RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

When you read the gospel accounts of the birth of Jesus you quickly see that there are angels everywhere in the Christmas story.

An angel turns up and informs a man called Zechariah that his elderly wife is going to have a



baby boy - who would grow up to be John the Baptist. An angel then turns up to tell Mary that she's going to give birth to the Son of God. It is an angel who then turns up to tell her husband-to-be, Joseph, that his fiancée is pregnant as a result of the Holy Spirit and that he should go ahead and marry her anyway. Later on, it is an angel who warns Joseph to flee with Mary and the child to Egypt, because of the anger and threats of Herod.

It is an angel who turns up to tell the shepherds who were watching their flocks that a Saviour had been born in the little town of Bethlehem - and he's followed by a whole choir of angels singing God's praises. "*Hark the Herald angels sing, glory to the newborn king!*" Everywhere you look in the story of Jesus' birth, angels are found to be playing a critical role. Which tells us all something, I believe. It tells us that we need to listen to those angel voices and to all that they have to say, and to give them a place in our hearts warmest love this Christmas. Because theirs is a message of delivery but also of deliverance for us all.

The angels call us all to come to Bethlehem this Christmas and to behold the baby Jesus. To come and adore him. But in truth, angels are only messengers. They are messengers of God. So, it is actually he who calls us to come, to behold and to sing his Son's praises. To give him all the glory in the wonderful Christmas season.

In everything else that we have to do this Christmas let's try always to remember that and so to come. To come and adore the Son of God who came into the world to bring us light for our darkness, joy beyond measure, and life eternal.

With my prayers and warmest wishes to everyone for a peaceful, happy and Holy Christmas.

We held our Annual General Meeting at the Church Centre on Sunday 29th October. It was an Open Meeting and we were very pleased to welcome some of our sponsors and other interested parties to hear what we have achieved in the past twelve months and also our plans for the future.

While enjoying some light refreshments we were able to share that our financial position is sufficiently healthy that we had recently purchased some much-needed laboratory equipment to enable the Clinic to undergo a wider range of medical tests both for the benefit of own patients but also to provide these services to other clinics lacking such sophisticated equipment.

David Ogilvie, who had designed and overseen the original building, brought along his plans for the required extension to the Clinic, to provide an additional Delivery Suite and explained that we are now awaiting competitive quotations for the work to be undertaken.

I announced that Peggy Guggenheim, who for many years had acted as our Treasurer, had stood down at the end of our financial



year and we had appointed Tom Hughes as her replacement. Unfortunately, Peggy was unable to attend the AGM so, immediately after the meeting, Pat and I went to see her and presented her with an especially painted plate (pictured), depicting the Clinic, bearing the flags of the U.K. and The Gambia and inscribed 'Thank You, Peggy' to show our appreciation of all her hard work for AOJA.

The meeting closed with a vote of thanks to Pat for providing refreshments for the occasion.

CPAS (Church Pastoral Aid Society)



CPAS are patrons of St Peter's. Their work is all about helping churches in the UK and Ireland reach out to the men, women and children in their communities with the life-changing good news of Jesus Christ. Their work includes developing leaders and arranging School Ventures.

Kat Taylor, Children and Families' Worker at Christ Church Moreton (Chester diocese), led on a <u>School Venture</u>. She explains how School Ventures are impacting her job: 'Shortly after I began my role as a Children and Families' Worker, I decided to serve on the Wirral School Venture. Before I knew it, I was in an astronaut suit on a stage in front of 50 children talking about the Trinity!



'School Ventures have helped me to develop the skills I really needed for my role at Christ Church Moreton, as well as drastically improving the relationship with our local school. Before the residential I didn't really feel like I had a place at the school, but now I have an Ethos Group and the children help me with my school assemblies. School

Ventures have helped me earn my place.

'I've since served on two further School Ventures, and I've seen incredible transformations in some of the children. The highlight for me is always seeing the children switch on to a revelation of who God is and how much he loves them.

'These residentials really are something special. It's not like being at school or even at Sunday school for the children. We get to be fully immersed with them from when they wake up until they go to sleep, as they learn about the gospel and process it all. I just love how we get to go through such a long journey with the children in such a short space of time.

'When we become Christians we have a choice – whether we want to be part of God's story, or just our own. When we choose to be part of God's story, it means we're part of what he's doing. And he's doing wondrous things through CPAS, Ventures and Falcons, and School Ventures. It's incredible to be part of it all.'

40th ANNIVERSARY FOR ST CATHERINE'S HOSPICE

NEW PREMISES:

St Catherine's Hospice has been marking its 40th anniversary this year and will soon be moving to brand-new premises at Pease Pottage.

The hospice has cared for thousands of loved ones at Malthouse Road in Crawley, and in October visitors were able to drop in, write in a memory book and take time to reflect. To mark this momentous year and pay tribute to the last 4 decades of care, a time capsule has been buried in the reflective garden of the new hospice.

The new building on Grace Holland Avenue, in the heart of the Woodgate development, is larger and has 24 beds. It will be opening to patients at the start of December and has been funded solely through donations from supporters of St Catherine's.

The project has been 10 years in the making and the larger premises will make it possible for the hospice to help more people who are facing the end of their lives and to support more families.

FUNDRAISING:

Amongst their Christmas fundraising activities St Catherine's are offering to wrap Christmas gifts and decorate them in Crawley's County Mall, in return for a donation. The hospice has also partnered with JustHelping and will collect old Christmas trees in exchange for a donation.

In 2024 a team will be leading a week's trek in Jordan, following an ancient Bedouin migration route to Petra. Trekkers will cover up to 10 miles a day and walk through stony desert landscapes and across mountainous rocky terrain, being rewarded with stunning views of some of Jordan's most spectacular natural scenery.

Dear Friends,

We are in one of our busiest times of the year at the moment, as we juggle the many needs of our families as well as all the



preparations for Advent and Christmas. Parties are planned, hamper packing dates are scheduled and we are getting daily calls from churches and other organisations asking what gifts would be most appropriate this year. Thank you to everybody who is supporting us this year with food, presents, financial donations or by volunteering – we are incredibly grateful.

Away from the festive planning, things remain very difficult for our families with the increased energy costs over the winter months contributing to financial problems.
