RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

We have said farewell to some dear friends over the Summer and that has brought to mind some words of Jesus in John's Gospel, from chapter 14, where he says to his disciples "Do not let your hearts be troubled" and "Trust in God; trust also in me".



Which is very sound advice and not only when we are saying farewell to someone we have loved and lost. Because it is, I believe, a unique remedy for a far from unique illness. A unique remedy for what is actually a universal and common illness, an illness that I think of as 'spiritual heart disease.' Indeed, that is such a common illness that you may be astonished to discover just how many people find themselves suffering from it. But when you talk to people as I do, you find that somewhere, by some connection, almost everyone has a problem, or a worry in their lives. It may be illness, or pain, or worry for the future. It may be concern for a job, marriage, or money. Whatever it may be, the fact is that so many of us have hearts that are troubled.

To which the remedy says Jesus is 'have faith': "Trust in God; trust also in me." Something that many undoubtedly know, but as I have found, something that we can all too easily forget when events surround us, perhaps overtake us, and when spiritual heart disease strikes. It is at such times that we need to remember that Jesus is the only hope; that Jesus is the only way and above all, that Jesus is the greatest power. He himself promised his disciples that they would be able to do even greater things than he himself had done. Now, if you stop to recall all that he had done, that promise was quite extraordinary!


In making that promise, I believe that Jesus was anticipating the great gift that he left to all of his followers to help and encourage us. The gift of the Holy Spirit and that means His power; His presence; for all of our lives and forever. And with that power, nothing need ever overcome us again.

So when spiritual heart disease strikes, and when we are worried or anxious about any of the many things that can trouble us we need to remember the power and presence of Jesus Christ in our lives, through His Holy Spirit, helping us to stay true to Christ. We need of course to pray, and to ask others to pray with and for us as well, but above all we need to trust Him, knowing that in all of our troubles He is with us and bringing us comfort always. Jesus said: "Trust in God; trust also in me."

Sad losses to the village

Since the last magazine there has been the sad news of the death of two well known members of our church and community. Michael Denman and Mike Veasey. IMARA-UGANDA EDUCATION FUND

Visiting Uganda

In July Adelaide Asibwa and I spent ten days in Uganda. Ugandan team leader, Kevin, had organised a full programme for us and each day was filled with school or home visits, time with our past and present scholars, being entertained with song, and taking part in meetings.

St Mary Goretti Secondary School

This was our first visit to the school for the blind since it opened in February 2024. There are 43 students now, 9 totally blind, 13 partially sighted, one with sickle cell anaemia, 2 with cerebral palsy, 2 others with physical disabilities and the rest without disabilities. What amazing young people they are! They are learning that disability does not mean inability and they are talented and supportive of each other. So many of these young people come from the very poorest of families and we are supporting 15 with school fees grants so that they can be in school.



Every new gift of equipment is received with great excitement and appreciation and thanks to the support of friends at St. Peter's Church, Ardingly and Ardingly village, we were able to hand over 2 Braille machines, an orbit reader 20 and a large print Bible. Gradually the school is becoming furnished and equipped.

The construction of the dormitories for the girls has met with many challenges, but it was encouraging to see that some progress had been made. Washrooms were being added and there are 2 dormitories, a sick bay and a room for the matron. We are hopeful that the girls will move in next term.



Adelaide was given some beautiful Bible story books to take out and these were gratefully received by the children in Ngetta Primary School next door. We renovated the library in this school a few years ago so what a lovely gift for the library!

Visit to Gulu

Gulu High School is a 2 hour journey away and we have 4 totally blind students there and one with partial sight. They gave us an enthusiastic welcome. Adjacent to the High School is a primary

school attended by many blind children, mostly from the poorest families who have no hope of paying school fees. The children are encouraged to come to school where they board for the term and if they cannot pay fees they stay for free. Blind and sighted children learn together and they all learn Braille. A little boy who stole our hearts had no visible eyes.





Home visits

We visited the homes of a boy from the slums of Lira and peasant families in rural areas. The homes of Sarah, a blind girl with 3 blind siblings, and Thomas who is lame were far from Lira and once we left the main road we travelled over deeply rutted dirt roads and tracks. Twice we were stuck in mud and had to be rescued by passers-by. We were saddened to learn that a 5th child in Sarah's family, a half-brother, is also blind in one eye and is not receiving treatment. As always, we wish we could do so much

more for this child, for the child with no eyes, for children still dropping out of school through poverty, but we praise God for the generosity of donors who have enabled us to build the school for the blind and support many children and young people with scholarships and school fees grants, giving hope for a brighter future.

