

#### RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends

As the disciples sat huddled together on the first Easter Sunday evening, both frightened and confused, Luke tells us that the risen Lord Jesus appeared to them and gave them a promise. "I am sending upon you what my



Father promised; so, stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high" said Jesus [Luke 24: 49]. As the disciples heard this, I wonder if they remembered the words of the prophet Joel, that God would pour out his spirit on all people? I wonder if in their confusion they realized just what was being promised to them?

I also wonder if the church of today has forgotten the promise of the Holy Spirit, available to all who call on the Lord. As we face challenges like secularism, internal arguments, and financial issues, we must ask ourselves if we have remembered the promise of power from above. The church's true essence lies in possessing the miracle-working power of the Holy Spirit, without which it is nothing.

The fulfilment of the promise of the Holy Spirit transformed a tired, frightened, and confused group of disciples into bold, confident preachers. But that promise, was made to all of us as well so that just as the disciples were transformed by the power of God's Spirit, we too can be transformed. Transformed in ourselves, as we realize all of the things that we are capable of doing, all of the gifts that we each have, gifts and talents given to us by a loving God and which He will empower us to use through the power and the working of His Holy Spirit. Transformed in our prayer lives, as the Spirit helps us to pray, understanding our weakness and preventing our prayers from degenerating into mechanical drudgery or powerless routine. And transformed too in our worship and as we experience in that worship the presence of the Lord Jesus himself, amongst us and with us as we meet.

The disciples and the early church demonstrate that a community that is receptive to the presence and power of the Holy Spirit swiftly transforms into an influential and remarkable entity. It becomes robust and impactful within its surroundings. And on an individual level, we see that if we are open to the influence of the Holy Spirit, our lives undergo transformation, leading to huge enrichment as we progressively align more and more closely with the likeness of Christ.

As we look forward and to the season of Pentecost we all need to pray and to ask God to make the power of the Holy Spirit come alive in our lives again, praying too that God will use each of us through that power as well.

# News from Heather Johnstone (CMS)

Dear friends,

I am pleased to report that my home assignment in the UK at the end of the year was both encouraging and productive. During this period, I visited 9 churches over



7 weeks, reconnecting with old friends and meeting new ones. I was lucky enough to have a two week break in South Africa at the beginning of the year and got back to Musoma on 21 January. I resumed work immediately and have been trying to catch up ever since.

We are fortunate to have a team of 8 gap year students from the UK supporting Rehema Cafe four times a week. A significant milestone was achieved towards the end of last year, when the bishop reversed his long-standing decision and allowed us to sell local food to local people. This nutritious food is sold at a very low price, which, although the work is demanding and yielding a small return, enables more women to be employed for longer hours – definitely a change worth celebrating.

It is with deep sorrow that I share the news of Amy Vink's passing on 28 January at the age of 54, after a prolonged battle with cancer. Amy, the Australian missionary who founded the Rehema Project, dedicated her life to Christ, serving him with unwavering commitment. Amy and her family returned to Australia in 2016 due to health concerns. During her service in the Diocese of Mara, she exemplified the fruits of the spirit as described in Galatians 5:22–23. Her inspirational leadership and compassion profoundly impacted many lives in the Mara region through employment, training and assistance programmes, and she loved every single one of the Rehema women as if they were her own children.

The funeral service was held in Australia on 4 February 2025, with a memorial service in Musoma on the same day. The service in the cathedral was well attended and included tributes from various people, including the retired Bishop of Mara and his wife, Martha.

In honour of Amy, the Rehema staff contributed 20,000 shillings each (a significant amount for them) and provided food for over 100 people. The remaining funds, coupled with a special collection during the service, went to support "good deeds" in Amy's memory, specifically aiding a project under Father Pendo, whom I have written about previously. His mission, which cares for mentally



disabled people and the very poor, is not well-funded, so any contributions are greatly beneficial. We visited Father Pendo on Sunday, bringing gifts of maize flour, beans, sugar, soap, cooking oil and Rehema toy lions and giraffes for the children. The Rehema women sang joyfully for Father Pendo and his charges, and we shared a soda and

prayed together. Unfortunately, Father Pendo will retire at the end of this month due to ill health – he is suffering from advanced Parkinson's disease.

