

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The season of Remembrance is a poignant time. The remembrance of those we have loved and lost is moving and emotional and filled with memories that are frequently joyful but always tinged with sadness. And then follows our remembrance of those who gave their lives in the service of their country. With its stillness and



silence and cry of 'We will remember them', it is a moment to cause any of us to shed a tear and to heighten our longing for peace. For a lasting peace. Especially as we watch, helplessly, the events that forever unfold across the globe. At the continuing horrors of the war in Ukraine with the suffering and devastation that it has brought to so many lives. And now a horrendous terrorist attack on the people of Israel, so extreme in its brutality as to defy words, but bringing with it the suffering of so many innocent Palestinians that has already been the response. Our grief and shock just grows as we witness the lives of so many ordinary people being devastated. 'How long O Lord, how long' writes the psalmist. How long indeed before we all heed the call for peace.

But perhaps we are not so helpless in all of this. As we remember we should be praying in thanks for the peace that we now enjoy, but also praying for the peace of our world and for reconciliation between all people. It is clear beyond all question from the teaching of Jesus and his apostles that Christians are called to peace and to be peacemakers. It is all a part of the truly radical way of living that Jesus taught us and showed us in the Kingdom of God. We are actively to 'pursue peace', we are to 'strive for peace with all people' and so far as it depends on us, we are to 'live peaceably with all'. And this all calls for prayer. Something we can all do. In such prayer we are asking to share in the true nature of God, seeking to overcome evil with good, and hatred and fear with love.

I was struck many years ago by hearing someone say that it is underlying negative attitudes that are at the root of all human conflict. Negative attitudes towards others or about others and their ways.

Such negative attitudes need to be challenged, in others, but also when they occur in us. That self-assertiveness and divisive critical spirit that so easily divides people into 'them' and 'us'. True peace begins with us and in our determination to count others 'in' rather than counting them 'out'. True peace starts when we break down those barriers between people whether caused by race, creed, religion or whatever other difference we may think we have. True peace starts when we remember instead as the apostle Paul writes in his letter to the Galatians that now 'there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for [we] are all one in Christ Jesus'. It may sometimes be difficult to be a peacemaker, Christ himself has certainly shown us that, but we must always be prepared to pray for peace and to give peace a chance.

Let me leave you with this prayer of Archbishop Hosam Naoum of Jerusalem. Use it in your own prayers for peace.

O God of all justice and peace,

we cry out to you in the midst of the pain and trauma of violence and fear which prevails in the Holy Land.

Be with those who need you in these days of suffering; we pray for people of all faiths – Jews, Muslims and Christians and for all people of the land.

While we pray to you, O Lord, for an end to violence and the establishment of peace,

we also call for you to bring justice and equity to the peoples. Guide us into your kingdom where all people are treated with dignity and honour as your children – for to all of us you are our Heavenly Father.

In Jesus' name we pray, Amen

With my own prayers and best wishes.

NEWS from NEPAL

Milan sent us the following update in October:

[My wife] Shusma is currently in Canada for 3 weeks for meetings, sharing and speaking. Here in Kathmandu from Sunday October 1st, we have started a one-month



Leadership Training where we have 17 participants from various parts of Nepal.

We had a great family time at the Ichthus Revive and Overseas conference in the UK in July/August. It was our great joy and blessing to participate at the conference and also visit a few places - Colchester, London, Bristol, South Wales, North Devon, Bracknell, Binfield, Scotland etc.

Since we arrived back in Nepal, Prajwalita and Nesia started their school at the new grade, and they are enjoying it. Amishu had a great time in the summer Project run by Ichthus in London. Now she is continuing her IT Study in Kathmandu.

Shusma and I have been busy with the Church, Charity, School and also visiting within Nepal for the ministries. We have so much to thank God for. Also, it was really encouraging to see that our work amongst children, young people and women is growing very much. Aanandit Church celebrated its 21st anniversary on August 31st. Now we have 12 Churches in Nepal. We have also started an online church for the Aanandit members who are overseas and there are around 30 of them scattered in around 10 countries.

