

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The truth is, of course, that we all too easily miss the point about Lent. Each year as Ash Wednesday comes along many of us proudly declare what we're going to be giving up this year, what pleasure we're going to deny ourselves and what treat we intend to forgo for the next few weeks. But Lent isn't about denial; it is actually about transformation.



Because Lent is the season in which we make ready to encounter Christ's sacrifice by preparing ourselves to become more like him and by journeying with him again to Golgotha, to the cross. When we think about it in this way transformation is more about taking something on than letting something go. It is about allowing ourselves to be filled with God's presence so that we can be shaped by God's extravagant, abundant, and quite overwhelming grace and so reborn to live more fully as a citizen of the Kingdom, just as God wants. The question is, does giving something up really help in this? Does giving up that cup of coffee actually make us a better follower of Christ, or does it make us tetchy? Does avoiding that square of chocolate help us to build greater community in the body of Christ, or does it make us depressed and withdrawn? There's a danger that in giving something up we don't empty ourselves in order to let God in, we simply fill ourselves with more of us!

Lent should be a time to learn how to become more fully the people that God wants us to be. It has always been about discipline, so wouldn't it be better to try to become more disciplined in our personal prayer life? Taking time to pray every day and so to talk to God. Listening also to all that he may want to tell us in reply. Or trying to love others better.

The Bible calls upon us not only to love those who love us, but to love all our neighbours and to love our enemies too – and to pray for them as well. On a very practical note, Lent is a time to be more disciplined when it comes to eating ethically and shopping fairly. In each of these, as in other ways, the outcome will be that we are not only transformed, but by the end of Lent we will see that we have actually managed to eliminate several things from our lives without which we are much better off.

Perhaps the question that we need to be asking this Lent is not, “what shall I give up?” but instead, “what shall I start so as to allow God to transform me?” This may just help us to change our understanding and observation of Lent. But it will certainly allow God to work on us from the inside out.

NEWS FROM HEATHER JOHNSTONE (CMS)

(This was received in early December)

Dear friends,

Two praiseworthy stories from Rehema:

Two young girls, Mariam (9) and Christina (8) always come and visit me at Rehema when their grandmother is attending choir practice at the cathedral (next door). It's very exciting and they chatter away, draw pictures and "hang out". Their mother died a few years ago and their father abandoned them, leaving their grandmother to fend for them. During one of their visits, our cook, Mode, asked me if Mariam was sick. I told her that I didn't know but didn't think so. Mode later asked the same question to their grandmother, as just by looking at her she suspected the girl either had sickle cell anaemia or HIV/AIDS. The grandmother confirmed that Mariam did indeed have sickle cell anaemia but confessed that she hadn't taken her for her monthly check up for several months because she had no money for transport to get to the hospital, never mind the treatment or prescribed medicine. The monthly cost is about TSH 40,000 (£13). We told her we would be more than happy to support her with these costs through our Assistance Programme as it is so important for Mariam and her future. She was so relieved and grateful.



Someone you will have heard me mention before is Kenneth, who was named after my late father. Kenneth broke his arm in November last year. The treatment he received was very poor and the arm never healed properly. I saw him some months ago and noticed he was protecting his left arm and doing everything with the good arm. His mother told me the bone had never set properly, and he was favouring his right arm as it was painful to use the left one. I told her if he continued to use only the right arm that would create future problems due to muscle wastage etc. The problem could not be ignored, and I thought medical intervention was needed. She consulted a specialist doctor at the government hospital and corrective surgery was recommended. We give thanks for the generous donations received to cover the cost of Kenneth's surgery and after-care. Praise God the 2 and a half hour operation was a success.

Following on from the huge challenge and responsibility of cooking for the former president of Tanzania and his fellow dignitaries, we have been expanding our catering services. Not that long ago we provided breakfast, lunch and dinner for a group of ordinands for one week, and for 320 people including special guests Jono Vink and Tim Swan from Australia at the ordination service on the Sunday. More recently we catered for 205 people at ACT Mara Pre & Primary School's graduation service. The team did brilliantly and the parents attending the service declared that it was the best buffets they'd ever had. Many of them were so impressed they asked for our business cards, so hopefully that will lead to more catering assignments.

It was the first time we'd seen Jono since he and the family left their service as missionaries in the Diocese of Mara in June 2016. There was a time for sadness as he remembered his beloved wife, Amy, who passed away earlier in the year. But also a time for great joy as he celebrated everything they had achieved as co-founders of Rehema. There was a time for prayer and thanksgiving as we celebrated all they had achieved in Mara.



We were also privileged to have my brother Craig visit with his partner, Tracy. Craig has wanted to visit for some time but didn't simply want to fly in and out and visit for a week or two. He wanted an authentic overland African adventure. He and Tracy drove 9,000km from Cape Town in South Africa to Musoma, Mara, to visit me and see the Rehema

Project first-hand. We went to visit the children at the nursery school at Nyambeshi, which was very joyous. All the children were treated to an ice lolly, as Craig has a fridge/ freezer in his SUV. As there is no electricity in Nyambeshi, this was a very rare and well-received treat indeed.

While in Nyambeshi we also went to visit the granddaughter of Cesi, who is named Xandra after our late mother. We shared a meal of rice and beans and got to know the lovely "Xandu" who, coincidentally, seems to have the same gentle temperament as our dear departed mum.