During our time of grief, we remembered many wonderful stories about Amy, and in closing I would like to share how the Rehema logo came to be: depicting the silhouette of a woman carrying a baby on her back and a basket on her head. The project was in its infancy and Amy had a small group of women making cards at her home. An extremely impoverished young woman, Bhoke, came to Amy's home carrying her baby on her back, hoping to sell the tomatoes in her basket. The baby, John, was just three weeks old and had the glassy stare of malnutrition. Amy invited her in because it was "chai time" and she was worried about her and the baby. Amy offered her chai, food and comfort. Despite Bhoke's embarrassment over her tattered kanga (a Tanzanian cloth, like a sarong) Amy reassured her and asked her to share her story. As Bhoke was talking, Amy sketched a simple picture of her, and hence the Rehema logo was born.

Bhoke is a Rehema woman to this day. Her life and that of her family improved greatly due to the compassion and love of Amy.

As we sit with a stranger who was looking for quiet, as we hand them a candle to light and remember, as we clear up the crumbs from a mum's giddy toddler, what do you believe?

As we stretch out our hands to share Peace and for bread, as we lift up our voices and bow down our heads, as we love one another just like Jesus said - what do you believe?

Do you believe in the Father who flung stars into space, whose benevolent image can be found in your face, who traced lines of eternity into every embrace, do you believe?

Do you believe in the Son, the second person of the trinity, the three in one, the one who would come and renew us all with a promise to be with us until the Kingdom will dawn - do you believe?

Do you believe in the Spirit? The giver of life? The teacher of Love and the queller of strife, who pours out his gifts at our baptismal start, and makes us one body, one faith, one heart. Do you believe?

Do you believe in the church? The vessel for God's mission, who is called to stay humble and accept the commission to be beacons of hope and children of light until that day comes when we resurrect and reunite with the one who made us. Do you believe?

We stand with the Saints, and join with their praise, in our pews and our chairs all our voices we raise, to proclaim our faith, our Creed, our Way. On this 1700th anniversary we say: We believe.

#### **NEWS FROM NEPAL**

We have received a long update from Nepal – so long, in fact, that I'll have to split it and print the second half next month!

Greetings and love from Nepal. We hope you are well by His grace. I am glad to send you



some brief news here and hope you will be encouraged to read this. We thank God for what He has been doing among us. We thank you so much for your prayers and standing with us over the years. THANK YOU SO MUCH!

**November 2024:** November was a busy month as we had a One Month Leadership Training where 17 participants completed the Training from different parts of Nepal. Some of them are now leading the Church. All praises to HIM!

**December 2024:** During Christmas we have reached many people with Gospel through Carole Songs and other outreaches. We had a special Christmas program for the Children where 150 Children came to the celebration, it was with gifts, fun and food. As always Christmas was such a blessed program among over 400 people at Imadol alone. It was our joy to help to build a Church and Sunday School building in Sindhupalchok. We also planted new Churches in the Far West and visited our churches in the first week of December. Now we are 20 Aanandit churches in Nepal. As you know we have a vision to plant 40 Churches by the year 2033. We appreciate your prayers for this mission.

**January 2025:** It was a huge blessing for me to travel to the UK in January for 2 weeks. It was such a fulfilling time being at the Ichthus Leadership Conference too.

In January, we were also able to start some Missionary Work among the Nepalese in Portugal where one of our Leaders, named Mrs Sharmila Dhungel, moved and has been reaching-out to the Nepalese community around Lisbon. She has a great heart for the Gospel and love for the people. So we'd appreciate your prayers for her and for her husband and son too.

Our young people have started a football club again and now they are also reaching out to young people in Imadol. All honour and glory to God!

**February:** As you know, in the last 8 years we were talking, praying and raising money for the Aanandit 2030 Project, which happened on Feb. 23rd when we had a great inauguration of the Aanandit Charity Building, with much celebration. It was our honour that ACC partners from Canada and the UK were with us too. Now the building has been used for the Girls Hostel, Offices, and training/Chapel and will soon be used for care of the elderly. It was a major breakthrough in the Aanandit Ministries. We give all honour and praise to the Lord. Work in the kitchen and garden is still going on and we hope to finish by this April. Shusma and I felt great relief. Huge thanks to all our prayer partners, donors and to the staff for making this possible.

