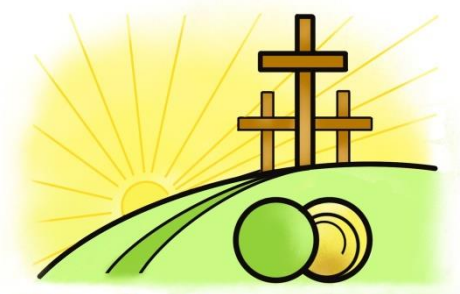

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

We are all meaning making creatures. By that I mean that we all have a mental framework to help us to make sense of life. For me, that is my Christian faith, although many others would describe their mental framework as a "world-view." And there is quite an array of faiths, beliefs and world-views for us to choose from nowadays.



Many are 'materialists.' They believe that what you see is what you get. For me, the trouble with this view is that it only satisfies today, has no answer for tomorrow, and ignores the fact that he who dies owning all the toys - still dies! Then there are others who argue that there is no God, no "grand design", that we are stuck with our past, that the future looks bleak so all we can do is to make the best of the present moment. But this is surely a counsel of despair that raises more questions than it answers. It's why I find the Christian option so much more satisfying - intellectually and emotionally.

In the person of Jesus Christ we find tremendous resources for understanding ourselves and finding our identity and purpose. Belief in Jesus provides answers to those timeless questions such as "where can I find security," "what is the meaning of life" and "what on earth am I doing here?" It provides the answers because it is based not on people's ideas and theories but on historical facts and over 2000 years of human experience. Quite simply, it works! And it works because at the heart of the Christian faith is the person and heart of Jesus and especially His death on the Cross and His Resurrection. The discovery that Jesus truly is alive today assures us that his promises are trustworthy and that faith in him is a living faith that makes all the difference.

In him the past need no longer blight the present, whilst the future is secure and becomes something to anticipate with joy.

For me, choosing Jesus offers not only his way of seeing things, but his very self to accompany me through life - past, present and future. No wonder the Easter shout of praise is: "*Christ is risen! Alleluia! He is risen indeed. Alleluia!*"

With my very best wishes to everyone this Easter.

NEWS FROM NEPAL

Greetings to you in the most precious name of our Lord Jesus from Nepal. We hope you are doing well by His grace.

It is our joy to share some of the exciting things God has been doing in our nation and in the Church. Also all our girls are doing well in their studies.

During Christmas there were many programs and most of the Aanandit churches invited others to the Carol singing, Children's Programme and also the main Christmas Day where the Gospel has been preached and the love of God shared. In many places public Christmas programmes were organized and the President, Prime minister, Govt. officials and Political Leaders also sent their wishes to the Christian community in Nepal. We also took every opportunity to share the Gospel through messages, gifts for children and food for all after the Christmas services.

In recent months and weeks, we had several programs at Aanandit Churches to empower families and to help others. Recently we had a sponsored walk and a day retreat program. Also, a one day program was held at our church about good parenting and to understand children's emotions and to manage that accordingly. Praise God !!



There are now 12 Aanandit churches across Nepal. The main one, in Imadole Lalitpur, started 21 years ago and has around 170 believers. It is very active in outreach and in supporting those in need. Other churches are very small, one has only 6 believers. Across the 12 churches there are 493 believers.

Two churches, in Mankha and Tanahu, need a hall to worship, and we appreciate your prayers for this. We have prayers, heart desires and plan to plant more churches in the future so please pray and help us in any way you can. If you would like to know more, please feel free to contact us. LINK TO HOPE SHOEBOX APPEAL 2023

Thank you so much for all your shoeboxes and donations. The final total was 26,417 Family & Elderly Shoeboxes. Every year a small team from the UK goes and visits one of our project managers in Eastern Europe and helps them deliver shoeboxes. It's very important for us as a charity to see how the shoeboxes are delivered and to whom. In 2023 a small team went out to Romania and they have written a Shoebox Delivery Diary to update you on what happened when they were there. We paid a quick visit to one family who had been evicted from their derelict building along with five other families. The only offer they had was to go and live in a corrugated shed in the middle of a field. The mother was ill and lying on a mattress, there were two boys – 10 and 14 and a father. A farmer had let them use his old tool shed. It was extremely cold.

We then went to a house with eight older children whose parents had left years before when they were all very young. There were only two people in the house when we visited however they took the shoeboxes with delight.

Next we climbed a steep hill to visit a mother with 8 children and their neighbours who had a new born baby.

