RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The month of November is a month of remembrance. It is the moment when we stop, remain silent and take a moment to live in the light of remembrance. We do this as we remember those who gave their lives in the service of their country and in defence of the freedoms we enjoy



today. But we do this too, when we remember with thanks all of those who have shared our lives, shaped our lives, but who are no longer with us.

Each year we hold a service of personal remembrance, a service known as a 'Commemoration of the Faithful Departed' to use the proper church title for such a service. For me, it is a moment to stop and to remember all of those we have loved and lost and who we see no more; to give thanks for all they have meant to us and to hear afresh of God's love and strength as we continue the journey of life without them. For the last few years we have held this service in the graveyard of the church so as to be in the place where so many memories rest, to pray in that place in a solemn moment, but also, I hope, as a time to focus on the hope of the resurrection, both theirs and ours and to give thanks for their love and faithful testimony. This year this service will take place on **Sunday 2nd November** at **3.00pm**. It will be quite short and as we have done previously, there will be a chance to share a cup of tea afterwards in the Church Centre. Everyone is welcome to join us.

Our annual **Service of Remembrance** and **Act of Remembrance** will take place on the Recreation Ground on **Sunday 9**th **November**, beginning at **10.45**. As we look back and remember we will be praying in thanks for the peace that we now enjoy but also praying for the peace of our world and for reconciliation between all people. It is clear beyond all question from the teaching of Jesus and his apostles that Christians are called to peace and to be peacemakers. It is all part of the truly radical way of living that Jesus taught us and showed us in the Kingdom of God. We are actively to 'pursue peace,' we are to 'strive for peace with all people' and so far as it depends on us, we are to 'live peaceably with all.' And this all calls for prayer. Something we can all do.

In such prayer we are asking to share in the true nature of God, seeking to overcome evil with good, and hatred and fear with love. I hope that you can join us for this service too.

In this season of remembrance I like to recall how in the Old Testament the people of God, the Israelites, were forever being called by God to remember – to remember who they were and, where they had come from. But it was also a call to a future that could be different. When we remember, we too need to have a vision for the future. As we read of it in the Book of Revelation, God's ultimate promise for us is that God will dwell with us, that there will be no more mourning, no more crying, no more pain – we will get out of our cycles of violence and war because all of that has been gathered up in Christ who has shown us a different way. That future starts with us now and in our prayerful honouring and remembrance.

A thought about stress

A lecturer, when explaining stress management to an audience, raised a glass of water and asked, "How heavy is this glass of water?"

Answers called out ranged from 2 to 5 pounds.

The lecturer replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long you try to hold it."

He continued, "If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm. If I hold it for a day, you'll have to call an ambulance. In each case, it's the same weight. But the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes.

"And that's the way it is with stress management. If we carry our burdens all the time, sooner or later, as the burden becomes increasingly heavy, we won't be able to carry on. As with the glass of water, you have to put it down."

Jesus said, "Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you. Let me teach you, because I am humble and gentle at heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy to bear, and the burden I give you is light. (Matthew 11:28-30)

SAMARA'S AID NEWS

At the Outreach Centres in Syria Samara's Aid provides education, food and activities for poor and vulnerable children, including many orphans. Samara writes:

We have 40 – 50 sixteen year old girls who have been very neglected and have never been taught how to read or write, but who really want to learn. We are helping them learn literacy skills.

Many children who couldn't even write their names began coming to us and have also started going to school. Our team have been helping them learn and catch up. They are progressing in leaps and bounds and have improved in such an incredible way. We have needed to employ a number of additional teachers, who are doing a great job working with these children and helping them improve quickly.

Our team have recently registered a number of beneficiaries who were imprisoned in the notorious Saydnaya prison. They come with chilling stories and bear the shocking scars of horrendous torture. They weep as they tell their stories, and our team weep with them for what they have suffered.



NEWS FROM NEPAL (received in September)

Greetings in Jesus' precious name from Nepal.

First of all we really want to thank God for our 3 weeks' visit to the UK during July/August. It was our great joy to visit Northern Ireland for the first time. The conferences, meetings and visits have all been such blessings to us. We are refreshed and renewed.

As you know, in August in Nepal unimaginable events took place caused by the Zen Z movement in Nepal. Their demand was digital freedom and the resignation of the Government and it is reported that 72 precious lives were lost and billions worth of properties were destroyed and damaged. We are sorry and saddened by all the losses. We offer our condolences and prayers to the grieving families and for those who are still in hospital. As the new Government is taking formation please pray for them.

As a family and Church we are all safe; thank you so much for your prayers. Now the situation in Nepal is getting better and schools are reopened.

We celebrated Aanandit's 23rd anniversary on 30th August. We thank God for His faithfulness and your prayers in helping us come

so far. The Aanandit Charity's 18th anniversary and Social Audit have taken place too. The Children's Home, Girls Hostel, Day Care, Tailoring, Micro Business program and Scholarship program are all doing well.



Our one month's Leadership Training is going to start from 1st October. The Annual Conference for all Aanandit Pastors and Leaders will take place in November. We continue to plant churches too.

Please pray that we continue to receive God's strength, provision, wisdom and peace. Thank you.

PILGRIMAGE WALKS: WE MADE IT!

On Saturday 11th October a group of six walkers left St. Mary's Church, Singleton having travelled by train and bus to this, the starting point of the final stage of the pilgrimage from St. Peter's Church, Ardingly to Chichester Cathedral. We set off with the sound of Handel's "Messiah" ringing out as a choir rehearsed in the church.

Almost immediately the footpath started up the incline to the "Trundle", a high point on the Downs, topped by an iron-age fort. Eight or more Red Kites searching for thermal currents soared above us giving good reason to stop and watch, or, just get one's breath back! Further along the path Stonechats led the way flitting ahead from one fence post to another encouraging us on with their chatter.