The Rehema women pulled all the stops out and held a special celebration to honour these extremely honoured guests. Craig and Tracy were blown away by the generosity of the women and the fantastic hospitality they received. Theirs really was the Africa trip of a lifetime; they took 3 months, visited 10 countries and put 22,000 km on the clock, but their highlight was the time spent in Musoma. They are still talking about their amazing visit to Mara.

A big thank you to my friends and supporters, for your encouragement, financial and prayerful support, and love throughout the year 2025. I wish you peace, goodwill and happiness at Christmas, and always.

NEWS FROM NEPAL

Family: We praise God for our family as we have been enjoying our lives in Nepal. Our girls are growing in age, in education and also in God. Our eldest daughter has finished her BSc Degree in Computers and is now looking to study further in a Masters Degree. The other 2 girls are in Grade 8 and grade 4.

Church and Training: As a Church we now have 21 Aanandit Churches throughout Nepal. We hope to have 40 by AD 2033. In October we had a one month Pastors and Leaders Training in Kathmandu, where 13 participants completed the Training. In November we had a 3 day Annual Conference for Aanandit Pastors and Leaders where 52 pastors and leaders had some blessed teaching from the life of Joseph. We have regular monthly programs for children, young people, men and women.



Mission and Charity Work:

On the Mission side, A group led by Pastor Nar went to Western Nepal, reaching out to 8 districts with the Gospel for a week. In December we had a number of programs to witness to Jesus' Love to the community through gifts and the Gospel. Shusma and the team travelled to different schools in Sindhu and Lalitpur. We sang Carols in half a dozen places and we are proud to say that God has enabled us to reach out and to help many needy people. We are continuing supporting children, single mothers and the poor in the community by all means.

Aanandit Mission Fund: As the Churches grow we are in need of buildings. For this either we lease a piece of land and build on it or pay a high rent. Hence, the Church Committee has decided to set up

a Mission Fund in the Micro business model. But not to charge any interest from where the Aanandit churches can borrow a limited amount for Church Needs. They can pay back to the fund monthly in instalments or in 2 years. It will take the burden off the Pastors and Leaders when money is needed for Church urgent needs for mission or rent etc.

Nation: After the Zen Z protest the new Government was formed 3 months ago and they have called a special election in March. There is a lot of uncertainty at the moment so we need to pray more for our nation. We would value your prayers for this.

We are pleased to begin the year with some exciting news. Thanks to the efforts of the Hapstead Garden Working Party, led by Sarah Chapman and Councillor Chris Hotblack, the Parish Council has secured a £20,000 National Lottery grant. Work will now begin on developing a detailed project plan and appointing contractors, with the aim of rejuvenating the centre of the village.

In response to feedback from residents, a new bench has been received and will soon be installed by the bus stop. Our thanks go to The Jobfather for his continued support of the Parish Council across our varied projects and maintenance needs.

We were also pleased to support St Peter's Pre-school by providing temporary accommodation in the Community Pavilion during recent heating issues at the Church Centre, ensuring childcare could continue uninterrupted. We would like to remind residents that the Pre-school also runs a breakfast club and after-school club for all St Peter's Primary School children. The cost is £5, including food, and children are safely walked to school by pre-school and school staff

## **WSCC Climate Change awards**

West Sussex County Council were proud to support Carbon Literacy Action Day in November. It's a worldwide initiative focused on building knowledge and inspiring practical action to tackle climate change. The day coincided with COP30 when global leaders met in Belém, Brazil to shape climate policy.

County council staff members took part in in-house training to become Carbon Literate certified, joining a growing network of over 750 colleagues who have already been accredited and are contributing to reducing emissions across all council services.

This collective effort has already earned the county council 'Bronze Carbon Literate Organisation' status, and the council is aiming for 'Silver' accreditation soon. The Highways, Planning and Transport team has led the way by achieving 'Silver' accreditation, with 35% of its staff now certified Carbon Literate.

Climate change is one of the greatest challenges facing West Sussex.

## **In Memoriam – David Smith**

We are sad to report the death of David Smith, who died on 1st December 2025, aged 76, and we extend our condolences to his wife Pam.

David was a much loved member of St. Peter's Church, having served us both as Churchwarden and Reader. A man of faithful prayer, he was a leading figure in the church prayer group and often at New Wine shared in the prayer ministry for those who came forward.

His Christian witness was evident in his career as a schoolmaster, first at Ampleforth College and latterly, as Head of Mathematics at Worth School. He had a wonderful ability to talk to anyone anywhere and make them feel special.

The later years of his life were overshadowed by Alzheimer's, but he never lost his sense of fun, his love of singing and, above all, his joy at spending time with his family - four children and 12 grandchildren.

A thanksgiving service was held on 9th January 2026 at St. Mark's Church, Kempshott, at which it was evident how deeply rooted in the Christian faith his family are. A fine legacy indeed.

Finally, she spoke to the doctor about it. The doctor reassured her, saying: "Don't worry, he really does have a bump on his head. About halfway through the operation, we ran out of anaesthetic."

## FSW January Update

The start of the New Year brings a natural sense of renewal. Our practitioners begin re-engaging with families, reconnecting with schools and other professionals, and putting new plans in place to support families and help them find fresh ways to address the challenges they face.



Each year we are very grateful for the many children's books donated before Christmas. We hold on to most of these donations until February, when we start preparing for World Book Day in early March. Our practitioners are invited into the

office to choose books for the children they support, ensuring each child receives a book that feels personal, whether it's by a favourite author or on a topic they love. We also include a colouring book as an extra treat.

This year, an estimated 65,300 households across Sussex are living in fuel poverty. We will continue to raise funds through this campaign until the end of March.