We are continuing to help and serve orphans and destitute Children of Nepal. Sometimes it is quite a challenge to serve the needy in a country like Nepal where Christians are seen as an agent of the west and so forth. Please pray that our authority and system can understand the importance of social and charity work and they would be positive towards this.

It is our great joy to announce that the building of Project 2030 is going to start soon as we've just signed the contract with a Christian

Building Company. We are ever so grateful and value your prayers for this project.

We have a number of programs in the days ahead as there will be big Hindu festivals and long holidays in October/November. We will have our own program among church people, women and youth. We would love to have your prayers in this matter too.

It is already October and we are almost at the end of our short home



assignment. We are truly grateful to God for the opportunity to meet up with supporters and family and especially to be with A's parents and our children. We have just said our goodbyes to our children – our son has moved to a city in Eastern Europe where he is studying. We are thankful that he has found some Christian fellowship. Our daughter has also begun 'Orientation School' where her brother spent the past two years. Praise the Lord for we know that He will look after them while we are apart.

The past months we have been staying with A's 84-year old parents. They live on their own but Dad has dementia and a month ago he was diagnosed with prostate cancer. My Mum (in Asia) also has cancer in her lymph nodes and a very large swelling around her neck. She is in good spirits and just celebrated her 85th birthday. Please pray that we can still see each other – hopefully next year.



Personally we are thankful for our own good health. We are also grateful for time we have spent with friends and supporters here in Europe and that we can enjoy the beauty of this land as we travel and visit people.

It was also great that our children could be present during some of our presentations here in Europe. They have been able to learn more about our work which we could not share much of when they were younger.

Now we're preparing to go back to S.E. Asia and our last four weeks will be full of preparations, including final medical appointments and getting new visas before they expire at the beginning of December. We're hoping to fly back on 5th November.





It was so lovely to finally feel there is light at the end of the tunnel."

We were able to take 12 families to Dalesdown for a weekend residential in early September, which proved to be a wonderful time with unseasonably nice weather. Activities included cake decorating, stick man craft, football tournaments and the ever-popular prize bingo!



Our Christmas plans are well under way, with parties being planned by nearly all our practitioners, as well as arrangements for Christmas toy and food collections.

SAMARA'S AID EXPANDS ITS WORK IN SYRIA

Samara writes:

In spite of the enormous challenges and heartbreak we are seeing every day in Syria, I'm so encouraged by the difference our work and our teams are making in the lives of the vulnerable women and children we are serving. To empower, train and equip vulnerable widows and single mothers to be able to support themselves and to feed and clothe their children, makes everything we are doing in Syria worthwhile. Yet we are doing so much more than that.

We have been looking for a building or piece of land in a new part of Syria to open a 3rd centre for Orphans and Widows. After being offered many which were not suitable, or too expensive, we are thrilled to have finally found a building that is ideal. The fact that it is only partially built is perfect because the foundations and structural columns have been laid, and the vendor will complete the exterior walls for us, then also help us finish the rest of the building, while we still have the freedom to design the internal spaces to suit our unique needs.



The building is on the outskirts of a very populated area and is on four floors, each 250m², which enables us to separate the different spaces in a logical and secure way, with each floor having its own internal entrance which can be locked independently. We have seen the importance of having space for training women in hairdressing and sewing to give them incomes. We also need to separate the spaces being used for adults and children for safeguarding reasons. As with all of our projects, our plan is to cover the roof with solar panels to provide the power needed.

This building will enable us to have a store where the aid we send can be securely kept and sorted. This is essential if we are to continue to send aid from the UK to Syria. We are struggling in the area where our city outreach centre is based from a complete lack of storage and distribution space. Until now the nearby empty medical centre building has been a great blessing to use as a storage and distribution area, but as the team are now preparing to open this 2nd medical centre very soon, there will be nowhere there to use for storing or distributing aid. We have learnt from experience that in our new projects, space with ground floor access is now urgent and essential.

One floor will be a dedicated third outreach centre for orphans, poor and vulnerable children. It will offer around the same amount of space as the first two centres, but will be a better use of the space and will be more efficient, based all on one floor. It will have five classrooms where various lessons and activities can be provided, and a dedicated large dining room which can seat up to 130 children in one sitting which can also be used as a room for showing films and doing group activities.

