined and grew the team to 20. The time has flown by and we



have been able to support so many more families – in fact, in our last financial year we directly supported over 600 families. 5 years ago that number was 148 so it is really encouraging to see how much we have grown during this period. Sadly we are currently having to turn some families away as we simply do not have space either on current caseloads or on waiting lists – we hate to do this but we need to keep our practitioners' caseloads manageable. So please do pray for all our staff and the families in need of support. We will work with them as soon as we can.

Behind the scenes things have been very busy. We have recruited two members of staff to support the volunteer and community engagement aspects of our work, one for each half of the county. This will hopefully bring new volunteers to FSW who can help practitioners with group activities as well as one-to-one support, as well as increasing the number of volunteers to help in our Eastbourne shop and the fundraising team.



Our foodbank is still very low on all items with the exception of teabags and pasta, so if you are able to help us replenish our stock levels we would be incredibly grateful. We are in particular need of tinned meats, soup, baked beans, tinned vegetables and cleaning products.

Open Garden season is in full swing now. It would be lovely to see you at some of them. *

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

The purpose of the APCM is to receive reports on general parish activities and financial matters. The annual meeting also elects new members to the PCC and to deanery synod every three years. The reports and Trustees' reports and financial statements had been made available online and in church before the meeting.

The meeting thanked all those who help run the church and manage the finances, buildings, and facilities. Rev John Crutchley was thanked for all his hard work in delivering mission to the parish and for all the work that goes into preparing services, which is much appreciated.

The meeting unanimously voted to elect the following to serve on the PCC:

Nigel Cheater Glynis Doerr Mervyn James Gina Paul Deb Ruse Jill Veasey The financial statements show a small deficit for the year. It was noted that St. Peter's had survived the effects of COVID reasonably well, though caution was expressed over rising costs, particularly regarding utility costs. The parishioners at St. Peter's are generous in their giving and were thanked for their support especially those who gave via the Parish Giving Scheme. This method of giving collects donations and Gift Aid, if applicable, on behalf of the church. This method allows the cash flow to be predictable and regular, which helps in the day to day running of church affairs.

NEWS FROM S.E. ASIA

Dear friends,

Just a few more weeks to go before we go on Home Assignment. Time flies so fast with so many things still



to do before we go... We are thankful that a family can stay at our house when we are away.

Bible studies and language learning came to an abrupt halt when my teacher had to move out of town to avoid debt collectors. She got hospitalized a couple of weeks ago and went back to her mum's house to recuperate and for Eid.

Many local women are from poor families and struggle with their children's health and education. There are government programs that give them free health care and even free education but they struggle because basic documents such as birth certificates or health cards are not in place. One 17-year old girl with inflammation of the gall bladder is sick but at first could not go to hospital because they thought her health card was missing.

Two weeks ago I went with the women to invite some even poorer women to join us in breaking the Ramadan fast. It was an opportunity to give them some basic food stuff and ask them what fasting means for them. Many of them said that they fast to fulfil their religious obligations. None said that it is to get closer to God.

A couple of local blind believers are expecting a baby. It is hard to imagine how to take care of a baby as blind people. Please pray that the Lord will send them a seeing woman who can help the mother care for the baby.



A still has a month of teaching work. It has been a challenge teaching an unfamiliar subject but PTL that's done now and he's just teaching subjects that he has taught before.

Our son is coming to the end of his time with the Orientation School. He has just got his driving licence and this month he will visit the university where he might study. He will lead his team from the Orientation School on a mission trip to Armenia for about 3 weeks in June.

Our daughter was with us for a month during her Easter break. She did her written school leaving exam in February and is preparing for her oral exams at the end of May/beginning of June. We will attend her high school graduation and a week later we will go to Europe for Home



Assignment. We plan to return here at the end of October, provided we get all our clearances (medical, finance, team).

Thank you for journeying with us in prayer the past few years. The Lord is doing things and we hope to see more fruit.

RECYCLING TEXTILES

Have you ever wondered how to dispose of that tatty curtain or suit? Read on!

If your clothes or textiles are beyond repair or reuse, don't put them in landfill - take them to your local textile bank or recycling centre [Burgess Hill or East Grinstead]. Items from textiles banks are collected and sorted. Clothes and shoes that still have some life left in them will be sorted and sent for reuse (90%). Old, well-worn or torn textiles will be recycled by shredding.



They are then used to manufacture a range of cleaning cloths, flock rags and felt materials used in automotive sound proofing and mattress stuffing (10%). Unfortunately, textile banks can't accept pillows, duvets, carpets or rugs.

AROUND THE VILLAGE

UK's largest outdoor art installation at Wakehurst

Since 18th May the Grade 1 listed Elizabethan Mansion at Wakehurst has been home to one of the UK's largest outdoor art installations – the size of 25 double decker buses!

Whilst the mansion undergoes an extensive roof restoration, Wakehurst have commissioned the creation of 'Planet Wakehurst'. This is a bespoke photo montage by the Australian-born artist, Catherine Nelson. It is on a huge canvas, stretching over 1550 square



metres around 3 sides of the mansion. It uses photography of plants from across the 535-acre site and is a celebration of Wakehurst's biodiversity, from the colourful blooms of the abundant Water Gardens to the towering Giant Redwoods of California in Horsebridge Wood.

Installation took 6 days, using sustainably-sourced and weatherproof fabric which will be recycled at the end of the display.

Visitors can see Wakehurst from a whole new perspective from a 33ft viewing platform.


