RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

"To clasp the hands in prayer is the beginning of an uprising against the disorder of the world" wrote theologian Karl Barth. And that is true. But it is also, I believe, an




invitation to listen. To listen so as to widen our vision such that we begin to *see* as God sees, to *love* all that God has created and to *view* life's situations as God does.

To this end St. Benedict required all who followed his rule to pray seven times each day ("*Seven times a day I praise you*" Psalm 119: 164) reminding them of the need to set aside their own preoccupations so as to give the necessary time and space to be present to God and to be led more deeply into a relationship with God, through Jesus. For Benedict, God's intervention in this world through Jesus Christ is an absolute reality that permeated not merely his view of the world but also his entire existence, right down to his very nerve ends. And it did so twenty-four hours a day. And so again and in Barth's words: "Prayer is in essence a rebellion - rebellion against the world and its fallenness, the absolute and undying refusal to accept as normal what is pervasively abnormal."

Such prayer is, I believe, the recognition that God in Christ has given us everything that we seek for and everything that we long for. We don't have to rush after it, or struggle for it. It's there all the time. All we need to do is give it time in prayer, regularly each day and throughout the day, and it will make itself known to us – or rather he will, Jesus Christ. Not in some airy–fairy mystical way, but in the midst of ordinary life, calling us to be the people God made us to be and reminding us that we are totally loved and secure in this wonderful and yet so often dangerous and difficult world. Prayer like this requires our willingness and our perseverance. It frequently requires struggle and sacrifice. But without any doubt, the more that we learn how to pray in this way the more we will become sensitive to the Spirit at work in our hearts and so in turn the more we will come to know the true love of God for all humankind from which grows the love of humankind for God and for one another. Truly then, an uprising against all that disorders the world.

#### LINK TO HOPE SHOEBOX APPEAL 2024

St Peter's will again be supporting this LINK to HOPE Shoebox Appeal this Autumn.

The Shoebox Appeal has been running since 1992 and over 1 million shoeboxes have been delivered to hundreds of different locations in Romania, Moldova, Bulgaria and Ukraine. Shoeboxes go directly to people who are poor and marginalised in Eastern Europe: families, the elderly and people that literally struggle to survive on a day to day basis. A simple gift of a shoebox shows love and care for people who would otherwise have very little hope.

We are asked to complete a shoebox either for a family (not just a child) or an elderly person. The list of items we can send includes different items, ranging from soap, shower gel/shampoo, family games, stationary items, small gifts for mum and dad as well as

sweets, soft toys, hats, scarves etc.

Shoeboxes need to be ready by the end of October. If you would like a form listing what can be put into a shoe box (each box needs one for Customs purposes) please do let me know.


## Hapstead Jam Tarts Ardingly WI

Dear friends,

As many of you know, in April my mother passed away. She had been battling with cancer and was ready to



meet her Maker. After almost a month in the Philippines I quickly got back into the swing of things here in our host country.

I am thankful that the women in the **house fellowship** continue to meet to study the Word and have started sharing and studying the Word with their friends. I have been involved in discipling them since 2021. Sometimes, even after confessing faith in Christ, baptism and studying the Word, there is still unbelief. But complete faith in Christ, especially for people with this background (very poor, with drug use), can take a while.



**7 people** are studying the Word with these ladies. They have seen the change in them and they want to change too. We pray that the Lord will start adding to their number daily those who are being saved (Acts 2:47).

We are encouraged by our recent evaluation of our **social media campaign**. We praise the Lord and pray for more national believers to help with filtering those who enter our page. We also praise God for 5 men who have said that they believe in Christ, though we don't know what this means yet. They are being discipled virtually.

We were grateful for a **short-term worker** who helped A with his work at the university for 6 weeks. His work ethics and background were just what was needed and his contribution, even though he was here for such a short time, had an impact in the department.

Our **teammates** will return next month from their home assignment. We are praying for unity and better communication so that we can be a more fruitful team. We are still in touch with old contacts and neighbours. We would like to **move** to a town called Pleasant Port, still in the same province where we live. We are hoping that the new technical institute there will give A a work permit. We are praying for wisdom and direction.

Daughter Y has finished her time at her Orientation School. She will begin her studies in Electrical Engineering in October.

Son T is feeling overwhelmed with a lot of things - including his extra-curricular activities. May he learn to discipline himself and prioritise. Praise the Lord, he has a sense of belonging with his housemates.

Thank you for your prayers. May the Lord draw us closer to Himself and give us the strength to face our challenges with joy that only comes from Him.

## Samara's Aid -OUR SYRIAN CINDERELLA FAIRYTALE...

Recently I heard some incredibly touching, happy news. It is our own Cinderella story! Few young men remain in Syria compared to young women. So many have been killed in the war and so many others have fled the country to avoid mandatory conscription to the army. For the young women in the country their prospects of marriage have diminished. For many in the west, this might not feel like as big an issue, but life in Syria is tougher for unmarried women who may not have the same rights or opportunities and may be excluded from some social situations. Regardless, for many this is a lonely life that most wouldn't have planned.

