

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

In his letter to the Galatian Christians the apostle Paul keeps on coming back to the cross of Jesus Christ. Eventually, and when writing the final chapter of his letter, he says: "May I never boast, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus



Christ." [Galatians 6: 14]. To some, that may seem an odd comment. But to understand it we just need to imagine for a moment that we are amongst a group of our closest friends and family and that they ask us questions like this: "What is the most important thing in your life?" "What is it that affects every other area of your life?" "What is it that you are obsessed with?" "What do you think about, read about and talk about most?" How would you answer those questions?

You see, Paul's answer to all of those questions would be both challenging and inspiring. It was what gripped his mind. It was what had become the centre of his life, faith and ministry to such an extent that he could never stop thinking about it. In short, Paul's answer to all of those sorts of question would be 'the cross of Jesus Christ.' And that has been the answer of the Christian church year on year throughout the ages.

The reason that Paul was obsessed with the cross and the reason that Christianity has remained obsessed with the cross is that Jesus himself was too. His whole purpose on earth was to die. Not because he was forced to, but because he wanted to and because it had a purpose: quite simply, the cross is how we are *accepted* by God and the cross is how we are *changed* by God.

And that amounts to a far greater purpose and so to a far greater transformation than anything we might achieve in our lives through our own efforts. Embracing the cross and boasting in the cross as Paul did brings about a total transformation in us.

It's not the sort of transformation that is beloved by so many TV programmes nowadays, where someone is given new clothes and hair and ends up looking completely different. The change that the cross brings is a change inside of us. It is a change that is in our heart. And it is change that will last and bring us into eternity.

Paul's words in Galatians 6:14 should certainly cause us to pause and think and to ask ourselves: what it is that is most important to us in our lives.

The King has approved the nomination of The Venerable Dr Edward Dowler, Archdeacon of Hastings and Priest-in-Charge of St John the Evangelist, Crowborough, to be appointed as Dean of Chichester, in succession to The Very Reverend Stephen Waine, following his resignation.

Dr Martin Warner, Bishop of Chichester, says "His priestly ministry is primarily defined by pastoral care and thoughtful teaching that makes accessible the whole span of the Christian tradition. As an archdeacon he has become familiar with ecclesiastical law and the hard lessons of financial planning. He appreciates art and music and, importantly, has a probing sense of humour."

CMS - NEWS from HEATHER JOHNSTONE

Dear friends,

We were blessed to have a team of five gap year students from the UK and Germany to support Rehema Cafe four times a week for almost 3 months from January to April. The team from Christian charity *Go Make a Difference in Tanzania* were, as my friend put it, full of the exuberance of youth, and they really bonded well with the



Rehema ladies. They had a lot of fun together and the team visited the homes of a few of the women and shared meals, songs, and stories with them. They also put in a regular appearance at our weekly prayer meetings at my house. We were sad to see them go.

I was fortunate enough to attend the CMS people in mission conference in Naivasha, Kenya, recently. It was a privilege to meet and worship together with colleagues from all over the continent of Africa as well as staff from our Nairobi and Oxford offices. It was particularly inspiring to hear the stories of those working in conflict zones, in areas longing for peace, like DR Congo, Sudan and South Sudan. Bisoke Balikenga and Bishop Martin Gordon (DR Congo), Bishop Hassan James (Sudan) and Sam Malish (South Sudan) are just a few inspiring people in mission, following Jesus to the edges so that more people can experience their world made new. I was asked to preach at my local village church last weekend. Inspired by our Bible studies at the CMS conference, I spoke about God of Hope. I told a story of an Armenian father who in the aftermath of the terrible earthquake in 1988, where at least 25,000 people lost their lives, remembered the promise he'd made to his son "No matter what, I'll always be there for you." He searched frantically through the rubble at his son's school for 38 hours and miraculously found him, still alive. His son said that he never gave up hope because of the promise his father had made him.