We are also now in real need of a dedicated office for our sister charity (which we founded with our team in Syria a number of years ago). Given how much our work has grown in Syria in recent years it is now long overdue. We don't currently have any dedicated offices or admin space for the overall running of all our work there, in spite of our numerous projects.

Some of the space will also be used for new projects we are planning, which I will share more about in the coming weeks, which will support our medical work in Syria.

Parents and Carers were able to join us as Cuckoo Class presented the service based on the theme, 'A Rainbow Harvest'. What a colourful and musical time we had! Well done, Cuckoo Class. Thank you to all of the families who were able to bring the generous donations of food and other provisions. This has gone this year to Ardingly Connected Together who work in the village supporting families.

As we move through the term, we will be having various parents evenings and the occasional workshop. Please do check on our website for all the up-to-date information and dates. We have an open morning coming up in the school on November 7th so, if you know any prospective parents, please do let them know – we would love to see them and let them see our lovely school.

Ardingly Parish Council

Autumn is proving to be a promising season of progress.

We would like to welcome Lee Dunkley who will be joining the Parish Council in the newly combined role of **Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer (RFO).** He recently moved from Cornwall to the local area and is looking forward to getting to know Ardingly better and helping us to improve our processes. We will soon be announcing timings of the clerk surgeries so that you can have the opportunity to meet him and share any comments or concerns you have. His first monthly Parish Council meeting will be our next session which is November 14th at 7:30pm at Hapstead Hall where all are welcome.

Following a thorough tender process, we have agreed to work with GHP Construction from Crawley to progress the refurbishment of the **Ardingly Pavilion**. Given the increased expense of everything in construction, we have developed a plan which will be a cost effective approach and ensure our commitment to shifting the use of the pavilion to that of a community asset - involving both the sports teams and the village. This will mean ensuring the building is renovated so that it is warm, dry and has up to date plumbing and electrics, and also is adapted to be accessible and offer a welcoming space for all. We will be commencing with clearing the roof of moss and repairing the tiles in the coming weeks and intend to have all works completed by the spring. In order to deliver this plan we will require village involvement in some of the strip out and decorating stages, so should anyone want to get involved, please do contact any of your Parish Councillors or Lee on his email: clerk@ardingly.org.

You also may have noticed that we have purchased and installed a new green metal storage unit at the recreation ground to help with storage during the pavilion refurbishment works and going forward. Half the new unit will be allocated to the Ardingly Football Club to store all of their equipment and the other half to be used by the Parish Council. Ardingly Cricket Club will have sole use of the garage unit beside it. This will help to keep the pavilion free from clutter and ensure ease of use for everyone. This was funded by the Parish Council and a grant from the Football Foundation.

On Remembrance Sunday the village will be populated with poppies to recognise those who fought bravely in wars for our country. The memorial gates to the recreation ground, which were erected to commemorate WWII, are planned to be refurbished before then. The WI will decorate the benches and the gates with their crocheted poppies. There will be a Remembrance Service on the morning of 12th November at the recreation ground, so please do come along.

We continue to work through our outstanding maintenance works throughout the village, and welcome anyone who can offer to lend a helping hand - no matter how much time you have! Should you be interested in getting involved, please do let us know!

Remembering the National Service - 60 years on

This year marks 60 years since the end of National Service. The Royal British Legion and the nation will be celebrating all that a generation of young men did for this country during those years, when conscription became just a part of growing up.



National Service drew in a staggering number of young men – more than two million of them were conscripted between the end of the Second World War and May 1963, when the last serviceman was demobbed.

Conscription had come about following the war, when there was a huge demand for military resources in Britain. Young service men were badly needed to retain the Empire, and to contribute to the occupation of Germany and Japan. Yet low birth rates in Britain in the 1930s meant there were fewer young men available for military service.

And so the 1947 National Service Act was brought in as a solution. It meant that young men aged 18 – 26 were required to serve in the Armed Forces for 18 months. They were sent to posts in the UK and to British garrisons around the world. Some fought on the front lines, and some worked as clerks. Some taught in the Education Corps, and some were on sentry duty.

For many of them, it would have been the first time they lived away from their family, let alone left the country. So the National Service made great demands on them – and left them with a wide range of experiences.