Then the path emerged onto Knight's Hill with Goodwood racecourse and its grandstands seen nestling into the hill. A steep but shorter section brought us onto the mound of the ancient fort with 360 degree views and, somewhat hazily, our end point, the Cathedral, visible in the background.

Following the path around the perimeter we began the descent,

stopping for a packed lunch and hot drink before picking up the West Sussex Literary Trail. This led gently downwards across open fields before running through the Lavant valley. Avoiding the bridal party coming from East Lavant's Church, (we weren't quite dressed for the occasion!) an easy route took



us across fields into the outskirts of Chichester.

Coming into Oaklands Park there was time for a cup of tea and loo stop at the Festival Theatre cafe. Meeting up with those who had travelled down later in the day the group walked through the streets to the Cathedral's west door. Here we were met and welcomed by Canon Nigel who led us in a short service in front of the shrine of Saint Richard. A very fitting end to the series of walks begun in March.

Time was now at a premium for those who were intending to fit in a meal, attend the evening prayer service, then change out of walking gear to go to the Sir John Rutter Concert being held as part of the Cathedral's 950 anniversary celebrations. Wonderful music in a beautiful setting.

For those who have taken part in this challenge much has been learnt along the way about the county we live in, about ourselves and about each other. A real pilgrimage! However, few of the walks would have been possible without those who gave lifts to or from start and finish points. Our grateful thanks to everyone who provided this generous support and also to those who gave sponsorship. Monies are in the process of collection and the final amount will be announced next month.

TOP TIPS FOR PETRIFIED PETS ON 5TH NOVEMBER

Fireworks seem to be getting louder and louder and pets can be very frightened by them. Last year the pet food brand Judge's Choice put together a simple advice sheet for pet owners who are worried about keeping their pets safe during the fireworks season.

Advice included:

- · Create a safe space for your pet
- Avoid leaving your pets alone
- Close windows, curtains and blinds
- Keep your pets indoors
- Walk your dog early in the evening (before the dark skies are filled with bright lights and loud bangs)
- Feed your pet early while it's still light
- Use white noise or music
- Provide distractions like toys and treats

Classic FM will again be playing a special pet-friendly show called *Pet Classics* on Bonfire Night, November 5th. The program is designed to help calm anxious animals with soothing music and tips from the <u>RSPCA</u>. This is the second of two special shows for 2025. The first one will be on Saturday, November 1st.

ARDINGLY PARISH COUNCIL

As the leaves turn and the seasons change, there's been plenty of activity happening quietly behind the scenes by the Parish Council. We've been working to strengthen our partnerships with both Wakehurst Place and the South of England Agricultural Society. Excitingly, we're exploring new joint projects with Wakehurst, and they remain closely engaged with the ongoing development of Hapstead Garden.

We've also had constructive discussions with the South of England Agricultural Society to review the summer's events and explore ways to reduce their impact on the village. As part of this, they have reaffirmed their responsibility for maintaining the boundary hedges and will be renewing their efforts to keep them tidy, particularly from the High Street through Street Lane to keep the path to St. Peters Primary School clear.

You may have also spotted some recent improvements around the

village. We have had Mid Sussex replace the parking sign in the centre of the village, and continue the regular hedge maintenance by parish councillors to keep the area looking neat and welcoming.

In addition, two new benches and a commemorative sign have been installed to mark the 80th anniversary of VE Day.



This project was made possible through grant funding secured by the collaborative efforts of the Parish Council and the Hapstead Hall Management Committee. The bench in front of the British Legion has also been beautifully repaired—our thanks to Martin Angus for his work on this.

Looking ahead, we're preparing for the Remembrance Day service on **9 November** at the Pavilion. We're pleased to share that, after productive talks with Mid Sussex regarding the damage caused to the memorial gates by their lorry, funding has now been provided. Combined with Parish Council contributions, this will allow us to fully replace the memorial gates to the recreation ground.

And finally, **save the date – 6 December** – for the Christmas Fair, the lighting of the oak tree, and our much-loved Carols and Christingle service.

WSCC's Recycling survey results

There were more than 3,000 respondents to WSCC's recent "Think before you Throw" survey and 92% said that recycling is "very important". The survey also revealed there's still some confusion around recycling plastics.



In West Sussex, we can recycle all colours of plastic bottles, pots, tubs, and trays, as long as they're clean, dry, and loose.

Plastic bags and wrapping, like crisp packets and carrier bags, cannot be recycled in our blue bins due to the way the recycling facility works. All these, including bubble wrap, should be taken to one of the local supermarkets such as Sainsbury's or Waitrose.

FSW UPDATE received in October

Dear Friends,

September is always a busy month here at FSW as children return to school and parents are faced with the challenges that this brings.



As the new term starts with children moving into new classes, we are seeing an increase in the number of referrals coming through from schools.



The highlight for our families in September is the weekend at Dalesdown at Dial Post near Horsham. We had 12 families stay with us for the weekend, with a wide range of activities taking place. There were opportunities for the families to try their hand at archery, thanks to the Rev James and Rev Lucy Hollingsworth and their helpers. Focusing on a theme of festival, the families enjoyed time outdoors, as well as opportunities for crafting and Saturday evening songs and games around the campfire.

We were also pleased in September to hear that the Diocese has reinstated the FSW support grant of £36,000 for the next financial year. This is a great help to our finances, and we are very pleased that the Diocesan Board of

Finance has been able to reinstate the grant.

Finally, as we are celebrating, we are grateful for all of you who donate food and money at Harvest time and through the year. The food donations at Harvest help us keep the food bank stocked for at least the next 6 months and is essential to our work.