It rained in the morning but then the sun came out at lunchtime and for the rest of the day and into the evening. Hardy villagers were still on the recreation ground having fun at 10pm! What a great day - we're already thinking about what we can do next year!!!

STONEPILLOW BIG SLEEP OUT

Saturday 20th September will see another memorable day when the annual BIG Sleep Out is set to take place in the grounds of Chichester Cathedral.



Why do people get involved?



EXPERIENCE: They spend a night outdoors in their own unique cardboard shelters, simulating the challenges faced by those without a home.



RAISE VITAL FUNDS: Their donations & fundraising efforts will directly support the charity's services in providing essential support to prevent homelessness and restore lives.



CONNECT WITH COMMUNITY: They join a group of like-minded individuals who are committed to making a positive change.

A participant of last year's BIG Sleep Out said: "You have to try the BIG Sleep Out at least once! You make friends, memories and gain a deeper connection to a charity that does so much in our local community"

Up to 100 people take part, securing sponsorship in a bid to raise over $\pounds 25,000$.

£495 funds an entire day at one of the charity's Day Hubs. With rough sleeping on the rise in our communities, Stonepillow is working hard to combat the issue; last year, they worked with over 1,000 individuals. Every night, they provide a safe place to sleep for up to 124 people. (More information on stonepillow.org.uk)

Michael Denman, 1935-2025

The funeral of Michael Denman was held at St Peter's Church on 30th July. Michael had been a resident of Ardingly since 1963, a familiar figure around the village and a committed member of the church. He was also active in our History Society of which he was President from 2012. Its archives contain many of his photographs which he used to illustrate his talks to the Society about the many changes to the village he had seen.



It was as a photographer that Michael earned his living, working in (and eventually buying) a camera shop in the Broadway in Haywards Heath. He had developed this interest from a young age, working as a trainee photographer in his late teens in what is now Harare, Zimbabwe, where he had lived from the age of 14. On returning to England when he was 20, Michael did his National Service in the RAF, carrying out aerial photography from Lancaster bombers and being stationed in Aden during the Suez crisis of 1956.

After working for the prestigious photographic retailer Wallace Heaton in Bond Street, London, Michael moved his work closer to home to spend more time with his wife, Diana. They especially used to enjoy driving to Penton Hook Marina on the Thames, where they kept a small river cruiser, and taking themselves, family and friends for days out on the Thames, relaxing in the boat and local hostelries.

In the early 1980s, Michael was instrumental in pioneering a village CB-radio network organised by St Peter's. This enabled village residents to keep in touch with one another before the days of WhatsApp groups and provided a lifeline for the elderly living alone. Michael also took over the editing of the Parish magazine in 1984 and continued in this labour of love for 32 years. The format and style of content we know today still has Michael's stamp on it.

Michael was an active member of St Peter's. His faith grew stronger as the years went by and he was an enthusiastic contributor to his Home Group and hosted it in his later years. These were difficult at times as he became increasingly infirm, but he bore the pain and poor quality of life, the delays to his treatment and his failing eyesight with enormous courage and inspiring equanimity, upheld by his deep Christian faith.

He leaves behind a sister and brother, two nieces and two greatnieces. They, and all his family and many friends, will miss this lovely, generous, kind-hearted and engaging man. May he rest in peace.

AROUND THE VILLAGE

WAKEHURST'S REDWOODS

The landscape at Wakehurst is looking rather different now, with the loss of one of the lovely Redwood trees.

This remarkable tree had a long and eventful life, surviving the Great Storm of 1987, enduring a lightning strike in the early 1990s, and eventually succumbing to honey fungus, a common yet destructive pathogen that ultimately led to its demise.

However, this isn't the end for Wakehurst's beloved redwood. There are plans to measure its carbon content as part of their Nature Unlocked research programme, to create a commemorative piece from the timber and propagate a new specimen from its seeds.



CLASSIC CAR CHAOS!

These days the Showground is very experienced in organising traffic for the two main events each year and we know what to expect. However, the Classic Car event on 27th July was a different story! The Street Lane gate was not open, residents had not been asked not to park in the High Street and Street Lane and

when around 1,000 cars converged on Ardingly and all tried to make their way into the Showground, there was gridlock. It took one lady two hours to drive from Copyhold Lane to St Peter's Church, by which time the morning service had long since ended. If the event is held again next year hopefully lessons will have been learned and things will be different.