In Garcin, the largest Roma village in Eastern Europe, we met three sisters who had been living in squalid conditions. The local church helped move them to a one roomed house, simple but warm. Two were disabled and the one sister who is not, goes and gets the food.





However there is only one set of shoes between the three of them!

We visited many other families all with problems and health conditions.

We gave your shoeboxes out to so many people and these are just a few of the photos.

One lady had missing fingers, no electricity and no sanitation. It was pitched black and she lives in one room to keep warm.

We visited a grandfather who lives in one room with his wife, his daughter, his son in law and his grandchild. The room measured 4 m x 4m and there was a tiny bathroom to one side.



We then drove to a more built up area nearer the town and visited families in flats and one rooms. We found a father going through the rubbish trying to find something to eat. Imagine his surprise when we arrived and gave him a shoebox for his children.



It is indeed a privilege to be your hands and feet when we hand the boxes over to people living very different lives to the ones most of us do. You can feel helpless or you can feel that you are at least giving joy and showing love, even for a short while to those that

need it. Thank you to everyone that made a shoebox for us, donated, knitted, created, prayed, drove, gifted, sacrificed and co-ordinated for us. We simply couldn't do it without you.

Visits to WSCC Waste / Recycling Centres

According to the WSCC website and newsletters, the "Book to Recycle" scheme has expanded across West Sussex and you will now need to book a [30 minute] slot to visit any of the Waste / Recycling Centres. You can make a total of five visits in a calendar month.

You can book on the day you want to visit (subject to availability), or up to 14 days beforehand. You need to provide the registration number of the vehicle you will be attending the centre in. You also need to provide your email address so that confirmation of your booking can be sent. Proof of address is required on the day.

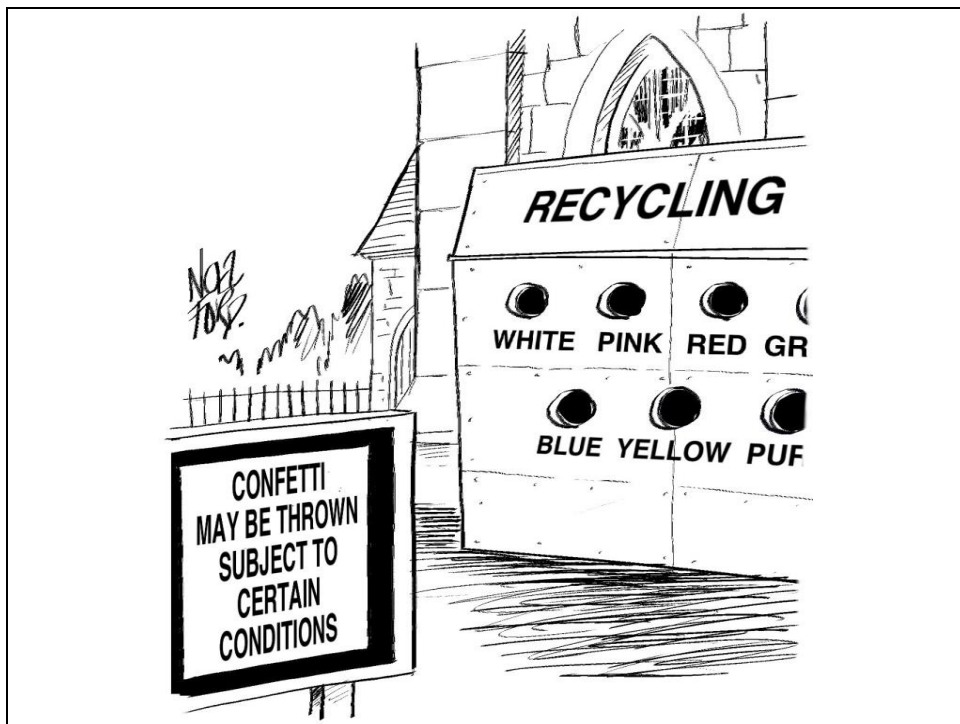
The WSCC eNewsletter for residents January 2024 states:
"A review showed that most sites with the scheme recycle more materials, reducing the overall amount of waste processed, making the sites more efficient and helping to lower the cost of disposal."

Changes in Recycling

Recycling of Terracycle items at the Stand Up Inn stopped 28th January. However, since October 2023 Sainsbury's now offer **flexible plastic packaging** recycling, including crisp packets, food pouches, salad bags, biscuit and cake wrappers and carrier bags.



