Dear Friends,

There's a lovely little poem written by George McDonald. It's actually a Christmas poem, so you may think I am looking at the wrong season! But the first stanza goes like this: 'We were all searching for a king to slay our foes and lift us high, thou camest a little baby thing, to make a woman cry.' ('That Holy Thing' - George MacDonald. 1824–1905)

The point is that McDonald understood that Jesus, from birth to death, which is from womb to tomb, didn't come to meet our expectations of what a King should be like. He came to meet our deepest need. Our need for salvation. Our need to humble ourselves in the sight of God. Our need to let God be King and Lord over our lives. Neither ourselves nor any other human being. Noone, other than Jesus.

That's the message of Easter. A message we all should contemplate.

IMARA-UGANDA EDUCATION FUND

The great news is the school for the blind and other learners is open and the students have started to arrive. A year ago there was just an empty field and now the first phase of the school is complete. I thank God for each act of generosity and



kindness that has made this possible.

The news I receive from Uganda often fills me with joy and often it is so moving and sad it breaks my heart. When children come to school they have to pay school fees to cover tuition, boarding, basic meals and care. They must also bring mattresses, bedding, cleaning materials, toilet rolls, school books, stationary and everything else they will need for the term. Our Ugandan team leader, Kevin, writes that most parents are struggling. Some have no hope of raising the school fees. Here is a little of what she has told me:

The father of one of the girls brought some of the items but he couldn't pay the school fees. He rode a motorcycle from Apac to Lira City. After buying part of the uniform and a mattress, his money ran out. The fuel light on his motorcycle warned him the tank was empty. He called many people from his village to lend him money without success. Kevin came to his rescue and gave him 30,000 UGX (£6-£7). He used 10,000 for fuel and 20,000 to buy pants, soap and sandals for his daughter. The jerrican she needed for school had a hole in it but it was repaired. Kevin told him we would pay part of the school fees. He promised to pay the rest by the middle of term.

Steven is partially sighted and a braille user. He sat the Primary Leaving Exam and missed top grade by one point. His father died. His mother had no hope of sending him to secondary school. When she was told we would give something towards school fees for the first 2 terms, his mother raised what she could and brought him to school. She has paid 250,000 (£55) and promised to pay more.

Sarah is totally blind. She comes from a family of 9 children, 4 of whom are blind. Her family is really struggling. Her father said he

would bring her to school but he needed time to get money for transport and school requirements. Sarah has been studying in a village day school with no braille or specialist teaching. One of her blind brothers dropped out of school. They have all suffered from the stigma that often goes with disability. People tell the family their children can't do any professional courses. We have promised some help with fees for Sarah this term and her father has brought her to school. Kevin writes, "Now that Sarah will join the school with braille machines it will be a life changing opportunity for the family. Sarah will finally receive education."



Kevin is learning that there are very many blind children and youth in the communities studying in normal primary schools and after that they just drop out.

Only 3 of the 10 children who have arrived in school so far have managed to pay the full fees. Others have paid a little and have sent the children with just a few of the things they need, but at least they have come. We don't know how many other families have struggled and given up.

School fees are roughly £150 in the first term and a little less after that. A mattress costs £20 (at home many sleep on a straw mat on the floor), sheets, pillow and mosquito nets another £20, exercise books, pens, pencils etc about £50 per term. The school uniform is about £55. A peasant farmer often earns less than £3 per day; no wonder they are struggling! We need to get these children into school and to make sure they don't drop out.

Please remember the school and the children in your prayers. If you feel you would like to help one of them, I would love to hear from you. Even the smallest donation will buy something a child needs for school. An education will give a child with visual impairment the skills to live with some independence and to contribute to the life of their community. Sadly, without education they are too often shunned and made to feel of little value. Belinda (01444 892368)

CPAS (Church Pastoral Aid Society)

Two key features of the work of CPAS (who are patrons of St Peter's) are providing training and resources to churches and running Venture and Falcon holiday camps for children. Here are two stories about these:

The 'Growing Bridgebuilders' course

Many struggle with conflict. Christians often avoid it - especially in the Church. <u>Growing Bridgebuilders</u> is a practical resource that will help people be better equipped for life together. It focuses on

building bridges, and how to embrace and transform differences, tensions and conflicts as a way to grow a healthy Christian community. It distils the core of Bridge Builders' acclaimed training courses into an effective toolkit for leaders to use with others.



Here are a few thoughts from people who have experienced the Growing Bridgebuilders course:

'The course is an opportunity to transform the way conflict is dealt with within the church and shows us how to pursue peace in a way that benefits everyone concerned.' *Clemy Gilmore*

'Growing Bridgebuilders gives people confidence to speak openly and honestly, and to be more open in listening to others. The course enables participants to engage in deeper discussions about faith and how we relate to one another, opening up new ways of looking at one another.' *Claire Starr*

'It transformed the way I handle conflict in my work and at home.' **Course Participant at Chipping Campden**

'It works! At the end of our course, all our participants said their attitude to conflict at home, work and church had been transformed!' **The Rev Andy Hayes**

A Falcon Holiday leader for the third year running, Lizzie Hare tells why she keeps going back...