The point of the story I shared was to emphasise the good news that God has made the same promise to us in John 14:3. After the service, Jose, the choir master, came and asked me if the story was true because he wanted to write a song about it. I look forward to hearing the hope-filled song based on this story and Romans 15:13, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit", being sung in church sometime soon.

Last weekend was also a challenging time as two of those close to us were involved in road traffic accidents. On Saturday afternoon, Cesi's teenage son, who was delivering a bucket of milk on his bicycle, was cut off by a car halfway down a very steep hill. He was thrown over the handlebars and lost consciousness when he landed on the road. He was admitted to the local clinic and later transferred to the main government hospital (the only hospital in Musoma with an x-ray machine). He was kept in for a few days as the concern was that he had internal injuries, but he has since been given a clean bill of health and returned home.

Then on Sunday afternoon, not long after I'd returned home from church, news reached me that Jeska, one of the Rehema women, had been involved in a hit and run while she was using the pedestrian crossing at our local village centre. She was flung to the side of the road and left barely conscious. Luckily a motorbike driver recognised her and ran to tell one of our seamstresses, Jane, who works in nearby premises. Jane rushed Jeska to hospital and spent many hours with her as she received treatment. There were concerns around Jeska's spinal health, and worries about internal injuries, but thankfully after a couple of days of observation and tests, she has returned home.

A timely reminder that when we experience situations that seem hopeless or problems that seem insurmountable, we can take comfort in the knowledge that our father is the God of Hope. And we can come to him with every need, concern, or worry we have, and no matter how small or large our

issue, he knows what is going on in our lives and he provides for us.



In other news, another one of our very talented seamstresses, Ericka, had a baby girl a few weeks ago. Her name is Abigail, and it was a joy to visit her and welcome her to the Rehema family.

My work and residence permits expire on 23 May 2024, and I have started the process of applying for a two-year renewal. I'm not anticipating any problems, but please do pray

that these permits are approved without any problems.

FSW May 2024 update

Dear Friends,

FSW has been a hive of activity in the last month. Many of our practitioners have been running group sessions for their clients to sur



running group sessions for their clients to support them in parenting issues as well as their normal day-to-day home visits. These groups are a really valuable way for parents to learn new skills when faced with challenging behaviour from their children, and have been a great success. We are also still receiving a large number of new referrals which we are trying to accept as quickly as we can, although waiting lists are still in place in most areas.

We were able to close a particular family in Newhaven recently, after supporting them since October. This is a relatively quick turnaround, as usually the challenges facing our families take much longer to resolve successfully. After the final meeting the parent sent this message to her practitioner:

Having you to talk to has been invaluable. You have helped me make sense of things when I felt too muddled. You have given me tools to help work out my thoughts and feelings and know how to manage them better. You have helped me understand my options and given me space to talk about worries. I feel so much better now and I know I can come back in the future if I need to".

Receiving this sort of feedback really gives us a boost when times can be very challenging, so it was wonderful to see the impact that we have had on this parent's life over the last 6 months.

Our foodbank is currently running very low on lots of items so we would appreciate your support with any donations.

Alexander (Sandy) Hett 23rd August 1928 – 28th March 2024

Friends and family came from far and wide for the funeral of Sandy Hett on 3rd May. And thanks to modern technology others watched the service on zoom from as far afield as Aukland in New Zealand. Hymns included The Lord's my Shepherd, There is a hope and Abide with me, and bible readings came from Ecclesiastes and Matthew.

Before the service began Lynn Wilson tolled one of the church bells 95 times, and the bell ringing team rang a Quarter Peal when the service was over.

Members of Sandy's family read 3 poems and an extract from Winnie the Pooh and loving tributes were paid by Neil Thompson and Gillian Hett before an address was given by the Rector, John Crutchley.

What a full and interesting life Sandy had lived! And what warm and generous tributes were paid to him. He had studied first in Haywards Heath and then in Oxford, where he became a prizewinning violinist. A classics scholar, he loved history and remembered things with microscopic detail. He was also passionate about art and studied it at the Royal College of Art in London, after which he became an Art Teacher. He also did his National Service, like lots of others at that time.