**March:** We give thanks to the Lord and prayed from Eastern Nepal to Far Western Nepal over 6 days (March 3-8). We drove every day for around 15hrs, most of the time in prayer, worship and reading the Scriptures. 6 of us were on the group, asking the Lord to bless the nation and local places, churches and every sector of society. Probably we are the first ones to do this and we are so thankful to the Lord for His protection and safety during that time.

March 26-28: we held Empowerment Seminars for all the Aanandit Church Pastors and Leaders in Chitwan, South Nepal. 35 of our Pastors and Leaders joined the seminars from 19 Churches.

#### LINK TO HOPE FINAL 2024 SHOEBOX TOTAL

The final number of shoeboxes donated in the 2024 appeal was 25,633 Family & Elderly shoeboxes. All delivered safely to their destinations in Eastern Europe. There are also lots of photos which were taken by the project managers.

Everyone who gave a shoebox also helped the charity to buy a lot of wood (and stoves) for people who desperately needed it this winter. It is so much colder in Eastern Europe than it is here in Winter time. Link to Hope have received news of the death of an old lady who burnt toxic items and died after she had run out of wood. If you are found to be collecting wood from the forest then you are automatically put in prison for two years so there are very few alternatives.







St Peter's will again be supporting the Link to Hope Shoebox Appeal this Autumn. We are asked to fill a Shoebox for a family or an elderly person- not just a child. The list contains items for all family members and includes different items. These range from shower gel/shampoo,

family games, stationary items, gifts for mum and dad as well as sweets, soft toys, hats, scarves etc. Please contact Sue if you'd like more information (892117).

The Shoebox Appeal has been running since 1992 and has delivered smiles to thousands of people in Eastern Europe over the years. In fact, well over 1,000,000 shoeboxes in total have been delivered to hundreds of different locations.

This year it's the 10th year of Thy Kingdom Come!

Thy Kingdom Come (TKC) is a global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus.

Since it began in May 2016, God has grown TKC from a dream of possibility into a movement which unites more than a million Christians in prayer, in nearly 90% of countries worldwide, across 85 different denominations and traditions- so that friends and family, neighbours and colleagues might come to faith in Jesus Christ.

Every person, household and church are encouraged to pray during the 11 days in their own way.

It is TKC's hope & prayer that those who have not yet heard the Good News of Jesus Christ and His love for the world, will hear it for themselves and respond and follow Him. Specifically, every Christian across the globe is invited to pray that God's Spirit might work in the lives of 5 people who have not responded with their 'Yes' to God's call.

#### ST PETER'S C.E. PRIMARY

We make a point of telling you, in each Parish Magazine, about the exciting and interesting things that our pupils and staff have the chance to do. It is always busy and fun and Easter was no different with our Easter service and Easter eggs rounding off the term. However, this time



we have something to report from the governors that is potentially very exciting for the whole school community.

As most people know, St Peter's School has been working in close partnership with St Giles School in Horsted Keynes since September 2023. We have shared an Interim Executive Headteacher, brought our staff closer together through training etc and aligned some of our policies and practices. This has already brought benefits to both schools, strong leadership along with more opportunities for staff and pupils. Now we are proposing to take the next step and move to a formal federation.

If we go through to federation, both schools will retain their individual visions, identity and Christian ethos. However, the schools will share one governing body. The proposal is that the schools will continue with the leadership structure which is operating currently, with one Executive Headteacher.

The governing body believes strongly that federation offers an exciting and beneficial way forward. It will preserve what is special about each school, but allow us to grow and develop, retaining the benefits of, but also weathering the challenges facing small schools. As governors, we care deeply about the role that both schools play in their communities and we are committed to preserving their unique character and ethos.



A formal consultation on the federation proposal opens on 25 April and will run until 13 June. We warmly invite all members of the community to look through the proposal, raise any questions and let us know your views.