'Praise God that Dallam Falcon [Warrington] is able to happen again this year, and for the 11-14 year olds who are coming. Dallam allows young people who might not otherwise have a holiday to have a great time, make new friends and try new things. It's a privilege to keep going back to serve as a volunteer leader.

'This year, I am a team leader, which involves working closely with about eight

young people during their activities throughout the week. We go to Blackpool Pleasure Beach and go swimming as well as doing various outdoor activities such as climbing and canoeing. On the last night we have a party where everyone dresses up and eats enormous amounts of food. I am also helping to deliver the Bible teaching programme with overall leaders Jon and Ruth.

'I think one of the most important things to bear in mind when communicating the Bible to children who may not have encountered it before, is that it contains all the best bits of any story: romance, battles, grisly deaths, redemption, even some comedy. It also addresses questions we all want to know the answers to: Is there a God? What's my purpose in life? Am I loved? Where do we go after we die? These things are relevant for everyone, regardless of their familiarity with the Bible. So we try to make sure the teaching doesn't assume any prior knowledge, but is still interesting and exciting for those who are more familiar with the Bible.

'I would say I've seen God at work most clearly in the gradual change in the young people as the week goes by. For example, seeing someone attempt something at the end of the week they would have been too scared to do at the beginning, or seeing someone grasp a little bit more of the unquantifiable amount of love God has for them, and how that affects the way they value themselves and others.

'On all of the Falcon holidays, young people get to hear how much God loves them, how important they are to him and hopefully come to know Jesus for themselves, which is the best thing in the world.'

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER 2024

The Service this year was put together by the women of Palestine. However, in the light of the events in Gaza and Israel and the way in which the Palestinian- Israel conflict was raising such strong emotions it was decided to take a different approach. Adding to this, the



conflicts in Ukraine, Lebanon, Pakistan, Sudan, DRC, Yemen and the Red Sea, it was felt that we should widen the service and pray for peace around the world.

We gathered at the Ascension Church in Haywards Heath on Friday $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ March and those leading were representatives of the churches from Cuckfield, Haywards Heath, Scaynes Hill, Wivelsfield and Ardingly. As each person arrived, they were welcomed and given a piece of paper, pen and a candle.

The readings, songs and prayers were based around the song "Make me a channel of your peace". The reflection was taken from the Palestinian booklet based on the hymn "put peace into each other's hands". We were also invited to listen to John Michael Talbot's song of the prayer of St Teresa of Avila reminding us that we are Christ's body, hands, feet and eyes in our world.


Part way through the service the congregation was invited to write a prayer for peace and place it in a basket in front of the altar and to light their candle.

After the service we gathered for a welcome cup of tea and delicious home-made cakes! It was a great opportunity to meet with our Christian Brothers and Sisters from other churches and there was a lovely hum of chat and lots of smiles and greetings! Copies of the Palestinian booklet were given to everyone to take home. (I have a spare one if anyone would like it!).

All together it was a lovely service and afternoon and a wonderful reminder that we are part of a greater church family across the globe. The final hymn "The day thou gavest" always brings a lump to my throat with the knowledge that "The church is unsleeping" and "The voice of prayer is never silent!"

ARDINGLY HISTORY SOCIETY 25TH ANNIVERSARY

The idea for a History Society in Ardingly came from Alex MacLean who moved to Ardingly in 1987, having retired from being vicar of St Leonard's, Turners Hill, due to ill health. Once he'd established that there was enough interest,



the Society was formed and held its first meeting in January 1999. The first committee meeting was held in February 1999 in which Alex MacLean was elected President along with other honorary officers. Roy Tester was elected Chairman and he has only recently retired from that post after 25 years service. The membership subscription was just £5.

Sadly, Alex MacLean died in January the following year. His research since his retirement, and that of local historian Mary Holgate, formed the bulk of the archives. Mary used to write regular historical features in St Peter's Parish Magazine in the early part of the 20th Century and these have been collected into single papers. Since then many documents, photographs and maps have been added, covering topics such as the origins of the place names of Ardingly to the characters of the village. The Society is very fortunate to have storage space allocated within Hapstead Hall, with the kind permission of the trustees. These may be inspected by Members of the Society by prior arrangement. The archives are being digitised gradually and those that have been are available to view on our website: ardinglyhistory.org.uk

The Society has four meetings a year plus an AGM. The meetings usually have a visiting speaker talking on historical topics and occasionally one of the members gives a talk based on material in the archives. The membership subscription has increased to £15 single or £20 for a couple. A twice-yearly magazine has been produced since 2002, edited until very recently by Joy Broughton, and the more recent editions are available on the website. Also, there have been several successful exhibitions over the years, the first being in 2000.