Over the last few years we have been donated some beautiful new clothes from a well known UK fashion retailer, who have been so

generous. They had a few really gorgeous evening dresses and asked if we'd like them. I was happy to accept them as although they aren't the items needed most, there might be special occasions that our beneficiaries are invited to, and I know that they would be too poor to be able to buy a dress to go a wedding or party. At the time I talked with Dr A's wife, sending her some photos of the dresses, and she said she could just imagine some of our orphans having their engagement wearing one of them. Any woman knows what it means to an older girl or young woman to have something nice to wear to a special occasion. For these poor people, engagements and weddings are likely to be some of the only parties they get the chance to go to, and to meet people. There will always be a hope that perhaps, just perhaps, they might meet someone special...



One such young woman was invited to her friend's engagement party recently. She is so poor, she had nothing to wear to a party, and no money to buy a dress. She was able to borrow one of the dresses for the occasion. She looked so beautiful, all made up and wearing this light blue, sequinned and chiffon dress. Sometimes people in the UK are surprised to think that a Muslim woman might dress like this, but there are different expectations and customs among different groups. Among her group, which is Alawi, the women tend to dress in a liberal way, as do Christians in Syria, much like us in the UK.

When she went to the party, she caught the attention of a handsome young man who was very taken with her. They got on so well that evening. He is someone who seems to have good career prospects and is well thought of. Afterwards, he and his parents went to visit the girl's father to ask for her hand in marriage. They accepted!

It reminds me of the story of poor Cinderella having nothing to wear for the ball, but her fairy godmother gave her what she needed, just for a few hours, but for long enough to catch the attention of her Prince Charming. This is our own little fairytale - our Syrian Cinderella. My prayer is that they too will have their happily ever after.

Thank you to all of you who helped us to get these and all the other clothes out to Syria - this is an unexpected and lovely story among the many stories of people needing warm, practical clothes - just the absolute basics to survive. But people need other kinds of hope too: the hope of love, marriage, starting their own families and living normal lives. Please pray with me that this will be a healthy, happy marriage.

#### Annoyed with bottle tops?

A friend and I were discussing recently the new style of caps on bottles and cartons, where they are 'tethered' by a thin strand of plastic and do not come off completely. This can be a bit awkward because the lid can get in the way,



and if you attempt to drink from the bottle the cap can scratch your nose! Apparently there is a good reason why caps are now tethered. WSCC Waste Advisor Colin McFarlin explains that "each year 583 billion plastic bottles are produced, each with a cap, but bottle caps are now the fifth most common item of plastic debris found in the sea. Litter pickers have also found that bottle tops are a huge problem and a danger to animals and birds. So this is why most manufacturers now produce plastic bottle and cartons with caps which are attached. After use the bottle or carton can be recycled complete with its cap. SUE

#### **ARDINGLY PARISH COUNCIL NEWS – AUGUST 2024**

The summer holidays for the Parish Council were anything but a holiday as many projects continue to be progressed.

We are again in the midst of recruitment for a Parish Clerk/RFO. We would like to wish Lee Dunkley all the very best and hope to fill the position shortly. Everything continues to tick along thanks to the additional efforts of our Parish Councillors, but some of our admin is behind so thank you for your patience as we navigate this period. The telephone number is answered and the email <u>clerk@ardingly.org</u> is monitored, so please don't hesitate to contact us as normal. Another step forward is that we have co-opted Councillor Steve Korniotis just before the summer holidays. We would like to welcome him to the council and hope to co-opt the final vacancy at our September 11th meeting which will bring us up to our full 11 members.

Please note that we have shifted our monthly meetings to the 2nd Wednesday of every month. We have also limited in-person surgeries to once a month. All of the Council is available at any time by phone or email in the interim, but as so few people attend the surgeries it seemed prudent to focus the time accordingly whilst still offering an in-person opportunity.

In other news, the Ardingly Sports Pavilion has shown what a lovely venue it can be for outdoor gatherings with the successful events of Ardingly Cricket Club and as part of the Ardingly Connected Together (ACT) Village Day alike. Thanks to everyone who helped to make those events possible as it is wonderful to have such lovely opportunities to meet together as a village. Next up on the calendar is the Village Fete. It is set for 8th September and should be another chance to come along and not only enjoy the day, but also see the improvements to the Pavilion.

We also learned what an asset our Public Loo is to people throughout the area as, due to a renegotiation of cleaning contract by Mid Sussex, we were faced with costs which were well outside of our budget. The current contract ended and the doors were closed for a few weeks whilst we urgently implemented a short term fix and work toward a long term more cost effective solution. They are now open every day from 9am to 7pm. We have taken on the cleaning locally so we would ask you to please use them respectfully and if you notice any issues, please email <u>clerk@ardingly.org</u>.

WSCC have been again busy, now with the installation of three new electric car charging points on Street Lane. In an effort to encourage the County to focus on environmentally positive choices they have facilitated this development and, understanding the pressures on parking in Ardingly, they have not constrained the parking. Anyone can park in these spaces. Should they want to change the status of these spaces to be limited to Electric Vehicles they will have to conduct a consultation. We are separately investigating expanding the parking at Recreation Ground and near the Tennis Courts to improve the traffic during school drop off and pick up times.