Many charity shops do not accept **electrical items**, although they may be in perfectly good working order. Age UK and the Children's Trust, both in South Road, Haywards Heath, are the exception and do have a licence to accept these items.

It is a community project that lends out a variety of items, ranging from garden equipment to kitchenware and DIY tools, plus a whole lot more. The idea is based on the sharing economy and is a way to save money and the planet at the same time.

The charity is based at the 1st Lindfield Scout hut on Eastern Road, Lindfield (RH16 2LP) and is open on Tuesday mornings (9.30am to 11am) and Saturday mornings (9am to 10am).

After registering on the website you will be able to reserve and borrow items for a small fee. All items must be collected and returned at the Lindfield Scout hut during opening hours.

A few items are not stored at the Scout Hut due to space constraints. If you want to borrow an item where the location is showing as 'offsite' you will need to book it at least 24 hours before you want to collect it so that it can be brought to the scout hut for you to collect.

There is also a 'wish list' on the website, so that items can be donated to the scheme.

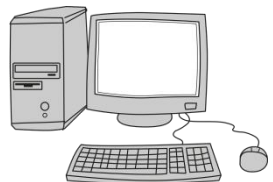

AROUND THE VILLAGE

There are lots of changes around the village to report this month!

STORM DAMAGE

We've had a few storms recently and Storm Isher seems to have caused the most damage. A sizeable tree blew down in the Recreation Ground but thankfully there are no reports of any injuries to people. Other people had fence panels down and similar problems.



PAVEMENTS and KERBS

Most of the news about this is covered on the Parish Council pages, and clearly they have put a lot of work into upgrading the Pavillion in the Rec and organising improvements to the pavements and kerbs around the village. The section of road and pavement near Holmans looks very neat and now has what I believe are called 'tactile pedestrian dropped crossing' points to help disabled people and anyone with a buggy. The pavement on the Oak Green has been resurfaced and also has dropped crossing points. There is more to come – next stop the High Street!

WATER

For weeks there has been a considerable amount of water draining across College Road and it was particularly dangerous during the icy weather we had in December. Several people have reported the matter to the Water Authorities, and they have declared that it is not their responsibility. The Parish Council say that a formal notification has now been made to Highways, who have assessed the situation and scheduled the unblocking of the drains along College Road, as these appear to be the cause of the problem. The Council is being kept up to date about the situation.

TREE FELLING

What a lot of small and medium sized trees have been cut down south of the river, opening up the side of the wood considerably. No longer do the trees form a canopy overhead, although I'm advised that "they will soon grow back".

ARDINGLY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

With snowdrops around and daffodils coming out, there are glimpses of spring and the sunshine's hinting at what's to come!

With the previous inclement weather, however, came a fallen tree in the recreation ground. Many thanks to the Hughes family, who kindly put their chainsaw to work and carted the fallen tree away. This not only saved the parish money, but also lent a spirit of community. Should anyone want to get involved in helping around the village, there are always jobs to do, so please contact Lee, our Parish Clerk, and he can put you on our newly formed volunteer working party list.

At the top of this list is a need for painters to join our Pavilion decorating team. We now have newly plastered ceilings and walls and, to make the best use of our funding, we are painting everything ourselves. If you can spare some time and enjoy working in a team, please let us know as we need help in the coming weeks.

The WSCC Highways pedestrian works are progressing at a pace and shall soon move to the centre of the village. This will create a level of inconvenience for a period, but it will be a first step toward making this area a better hub of our community. There will be an impact on a couple of temporary parking spaces, but this was a trade-off to ensure safe passage of pedestrians. The pavements around the area will also be resurfaced up to the bus stop. We will continue to work with WSCC Highways on the next phase as we look to improve access to the entrance of Hapstead Hall and resurface the pavements along the High Street up to the recreation ground and Pavilion.

We have made some inroads, but progress is slow. Thank you to Joyce Day whose commitment to the cause is being noticed!

It is also worth sharing that progress has been made with the team leading the redesign project for the area around Hapstead Hall and the British Legion/Village Club which will further augment these developments. Through a clever linkage with Plumpton College, a number of plans have been developed and Wakehurst has been involved in providing insight and feedback. More on this soon.

And finally a large thank you to Brian Strutton who has recently resigned from the Parish Council, having long served as a councillor. He is perhaps best known for his dedication to Remembrance Day and regular surveying of the playground. Our thanks go to him and we wish him all the best.

This leaves a position of Parish Councillor vacant. Should you be interested in becoming actively involved in contributing to the village and its future direction, please let us know! We will commence a formal process shortly and welcome all applicants.