There was a lot more to Sandy than one might imagine! He loved the outdoors and enjoyed walking and cycling and the family's annual holidays in Scotland. His interests covered a wide range of things and he was a mine of information about nature, trees, wildlife and the village of Ardingly! He was generous and supported no less than 25 charities. This included making weekly trips to Haywards Heath to help with Talking Books for the Blind.

His family remember him as a great listener and having a lovely smile. Someone who was so interested in everyone and had a special care for, and understanding of, children. He was full of stories and imaginative ideas, such as creating a full size igloo for his nephews and nieces one winter when it snowed heavily. Gifts were always very thoughtfully chosen.

The church in Ardingly meant such a lot to Sandy and he always strove to live his life in a way which was pleasing to God. He loved music and singing in the choir and Choral Society. He continued to attend St Peter's with his niece Fiona up until very recently. His church family are going to miss him a lot.

Words which were repeatedly used to describe Sandy were "kind", "humble", "thoughtful", "wise", "knowledgeable" and he was, in the Rector's words, "A man of rare and great quality".

Watching birds is positively good for you

So says a new study out of North Carolina State University. It goes on to say that watching birds is even more beneficial to us than watching other forms of wildlife.

The new study found that birdwatchers' recorded 'distress' levels dropped by 13.7 per cent, compared to that of nature-walkers' at 6.9 per cent.

The study suggests that the reason may be that birds provide their own narrative and sense of drama, which can be enough to lift someone watching them out of the everyday.

The author and presenter Kate Humble agrees. "There is something reassuring about life continuing and nature just getting on with it,

even if it feels like the rest of the world is falling to bits. Birdwatching makes me feel part of a bigger, richer, beautiful picture."

"Birds give me an excuse to explore and find some solitude and calmness away from the bustle of life," says James Lowen, author of 52 Wildlife Weekends. "It helps put me in my place."



THE ETERNAL WALL OF ANSWERED PRAYER

"If ever our nation needed hope, it's now." (Richard Gamble)
The Eternal Wall of Answered Prayer will make hope visible!

Reaching 50 metres up into the sky, the Eternal Wall of Answered Prayer is a huge Christian landmark that is being built in the heart of the UK, paid for by a crowdfunding campaign. It is due to be completed in 2026.

Over twice the height of the Angel of the North and large enough for Buckingham Palace to fit under its arch, the Eternal Wall will be visible from over 6 miles away. Adjacent to the M6 & M42 motorways, HS2 and the flight path of Birmingham Airport, this piece of public art will be seen by half a million journeys every week, encouraging a national conversation about prayer.

Every one of its million bricks will reveal a story from an individual, remembering how Jesus answered their prayer. The landmark will show the world that Jesus is alive, He listens and He answers prayer today. Using a bespoke app, visitors will be able to point their phone to a brick to explore the unique answered prayer it displays.

For each brick in the Eternal Wall, a brick will be donated to social housing - so not only is this landmark making hope visible; it is also planting seeds of hope that will meet others at their point of greatest need, and help change their narrative to one of restoration.



St PETER and St JAMES HOSPICE OPEN GARDENS

From May till September you can visit beautiful gardens whilst at the same time supporting the St Peter & St James Hospice. The season started with the Hospice's own garden on May 18th and runs through until early September.

From pretty plants, ponds and peonies to woodland, wild flowers and water features, friends and supporters of the Hospice all across the region are kindly opening their gardens to raise funds for the Hospice.

Each Open Garden has its own unique offering from grand estates to village trails and this is a chance to look behind the hedges and see some truly beautiful gardens.

The Old Rectory, 79 Church Road, Newick, BN8 4JZ, is open on Friday 7th June from 3pm to 7pm. In the 10 acres of glorious garden there is a wild flower meadow, formal gardens, 'white garden', a magical moat and so much more. Refreshments, plants and Pimms will be on sale. There will also be a pop up vintage clothing shop and work for sale by local artists. Entry is £8 and children visit free.