## **Townhouse Farm Cottages**

Demolition of the two semi-detached cottages at the bottom of Church Lane, which overlooked the reservoir, has taken place. Planning has been given for the construction on that site of a detached four-bedroom 3 storey house plus a basement, together with a detached two storey garage (garage below ground level) with home office above.

#### Summerfest

The Showground had perfect weather for the Ardingly Summerfest on 10th August and judging from the very long tailbacks of traffic on all 4 roads into Ardingly that day, they had a LOT of visitors! It wasn't quite so much fun if you were trying to get home from Sainsbury's at midday – it took one Ardingly resident an hour and a half to get from Lywood to Gowers Close! Others abandoned their car and walked home, retrieving their car later!

#### **NEW FOOD WASTE COLLECTIONS**

After a very successful trial of food waste collections in Mid-Sussex everyone will now be receiving a green food waste collection caddy by the end of August. All kinds of food waste can be put into it and a leaflet explaining everything we need to know will be delivered with the food waste caddy. The scheme is set to begin on 11<sup>th</sup> September and this will see a change in normal collections of landfill waste. The new service will be:

Every week: food waste collection Every 2 weeks: recycling collections (our blue-lidded bins) Every 3 weeks: rubbish collections (our black-lidded bins)

## **ARDINGLY CONNECTED TOGETHER**

Ardingly Connected Together (ACT) has been together as a small group (of six or seven people) for almost four years now! We've been involved in doing all sorts of things, all designed to bring joy to the village - Carol



singing, Christmas gifts to families and older folk on their own, evenings at the Ardingly Inn, the Village Day, to name but a few and, of course, let's not forget the Hub. Throughout the whole of the time we have been operating, we have been delivering food and household provisions to people in need at any particular time.

From the start, ACT has had no direct funding and we rely on successful grant applications and donations to fund whatever we do. People and organisations (including St Peter's Church and Mid Sussex Council) have been very generous and enabled us to continue the work thus far. To make sure we are reaching out to people in need, initially we communicate confidentially through the school and preschool to those families who are in receipt of free school meals or otherwise known to the school/preschool. We offer an intermittent delivery of basic items, should they think this would help. Also, people are invited to contact us directly, again in confidence, should they (or someone they know) be in need of support.

Once we have a list of the families who need some help, we draw up our shopping list. We aim to provide basic things like beans, tomatoes, soup; fresh fruit and vegetables - apples, potatoes, carrots; long life protein (tins of ham, tuna, curry, pies) and household items, including toilet rolls, toothpaste, shampoo. One of the ACT team will do the shopping, either online or in person, and then begins the job of separating the items out into individual family bags! Where families are happy for us to know their addresses, we deliver direct to them. Otherwise, the deliveries take place through school or preschool or whatever confidential route is appropriate.

It is an amazing opportunity to deliver these parcels and to be able to support folk, even in a small way. At the moment, we are considering what grants we can apply for so that we can continue the work of ACT in general and food deliveries in particular.

#### New at Wakehurst is the Bee Bank!

In the heart of the Children's & Community Garden, you'll find the new bee bank. It's the first in the UK that's recording more than just pollinator diversity or increasing nesting sites, as it's part of a hypothesis-led experimental scientific project, 'Nature unlocked'.

Built of 52% sand and 48% soil, the bee bank is the perfect home for burrowing, solitary bees, which are often difficult to find and study. It's south facing, which gets lots of sunlight to keep the bees warm. The other side houses a wildflower meadow, roots that keep the bank together and provide food for with bees.

## EZEQUIEL'S BEES – a story from TEARFUND

Throughout the Bible, honey is used as a descriptor for lovely things. And for millennia, honey has been associated with beauty, with abundance, with wellness, with enjoyment and goodness.



In the Democratic Republic of Congo, where around 87% of the population lives below the poverty line, bees are providing a man called Ezequiel with a healthy, sustainable job that benefits the local ecosystem.'

Ezequiel started with six hives and after receiving some financial assistance from Tearfund, he has been able to grow his bee enterprise.

Ezequiel says, 'I realised there was a shortage of honey, and the little that we could find at the market was poor quality or was mixed with other things – and this was harmful for people's health. So, I had this desire in my heart to bring pure honey to people who need it.'

'We start by making the hives,' explains Ezequiel. 'They are made out of bamboo and cow dung, and when the hives are ready, we go and find the bees to put inside.' From then on, the bees are closely monitored and cared for and about six months later, the first honey is ready to collect from the hives to take to market.

The bees in each of Ezequiel's hives can produce five to ten litres of honey every six months, and because honey is in demand in the market, Ezequiel finds it very easy to sell what his bees provide and he says he loves to do this.

Looking ahead, Ezequiel hopes to be able to build more modern hives that will last much longer – even up to 20 years – creating a safer environment for his bees as they work.