Please consider supporting the local History Society as there is a wealth of information available about St Peter's and the village. We have a noticeboard on the front wall of Hapstead Hall, with details of future events and current committee members.

Ardingly Cricket Club is fundraising

Ardingly Cricket Club is upgrading and fundraising! The pavilion has undergone a massive refurbishment and the Club would like to support this by adding some essential upgrades within the community room and look at upgrading some very old and tired club equipment.



"Like many clubs we have struggled financially over the last few years, due to the cost of living crisis, the lack of match fees due to bad weather, and the general financial demand being placed on a small village club. During this time we have been keen to grow as a club, expand our offer of cricket and we have even offered free junior sessions to the village. With some extra funding we could deliver more and more community activities with fresh equipment and an even more inviting facility."

The Club is hoping to raise £1000 and have already passed the half way mark. Money raised will be used to improve the social room at the pavilion by supporting in the renovation (e.g. sofas, kitchen equipment, social seating outside) and purchase of a new electronic scoreboard for the club.

Parish Council Update April 2024

The Village can celebrate some significant progress in terms of roads and pavements in the past month. The pedestrian improvement works, including (extra!) resurfacing of the pavement beyond Hapstead Hall, have been completed by the Highways Department at West Sussex County Council. The Parish Council continue to press for resurfacing of the pavements along the High Street up to the recreation ground and pavilion. The Highways Department have also visited, and fixed, the water overflow problem on College Road which the Village and Parish Council had been lobbying for since before Christmas. The issue was found to be due to a broken pipe causing a drain blockage. The Highways Department have confirmed that pothole repair works for the area are being scheduled.


Progress on the pavilion refurbishment continues at a pace - the scaffolding is now down so the external view is a bit brighter, the upstairs room has been painted, Radiant heaters have been installed and are running properly in the changing rooms and toilets, and flooring is being laid as we speak. Much of the Ardingly Cricket Club and the Ardingly Football Club have been seen with paint brushes in hand – THANK YOU! – and we continue to welcome any volunteer time or resources, so please do contact us if you can help.

In May we will be holding the Annual Village Meeting (date and details to follow). This is a public meeting in which all residents are invited to hear a report back on the work of the Parish Council from the past year, and what is planned for the coming 12 months. There will also be presentations by local businesses/organisations and a Q&A Session, as well as the Hapstead Hall Annual General Meeting.

Finally – keep your eyes peeled on noticeboards and social media for the upcoming Councillor Vacancy advert. We will finalise the details this month and publish widely. If you are over 18 and live in the parish, please do consider if you would like to join a proactive Parish Council which strives to make Ardingly an ever more beautiful place to live and work. Meetings are normally the second Tuesday of the month, and you should plan to attend most of them.

EASTER GREETINGS from a former Ardingly resident:



RECYCLING UPDATES

Blister packs and medicine bottles can be placed in your recycling bin at home, according to the WSCC website. Please ensure they are empty and clean.



Light bulbs (and batteries) can now be recycled at Robert Dyas in Haywards Heath. Just hand your bulbs to one of the till operators.

Compost/manure/bark bags can now be recycled at Dobbies Garden Centres. (The nearest to us is Dobbies in Warren Road, Brighton.)

The BOOTS website states that "you can bring your empty beauty, health, wellness and **dental products**, from any brand, that can't be recycled at home." This includes toothbrushes and toothpaste.

The big green Oxfam bins in the carpark at Sainsbury's have been removed but now there is a small bin inside the supermarket where we can put "**preloved" clothing**. An alternative is the green clothing bin outside St Peter & St James in Lindfield.

Marigold gloves can be recycled. Take them to 25 Wickham Way, Haywards Heath Monday-Friday between 0900 and 1700 hours.

FSW March 2024 update

Dear Friends,

Time is really flying by this year and we remain at full capacity as more and more families are referred to us weekly. It is



concerning just how many families are coming to us already at a total crisis, having been let down by other services, so there is a real pressure on our practitioners to provide as much support as possible.

Despite the challenges we are seeing some real progress with our families, as they begin to improve their housing, financial and confidence issues. Sadly it is still very hard to get appropriate support for the many families whose children have additional educational needs, but we are not giving up and continue to press other agencies for the right help. One parent recently wrote to her practitioner to say:

"Without your commitment, understanding and sometimes firm words when needed we honestly do not know where we would be."

Our family activity events are now in full swing – the Easter holidays included our first trip of the year to Arundel Castle cricket foundation and a farm trip in Midhurst where children could bottle feed lambs and take ponies for walks. Our first Dalesdown residential weekend of the year will take place in the middle of April, which we know will be another fantastic opportunity for some of our families.
